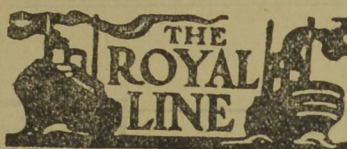

BLACK SMALLPOX IS RAGING IN QUEBEC

Montreal, Feb. 19.—Black smallpox and hemorrhagic smallpox—the two worst types of the disease known to medical authorities have broken out in the province of Quebec, according to Dr. Pelletier the secretary of the provincial board of health.

Champlain county just at present seems to be the nesting ground of the most virulent cases of smallpox, but several cases have now broken out all the way from Montreal to Quebec. In L'Islet county too, cases of hemorrhagic smallpox in which blood oozes through the eruptions have now broken out.

These cases resemble the type of smallpox which formerly raged through the province, and they have justified the worst fears of the medical authorities that if the mild cases of smallpox were allowed to increase the virulent type would appear.

Prompt steps were taken this morning against the municipality of Beaufort, near Quebec. Smallpox has been known to exist in this municipality for some time, but nothing was done by the municipality.

CLASS PRIVILEGES AND CLASS WAR IN CANADA

(Toronto Globe)

Evidence was published yesterday indicating the development of the spirit of class antagonism in Canada which does no good for the best interests of this country. On the one hand the advocates and beneficiaries of tariff privilege in parliament were reported as striving for machinery to entrench their special interests more firmly in the legislation and institutions of Government. They demand a Tariff Commission, not of unprejudiced experts to secure information which the Finance Minister professes to require, but of partisans who, as Mr. H. B. Ames explains, must first be in sympathy with the high protection interests which already control the Government. On the other hand, spokesmen for the farmers in the country repudiate the obligation resting on them to increase their production of foodstuffs in the interests of city people who persistently support class privilege and maintain tariff burdens which are a handicap on farm industry. The tariff protected manufacturers for whom Mr. Ames is spokesman in Parliament desire still greater advantage as against the "clamorous consumers."

The farmers begin to see how they can retaliate by limiting their production of foodstuffs and so force up the city prices for farm produce. One farmer from Gravenhurst very frankly disclaimed any obligation for the ease of those who, he says, "neither toil, nor spin." There is great reward for his hard toil in price than in more produce at the lower price.

And what answer has Mr. Ames and his privileged associates to offer to this calculating farmer? There is an answer, an answer more authoritative than self-interest, but it scarcely becomes the millionaire who enjoys tariff protection against "clamorous consumers" to offer that answer.

There is coming about in Canada what sober men ought to have foreseen as inevitable, a condition of class war for which the arrogance of class privilege is to a degree directly responsible. The growingly stern demands of the farmers in Western Canada is an illustration of it. The acknowledged indifference of farmers in Ontario to the cries of city people against the exorbitant prices of foodstuffs is another significant illustration. And the proposals of the high-tariff protectionists in Parliament, instead of lessening this antagonism, only intensify it.

If Hon. W. T. White has disconcertment enough to see through the scheme the selfish Big Interests are trying to "put over," and if he has strength enough to resist their organized partisan and bi-partisan intrigues, he may not only justify his own professions and the hopes of his best friends, but—a far more important thing—he may greatly help to take out of the way the chief cause of this growing spirit of class strife.

If true to his early creed he stands positively and resolutely to secure equality of opportunity for all the people before the law his life will be justified. But if he joins hands with Mr. Ames, and Mr. Kemp, and all the agents of the protected trusts, or if he allows them to have their way in the conservation of their class privileges, the last end of his public career will be worse than the beginning. He is now at the parting of the ways, if indeed he has not yet taken the fatal step, and what he does will be eventful, not for himself alone, but for the integrity of life and sentiment in Canada.

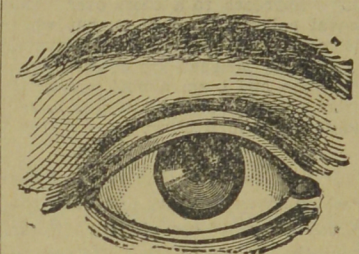

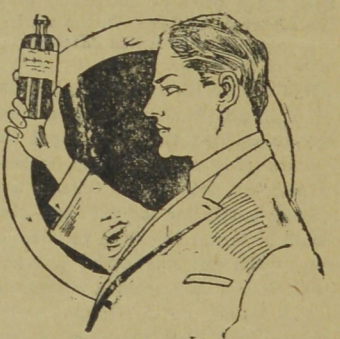
