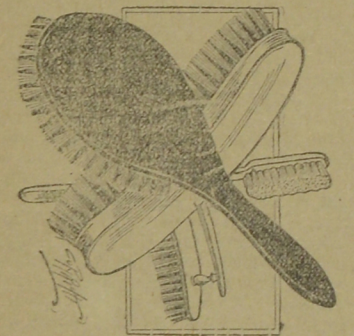

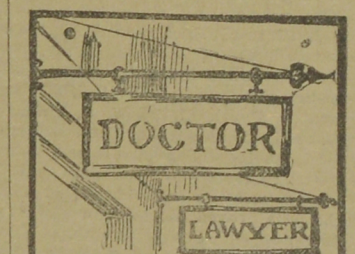

WORLD NEEDS MEN  
SAYS LORD ROSEBERY

London, July 9.—Woodrow Wilson's  
 nomination has been made the point  
 of many comments in connection with  
 the matters discussed at the Con-  
 gress of Universities of the British  
 Empire, held last week in London.

Lord Rosebery set the ball rolling  
 by speaking of the "need of men,"  
 which, he said, was the great need  
 of the age, and a need which the  
 universities alone could supply.

The world, he concluded, had need  
 of all the character, all the honesty  
 and all the ability which it contain-  
 ed, developed or undeveloped, to  
 carry it on without danger of anar-  
 chy and chaos.

No intelligent observer, Lord Rose-  
 berry thought, could watch the course  
 of the world without seeing that  
 great unrest was passing over it.  
 Whether for good or evil—he could  
 not doubt it was for good—it was  
 affecting not merely England and the  
 empire, but the entire world.

## THE WORLD IN TRAVAIL

"Is not the whole world," Lord  
 Rosebery asked, "in the throes of  
 travail to produce something new,  
 something perhaps better than we  
 yet have known, which it may take  
 long to perfect or to achieve, but  
 which, at any rate, means a new  
 evolution?"

Lord Rosebery, and after him Lord  
 Curzon, expressed the conventional  
 English doctrine by suggesting that  
 universities should be of two kinds.  
 The older, with a distinct literary  
 tinge, to educate those who are to  
 govern the state, and the newer,  
 with a pronounced scientific flavor,  
 to educate those who are to direct  
 the industry of the state.

As the weekly Nation points out,  
 however, the real question which the  
 Congress has raised is whether the  
 British empire and the world have  
 not more need of the newer than the  
 older type of university man.

In the course of the Congress,

which was attended by representa-  
 tives from fifty-three British and  
 colonial universities, the need of in-  
 creased facilities for post-graduate  
 study by colonial and American  
 students at English universities was  
 emphasized by the colonial delegates,  
 who declared that students of other  
 countries received more generous re-  
 cognition at American universities.

## A CANADIAN COMPLAINT.

Some speakers candidly admitted  
 that their students would not come  
 to England unless advanced degrees  
 were thrown open to them, because  
 such degrees were of immediate pro-  
 fit to them in their professions. The  
 complaint was made that when stu-  
 dents who had taken degrees at, say,  
 Melbourne, Manitoba or McGill Uni-  
 versity, desired to come to England  
 for a post-graduate course, they were  
 compelled to spend two years in  
 reading for the bachelor of arts de-  
 gree they had already got, instead of  
 being allowed to begin study immedi-  
 ately for a degree corresponding to  
 the doctor of philosophy degree of  
 American universities.

Prof. Frank Allen of the Univer-  
 sity of Manitoba said that they  
 desired the same recognition of Can-  
 adian universities by English univer-  
 sities as was given by the United  
 States. Students would not go from  
 Canada to England for the ordinary  
 bachelor of arts degree, which they  
 already had, unless some advanced  
 degree were forthcoming. They were  
 to the United States, where they  
 could get the doctor of philosophy  
 degree and many of them stayed  
 there. He wanted to turn that  
 stream toward the mother country.

The men employed by the Electric

 city is owned by the municipality.

Arkansas City, Ark., July 11.—Un-  
 less Governor Donaghey changes his  
 mind at the eleventh hour and grants  
 a commutation, W. S. Rhea, the  
 young white planter whose case has  
 attracted wide attention, will be  
 hanged tomorrow in the Desha county  
 jail. Rhea continues to maintain  
 that he is not guilty of the crime of  
 he was convicted and says he will  
 make a speech on the gallows declar-  
 ing innocence.

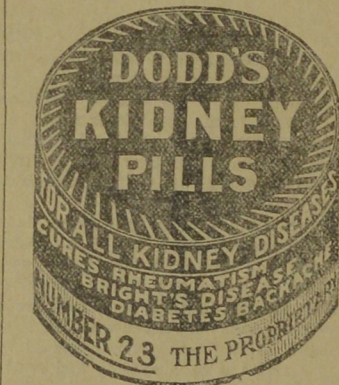
Rhea was convicted at Pine Bluff  
 last October of murder in the first  
 degree, it being charged that he led  
 a mob of negroes who shot and killed  
 Constable Vital Orchard on the night  
 of May 13, 1911, while the officer had  
 in custody Grant Sanders, a negro  
 wanted for murder on Saline county,  
 but who had been working on the  
 plantation managed by Rhea.

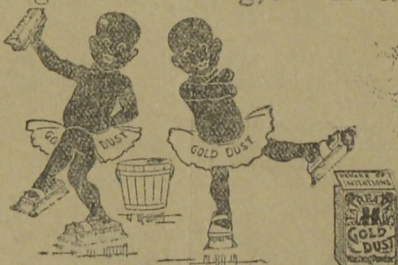
