BILL SWEENEY

WILL CONTINUE WITH BOSTON NATIONALS

Owner Gaffney Gives Him Direct Assurance to That Effect—Sweeney Knows Where He is

Hot Springs, Ark., Feb. 22—Bill Sweeney, captain of the Boston Nationals, will continue with the Braves this season, according to positive assurances the player has from owner Gaffney and Manager Stallings before he left the East for Hot Springs. Sweeney arrived here today joining Hub Burdette and Bert Whaling, of his own team, in addition to twenty other big leaguers, at a local hotel.

"I declined to leave for Hot Springs until I knew where I was to be located this season," Sweeney said.

"I did not relish the idea of a trip from Boston to Hot Springs, and then half way across the country to Tampa, so I asked Mr. Gaffney and Stallings to give me definite assurance—one way or the other. As a result I am in Hot Springs and will remain a Brave."

"When the Evers-Murphy incident broke in New York I was in Concord Mass. Mr. Gaffney tried to get me by telephone but failed. Then he telegraphed me, telling me to 'sit tight' and that I would be well taken care of. Of course it was immaterial to me whether or not I played with Boston, although I believe the team with the addition of Evers will land high in the league. Now, I understand the plan was to hold Evers in organized baseball until some proper disposal could be made of the tangle in which the league found itself. As things have been straightened out, I am sure to play in Boston. I suppose my position will be third base, with Evers on second and Maranville at short."

Sweeney looks to be in the best of trim and says he is not more than five pounds over weight.

HOCKEY MATCHES FOR THIS WEEK

Fredericton High Plays Rotheray Here Tonight—U. N. B. Plays Mount A at Sackville Thursday

Two hockey games of considerable importance to the Fredericton teams are to be played this week. Fredericton High School and Rotheray Collegiate School will play at the Arctic Rink tonight in the interscholastic hockey league, and on Thursday night the University of New Brunswick will play Mt. Allison at Sackville in the Intercollegiate League. Both games will be decisive as far as the local teams are concerned, each being the last scheduled game for them.

Fredericton High has two victories over St. John to its credit and tied Rotheray at St. John. If Rotheray loses here tonight Fredericton High will have the league. If Rotheray wins that team will have an excellent chance to win the league.

The Fredericton High team will have the same line-up as in previous games.

The U.N.B. team will leave for Sackville tomorrow morning, playing there Thursday night. The team will probably be the same as that which defeated King's College here last week. Jack Hipwell will be carried as substitute. U.N.B. and Mount A. are tied in the Intercollegiate League each having beaten King's and Acadia U.N.B. seems to be the better team on previous showing but Mt. Allison will have the advantage of playing in her own rink. The game will be watched with interest all over the Maritime Provinces.

HONUS WAGNER, FORTY YEARS OF AGE TODAY.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Feb. 24—Honus Wagner, shortstop of the Pittsburgh National league baseball team and one of the best known players in the history of sport, received a flood of congratulations from friends and admirers today on the occasion of his fortieth birthday anniversary. Wagner was born in Carnegie, Pa., and still makes that place his home. He began his baseball career in 1895 with the Steubenville team in the old Central Association. Since he joined the National league in 1897 Wagner has never failed to bat for a season's average below .300. He is now preparing for the trip to Hot Springs to get into condition for his eighteenth year in the big league and his fourteenth consecutive season with the Pirates.

RESTING PLACE OF DEAD LETTERS

Parcels Also Reach the Dead Letter Office and Their Contents Are Varied

On the dusty shelves of the Head Dead Letter Office at Ottawa there is a strange collection of articles that have gone astray in the mails. They are: One flask, five dried flowers, a tin of sardines and a sausage. A ice pick and a bottle of ink remained there for some time but were afterwards delivered. Five garters (it is not stated whether five pairs or five singles) came to this hospitable refuge; of these, four were delivered and one remained without a home. Seventy-three stockings came to hand, of which all but two were successfully forwarded. There were two marriage licenses, a pair of hand-cuffs, three bottles of liniment, one nut, nine pairs of overalls, one wig and four wills. There were nine sets of false teeth, two yeast cakes and a box of Zam-Buk.

Twenty-two authors now have returned slips from the Postoffice to add to their collections from various editors; their manuscripts fell into the hands of the Dead Letter Office, but were ultimately returned to the owners. There were two warrants, four pairs of corsets, three pairs of pyjamas, twenty-six corset covers and one single hazzard checks.

GRIFFITH WOULD

GIVE ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND FOR COBB

Thinks Ty Would Win Pennant for Washington Club—Says He is Sincere in His Offer

Washington, D.C., Feb. 23—Feeling the need of advertising, Clark Griffith, manager of the Washington baseball club, gave out an interview this afternoon declaring he would pay \$100,000 to the Detroit Club for Ty Cobb, the famous Detroit star. Here is what Griffith said:

"If the Detroit ball club will give me Ty Cobb for \$100,000, I stand ready to make the offer. I will go through with it and if it is necessary I will go down in my own pocket to complete the deal."

Griffith feels that if Cobb should join the Nationals it would mean the pennant for this city and he is acting accordingly.

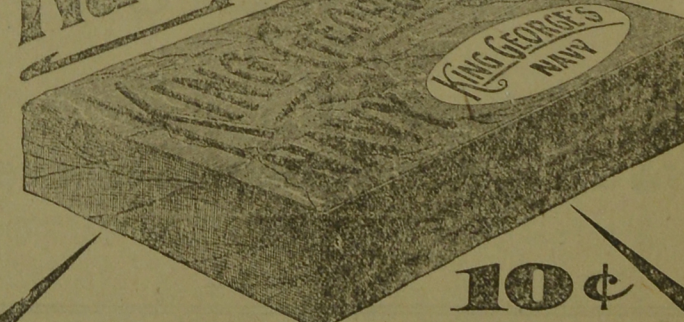
J. M. Allott has purchased a fine young horse.
