### BANDSMEN ARE TO LEAVE TONIGHT FOR VALCARTIER

Will Take Their Departure by the I. C. R. Express at 6.30---Some Now at Valcartier to Join Them

The 71st Regimental Band will leave for Valcartier on the 6.30 I. C. R. express this evening and arrangements are being made to give the boys a hearty send-off.

About twenty members of the band have volunteered overseas service and together with former members of the organization now at Valcartier with regiments from different parts of Canada, will bring the band up to the required strength of twenty-five men, including Bandmaster James White.

It is altogether likely that the volunteers will each be given five dollars in money by the City Council, and Mayor Mitchell will make the presentations after the band assembles for roll call at the barracks square this afternoon.

Both the Fredericton Brass and the Fredericton Concert Bands will parade to the I. C. R. station and it is expected that there will be an enormous demonstration in connection with the 71st Band's departure.

### HAD BROTHER KILLED IN THE BATTLE OF MARNE

Richard Hainsworth a Former Resident Here From Valcartier, to Spend a Few Days---Has Bad News From the Front

Private Richard Hainsworth, a former British soldier, arrived here from Valcartier on the I.C.R. express this morning and will spend a few days with friends at Oromocto before leaving for Halifax, where he will join a party of reservists who will soon sail for the old country.

Pte. Hainsworth resided in this city for some time but about five years ago he left for his home in England. He later returned to Canada and enlisted at Victoria, B.C., for active service with the first Canadian contingent. It was while waiting for sailing orders with the troops at Valcartier that he received orders to proceed to Halifax and from there sail for England to join his old regiment, the Gordon Highlanders of Portsmouth.

He saw active service with the Gordon Highlanders during the South African war and was awarded the Queen's medal at the close of that campaign.

Only a few days ago Pte. Hainsworth received word from the British War Office to the effect that his brother, Pte. George Hainsworth, a member of the Gordon Highlanders, had been killed in action during the battle of Marne in France. His father is a lieutenant on one of the torpedo boats in the British navy.
