WAR ECHOES

London, Monday. —While the professional war correspondent has been relegated to the rear and in some instances not permitted to accompany the armies of the Allies, the place of that narrator is well taken by the soldiers at the front who write letters to their homes. There is nearly always a cheery and optimistic note in letters to friends at home. Deeds of heroism modestly told, pathetic leave takings of dying comrades fun in the trenches while shells shriek and whistle overhead are all to be found in these letters.

Trooper S. Stanley, of the Royal Scots Greys, writing to a friend in Edinburgh, says:—"I owe my life and that perhaps of a whole army to my old horse. I was on outpost duty at a lonely spot, and though I could not see or hear anything my horse kept neighing and betraying signs of restlessness."

"I got down and came on a German crouching in the long grass. He had a sword bayonet and evidently meant to get me unawares, and then the post would have been rushed. I didn't wait to ask his intentions but let him have a ticket for another country."

"His yell brought his mates down, but I got away, and the row alarmed the guard and spoiled their attempt at surprising us. You bet the old nag had a special feed that night."

A touching story of an unfinished letter is told by a private in the Scots Guards. "In the trenches on one of our 'off' days I was sitting smoking a 'fag' and my chum was writing a letter to his mother. He got to this:—'I have got through without a scratch so far, but you never know your luck out'—when a bullet round off the sentence better than you or I could do it, and his grave is in the lonely valley of the Aisne."

A beautiful little story of self-sacrifice is told by a gunner of the Royal Artillery. "In one of our night fights," he writes, "a chap of the Gloucesters had his rifle knocked out of his hand, and a big German lunged at him with a bayonet. Quick as lightning one of his mates sprang between him and the German and received the thrust in the chest. He died within an hour and when asked why he did it his answer was, 'God I couldn't help it! He's got a wife and kids.'"

Paris, Oct. 23.—Military medical authorities at Lyons issued this appeal to the population:—

"There are many wounded who are so exhausted from the loss of blood that the only chance of saving their lives is by prompt transfusion from the veins of a healthy strong man or woman. Those who wish to offer their blood for such transfusions are invited to give their names to the Hotel Die."

No sooner had this notice appeared in the local press than volunteers presented themselves, and Dr. Carrol, the famous Franco-American surgeon, pathologist of the Rockefeller Institute and now head of one of the Lyons hospitals, was able immediately to save several patients. Three days ago there were already 120 names at the Hotel Die, representing rich and poor and all classes of society, and needless to add, women were conspicuous in the list.

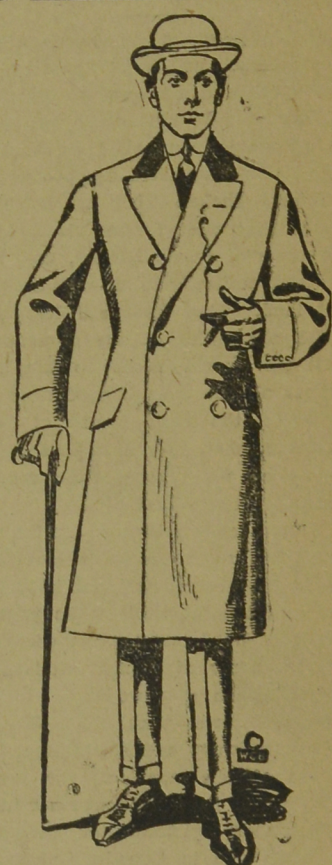
