MEMORIAL TABLET
TO LATE DR. MOWATT
AT ST. PAUL'S CHURCH

Edifice to be Reopened Tomorrow
After Being in Hands of Renovators for Past Two Months

APPEARANCE OF INTERIOR
GREATLY IMPROVED

St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, which has been in the hands of renovators for two months past, is to be re-opened for worship tomorrow and the congregation, which has been using the Auld Kirk during the summer, will again worship in the new church, which has been much improved.

MEMORIAL TABLET.

Most noticeable of the innovations at St. Paul's is the marble memorial tablet to the memory of the late Rev. Andrew J. Mowatt, D.D., for some years minister of the church, whose death occurred with tragic suddenness in the pulpit of Erskine Presbyterian Church, Montreal, upwards of a year ago. The tablet is placed in the vestibule of the church, to the right of the main entrance. The four corners contain the initial "M" in crimson and the inscription, which is in black lettering with purple capitals, is surrounded by a border of leaves in gold.

The inscription is as follows:

Sacred to
The Memory of
Rev. Andrew Mowatt, D. D.,
Born at Woodstock, N. B., Feb. 11,
1838,
Minister of this church from 1880 to
1891.
Died in the pulpit of Erskine Church,
Montreal, Feb. 19, 1911.

This tablet is erected by St. Paul's Church in remembrance of his faithful pulpit ministrations and devoted pastoral care and constant personal interest.

This tablet was engraved and installed by Mr. J. S. Seaton of St. John, whose daughter is the wife of Mr. Oswald Mowatt, son of the deceased, now in the city.

The repainting and renovating of the interior of the church was carried out at a cost of upwards of one thousand dollars. The Ladies' Aid of the church was largely instrumental

FORD C. TAYLOR
OF HOYT STATION
TOOK CARBOLIC ACID

Died as Result at an Early Hour This Morning--Well Known Man and Prominent in Municipal Affairs of Sunbury

WIDOW AND FOUR CHILDREN
SURVIVE AT HOME

Ford C. Taylor, merchant of Hoyt Station, Sunbury County committed suicide at his home early this morning. He drank carbolic acid with fatal results. Dr. A. J. Murray of Fredericton Junction was summoned to attend the unfortunate man but arrived after death had taken place. As coroner Dr. Murray decided that an inquest was unnecessary and the burial of the remains was ordered.

The deceased took the fatal dose at about 1 a. m. and arousing the members of his family told them he had taken poison. He became unconscious shortly afterward.

The deceased is survived by a widow, a sister of Mr. H. W. Woods, M.P.P., of Welsford, one daughter and three sons all at home. The bereaved family has the sympathy of a large number of friends.

The late Mr. Taylor had several times been elected to the municipal council of Sunbury County. At the time of the last provincial election he was mentioned as a possible candidate in the interest of the government party.
