HERBERT O'ROURKE KILLED IN ACCIDENT AT VICTORIA MILL

Crushed by Stick of Timber While Loading Car at Mill This Morning ---Widow and Three Children Survive

Herbert O'Rourke, a resident of Forest Hill, was killed instantly at the Victoria Mill at about 11.15 this morning by being crushed by a stick of spruce-timber, which fell from the top of a car, upon which it was being loaded. O'Rourke was helping load the car at the time of the accident. He was on the load holding one end of the stick while the other was being lifted up. The stick slipped and O'Rourke, trying to hold its end on the car, was dragged off and fell with the timber. His head was caught between the falling stick and another and death ensued at once.

The ambulance from Victoria Public Hospital was called and Dr. Weaver also was summoned. The man was beyond human aid however. On the capacity of coroner Dr. Weaver inquired into the circumstances of the accident and ordered the remains removed to the home of the deceased. A jury will be empanelled this afternoon and the inquest probably will be held tomorrow night.

The deceased was a well known man and had many friends. He was about thirty-seven years of age. A widow and three young children survive. The mother of the deceased also survives, together with four sisters, Mrs. Richard Carten of this city, Misses Clara and Myra at home, and Nellie, who is married and living in St. John. The deceased had been working but a short time at the Victoria Mill.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE FOR CARE OF TREES IS RECOMMENDED

Plans Showing Location of Trees Also Recommended---Meeting at City Hall Last Night at Which Matter was Discussed

There was a meeting of considerable length at the City Hall last night at which there was discussion concerning the proper methods of caring for ornamental trees which should be pursued in Fredericton. The subject was talked over in detail and it finally was decided to recommend to the City Council that a plan showing the location of the trees in the city be prepared, and the care of the trees be invested in some committee or association.

RESOLUTION ADOPTED

The following resolution was adopted.

Resolved: That in the opinion of a meeting held in the mayor's office composed of representatives from the Improvement Association, the Women's Institute, the members of the special committee of the City Council, that the City Council should have at once a plan of the location of the trees of the City with information as to how each should be treated. That the care of the trees be placed under the control of some special committee or association who could command the assistance of the Road department to have such trees treated or renewed as appears from the indications on the plan.

That a copy of this resolution be sent to the City Council at its next meeting.

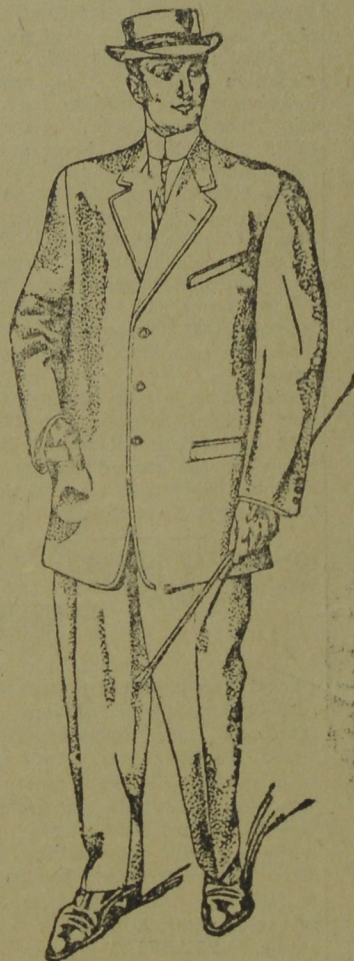

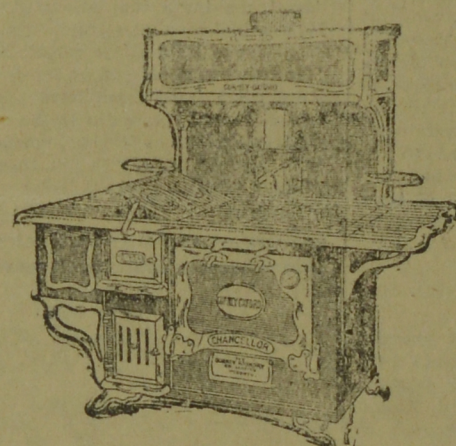
