The need of Queens county. a laboratory has long been felt, and it is very pleasing to know that the lib raf donation by the Messrs. Fraser towards the project has so encouraged the friends of the institution who have the matter in hand that the erection of a buildi this purpose in the near future is now assured. While the University is a state aided, or rather a state sup ported institution, it is every way worthy of the benefactions of generous hearted men of means, and it is to be hoped that the worthy example set by the Messrs. Fraser will be emulated by others. While the University now provides a splendid course in arts, in civil and electrical engineering and in forestry, its scope of usefulness could beigreatly enlarged. It should provide a course in agriculture, in law and in medicine. These .ubjects are not taught at the institution today because they would town, Queens county. entail additional cost and the money is not available. The establishment of a complete laboratory is a long forward stride, and the loyal graduates and friends who have labored unceasingly to secure this boon for the collige, will no doubt continue their efforts until further addition. are made to the equipment. The old University of New Brunswick, which has held aloft the light of learning for over a century, must not be allowed to lag pedind in the onward march of progress. 
