MEXICO UNFRIENDLY  
WITH THE MEDIATORS

(Toronto Globe.)

Not a little curiosity has been aroused as to why A. Algara R. de Perros, late charge d'affaires of Mexico at Washington, who was given his passports by the United States government, came to Toronto.

"I came to Toronto," he said, in speaking to a Globe reporter at the King Edward Hotel last night, "because I thought I would be nearer the Mexican base than if I went to any other Canadian city. Moreover, I have many Canadian friends in Washington, who advised me to come to Toronto. The longer I am here, the more pleased I am that I came here, for you have a beautiful city."

Asked regarding the mediation offer from Brazil, Argentina and Chili, to settle the troubles between Mexico and the United States, Mr. Algara replied as follows:

"Probably a year ago John Barrett, director general of the Pan American Union, made some mediation proposal of the kind but for some reason or other this was not well accepted either in official or diplomatic circles. Later on, in fact only a few months ago, there was some hint, I think, as to a mediation offer from Argentina, Brazil and Chili, which, it was said, were willing to attempt a peaceful settlement between Mexico and the United States. However, as neither Argentina, Brazil or Chili had recognized the Huerta government, the proposition was hinted to the Mexican government but was thoroughly rejected and since then there has been no change in the situation, as far as I know.

## MEXICO NOT PLEASED.

"The Mexican government thought these three nations had not been friendly enough to mediate. Besides, Argentina, Brazil and Chili, though of the same race as Mexico, are so far away and have so few interests in common, that our diplomatic relations are more a matter of form than a real necessity. Moreover, Mexico feels that these three countries did not act in a very friendly manner by not recognizing the Huerta government, which was recognized by all the great European powers, as well as Japan and China and if the United States, for reasons of its own, did not recognize the Huerta government this did not justify the attitude of these three nations towards Mexico. This attitude, of course, did not mean for us what the recognition of the European powers meant, for in the latter case our commerce, our industries, our credit and our diplomatic relations were deeply interested."

On the general question of the conflict, Don Algara had nothing to say. He had no wires from the Huerta government and pending instructions from Huerta, would remain in Toronto, though for how long he could not say.

## FRIAR MARCUS OWNED

BY KING GEORGE WON

London, Eng., April 29—"Guineas Week," for the first spring meeting opened at Newmarket yesterday in fine style. The weather was glorious, the attendance large and fashionable, and the sport good.

The king was present and had the pleasure of seeing his racing colors carried to the fore by Friar Marcus, the splendidly balanced son of Cicero and Prime Nun, who made a successful debut in the maiden two-year-old plate for which there were twenty-three starters. The winner was a favorite two to one.

## KENNEMORE WON

AT NEWMARKET MEET

Newmarket, Eng., April 29—Kenny more, Sir Thursty's entry today, won the 2,000 guineas, in the classic three-year-old race, over a field of eighteen starters. Lord Londonderry's Corcyra was second, and J. B. Joel's Black Jester, was third. Durbat, favored by many Americans and The Tetrarch were scratched. Kennemore won by a head in a driving finish with Corcyra. Kennemore was quoted at 2 to 1 in the betting. Corcyra was 7 to 2, and Black Jester 20 to 1.

CANADIAN LEAGUE  
SECURES CLASS "B"  
RATING FOR SEASON

Toronto, April 27—President J. P. Fitzgerald of the Canadian League, has succeeded after a prolonged fight in getting Class B standing for the Canadian League. The announcement came this morning from Secretary Farrell of the National Association. This decision is of most vital importance to the Canadian League. Aside from the fact that it gives the league a much better standing in the baseball world, it means the raising of the salary limit for players and also that major league clubs drafting players from the Canadian League must pay \$1,200 instead of \$750, the price of a man drafted from a Class C League.

The rating is only granted for the year 1914 but there is little doubt but that the rating will be made permanent after the annual meeting of the National Baseball Association in Omaha next November.

BIRTHDAY OF LITTLE  
DUTCH PRINCESS

The Hague, April 30—From the German frontier to the North Sea, every city, town and hamlet of the Netherlands today displayed a profusion of flags and gave other evidences of rejoicing over the fifth birthday anniversary of the little Princess Juliana who will one day be the ruler of the Netherlands, with forty million subjects at home and abroad.

The birth of the Princess on April 30, 1909, was hailed with great joy by the people of the Netherlands, since it fulfilled a long-deferred hope and assured the succession of the House of Orange to the Dutch throne. The infant Princess was christened Juliana Louise Emma Marie Wilhelmina. The name of Juliana was given her in memory of Countess Juliana of Nassau, wife of Prince Frederick Henry, and mother of the two branches of the House of Orange Nassau. The name of Louise recalls Louise de Coligny, wife of William the Silent. The names of Emma, Marie and Wilhelmina are those of her grandmother and her mother.

"I am gaining at last! You get may be mine;


But you—woe is me!—are on No. 9.
