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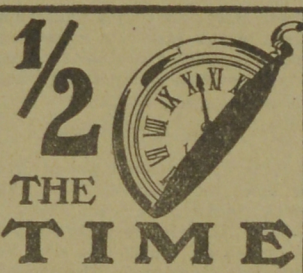

JOE PATCHEN II SCORES EIGHTH WIN AT SYRACUSE

Won 2:11 Pace for \$5,000 Stake in Straight Heats--Knight Onwardo Took Second Money

Syracuse, Sept. 12—The longest race program of the season on the Grand Circuit was the one raced today at the State Fair track, 39 heats being required to complete the bill. The intercity meeting of the League of Amateur Driving Clubs was begun in connection with the Grand Circuit races, the wagon events being called at ten in the forenoon. Members of the Clubs of Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Syracuse competed, the Cleveland amateurs being the most successful, winning two of the five events, one of which was the \$2500 League Cup.

The feature race of the Grand Circuit program was the \$5000 stake for 2:11 pacers in which the sensational Joe Patchen II scored the eighth victory out of nine starts this season, winning in straight heats and last time.

The big horse from Winnipeg never was in better form and he simply toyed with the field in each of the three heats. He paced the first heat in 2:04½ and the second only half a second slower, finishing the last quarter of the final heat in 29½ seconds.

The real battle of the big pacing stake was for second money and once again that other Canadian stallion, Knight Onwardo, showed that he would have been the real pacing star of the season with Joe Patchen II out of the way. Foote Prince gave him a hard rub for the place in the first heat and he only beat Grand Opera a head in the second. He was interfered with on the first turn in the third heat and made a break finishing well back, but this did not affect his standing in the race.

CHEENY ADDS ANOTHER

The trotting feature of the day was the \$3000 2:09 stake, and in this the Texas mare Cheeny won her fourth consecutive victory within a period of three weeks. Chatty Direct, from the Cox stable made her first start in several weeks and was second in the first heat, after which Jack London hooked up with Cheeny making the latter trot the final heat in 2:07½.

The 2:04 pacers put up a good contest. This event went to the Western stallion, Don Densmore who paced the second heat in 2:03½ in beating Cox with Branham Baughman the last quarter of the first heat being 28½.

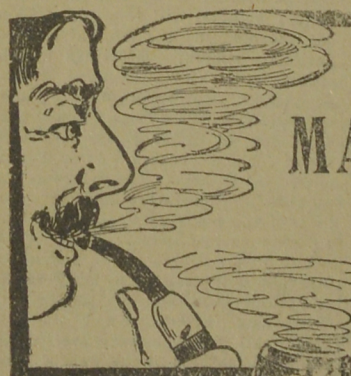
Cox was more successful in the 2:12 trot which he won in handy fashion with the brown stallion Deuchester.
