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

Freddy Welsh Given Decision Over Cross

Twenty Rounds Saw British Boxer the Winner---Ritchie Must Give Welsh a Chance for World's Title Now---Britisher Has Challenged Him Several Times

Los Angeles, Calif., April 28—Freddy Welsh, lightweight champion of England, was given the decision over Leach Cross of New York at Vernon tonight at the end of their 20-round battle.

Freddy Welsh was a strong favorite by odds of 5 to 3 over Cross. The winner is regarded as the logical opponent for Willie Ritchie in a match for the title. Welsh gave Rivers one of the most scientific and artistic trimmings ever handed out to a boxer in twenty rounds. He started into his work as a Vanderbilt race driver figures his race. When the going became rough, he boxed carefully. In the clinches he pinned Rivers' arms until he was in a helpless position. At the long-distance work he aggravated and tantalized Joe with straight left-

hand punches on the nose until he became furious.

Rivers tried every known style of milling and he is a good boxer; still he was outclassed at every turn.

Welsh has been a persistent challenger of Ritchie ever since the Frisco Dutchman annexed the championship from Ad Wolgast. Once he was on the verge of a title meeting in Vancouver, but Ritchie withdrew from the scene three days in advance of the battle day, giving as his reason the failure of the promoters to post the fifteen thousand dollar guarantee that he had been promised.

Since that time Welsh, through his manager, Harry Pollok, has been snapping at the heels of the champion. It will be impossible for Ritchie to much longer deny Welsh a chance at the championship.


WILLARD STOPPED RODEL
