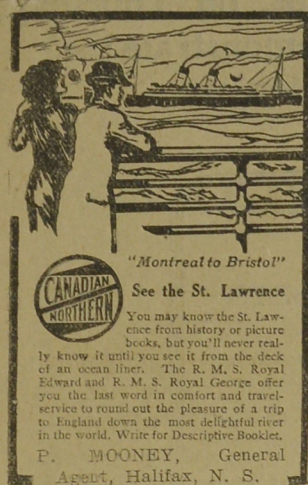

## SASKATCHEWAN ELECTION MARKED BY BITTERNESS

(Montreal Star.)

Regina, Sask., July 9.—The bitterest campaign in the history of Saskatchewan politics is drawing to a close. It has been a desperate fight, how desperate and how bitter no one, unless he has been in Saskatchewan, can imagine. Both sides are preparing for trouble on election day.

The Hon. J. A. Calder announces that the Liberals have sworn in 350 constables, while The Regina Province today advises Conservatives to arm and to resist arrest at the polls. It is feared there will be riots in many districts. This is the first time Saskatchewan has ever had printed voters' lists. The lists were made up hurriedly, and, irrespective of politics, there have undoubtedly been hundreds left off the printed roll. Through the country the farmers do not understand they cannot still swear in their votes, and regular Donnybrook Fair scenes are expected.

Word was received from G.W. Lake riding today that in one poll in district fifteen, ranchers and cowboys have just discovered they are not entitled to vote, as their names are not on the lists. They swear if they do not vote there will be no election in their district. The campaign has been more than a provincial fight between Haultain and Scott. It has developed into a fight for control of the west by Conservatives or Liberals.

Alberta has an election also shortly, and it is generally admitted that as Saskatchewan will go, so will go Alberta.

If the Conservatives can carry Saskatchewan, Alberta will probably follow suit. If the Liberals retain Saskatchewan, it will greatly strengthen the chances of the Sifton government. If the Liberals win the two provinces, it will give them a great advantage next Dominion election. They will have a greater chance of holding their present majority and of winning the ten new seats the province will get. If the Conservatives carry the province there will not be a federal constituency now held by the Liberals which will not be endangered.

BOTH SIDES REALIZE SIGNIFICANCE.

That both parties realize the importance of this election is shown in the efforts which are being made to win the province. Speakers and workers are here by the wholesale from Manitoba, Alberta and even British Columbia. The Alberta government evidently realizes the effect a Liberal defeat will have in their province, and the Hon. Duncan Marshall, the Hon. C. W. Cross, the Hon. A. G. Mackay, the former Liberal leader in Ontario, but now of Edmonton, and the Hon. Frank Oliver are stumping the province.

Mr. Ralph Smith, ex-M.P. of Nanaimo, B. C., has also been speaking on Premier Scott's behalf, and Mr. R. L. Bennett, M.P. of Calgary, and a number of Conservative orators from Edmonton, have been stumping for Mr. Haultain. Both sides have a host of speakers from Manitoba.

That the fight is federal and the issues federal is largely due to the Hon. Walter Scott. He can blame no one but himself. From the first he has made reciprocity and wider markets the issue. Since the platforms of the Republican and Democratic parties have been announced and no mention was made of reciprocity, the Liberals have quietly dropped that word in their appeal and substituted a cry of wider markets.

Naturally the Conservatives have countered by pointing out what the Borden government has already done for the west, and is preparing to do, such as reducing the cement duty, rushing the Hudson Bay Railway and building a terminal elevator at Fort Williams.

Mr. Haultain is also appealing to the farmers on a platform for redress of the west's grievances. He advocates the establishment of a system of internal storage elevators to relieve the grain blockade, the logging by the government of money to the farmers at low rates of interest, and the control of freight rates on railways which receive a guarantee by the government of its lands. The question of the handing over of

the public domains to the province is also widely discussed by the Conservative speakers.

The Hon. Walter Scott says that it is not an issue, as both parties now agree. The Conservatives, in reply, point out that the Hon. Walter Scott originally opposed the province securing its public domain, that he shifted his ground only when compelled by Mr. Haultain, and that to Mr. Haultain, the consistent advocate of this policy, should be the honor of securing natural resources for Saskatchewan.

## EAST AND WEST CRY.

Along with their campaign for wider markets, the Liberals have been endeavoring to stir up feeling against what they term the eastern "Big Interests." The leading Liberal paper in the province, The Regina Leader, has raised the cry that it is a fight between the western consumer and farmer, and the eastern manufacturers, the "big interests" and "that they are financing the Haultain campaign."

It recently published a cartoon representing the big interests as an octopus, with its head at Toronto, one tentacle around Ottawa, another Winnipeg and the third represented as reaching out for Regina.

The Conservatives' reply is that it is the Liberals who are allied to the big interests, and they point to the list of Liberal senators, such as Senator Edwards, Senator Cox, Senator Lyman Jones, Senator Frost, etc.

There is no province in the Dominion where the federal government has the influence it has in Saskatchewan. There are hundreds of settlers who have not proven their homesteads. Rightly or wrongly, they feel they are at the mercy of the federal authorities.

Another big factor is the foreign vote. There are not more than five ridings in the province where they have not sufficient to more than turn a close contest. The Scott government has in the past always had the foreigners. The Conservatives have now made a tremendous bid for it. If they can even break even on it, it will endanger the Scott government.

## LONDON DISCUSSES AMERICAN POLITICS

The London correspondent of The New York Evening Post believes, contrary to advice from the United States itself, that politics will surely have a disturbing effect on business in the American Republic. He says:—The success of Gov. Wilson in securing the nomination from the Baltimore convention increased the belief held here that the Democratic party may secure the Presidency this fall. In that case, the chief interest of people here will attach to the treatment of the tariff.

Concerning that question, Gov. Wilson has been credited here with the intention of reducing the tariff duties to a revenue-earning basis only. There is also a feeling that the prospects of a stirring political contest in your country must have a disturbing effect upon your trade. It is believed here that this will be a certain produce uncertainty regarding all international relations existing between Europe and the United States.

The congestion of securities continues. Some recent borrowers, notably Newfoundland and the city of Edmonton, had to increase the underwriting commission 1 to 1 1/2 per cent. in order to induce the market to guarantee the issues. Such a policy cannot long continue, as the knowledge that such high terms are offered will restrain the public from subscribing, investors knowing full well that they will be able to buy the securities at a discount later on.

British consols French rentes and German consols all established new low records this week. This indicated clearly the demand for higher interest-bearing securities and the rise in the leading lending countries. A further fall in the price of British consols is looked for here, as the sinking fund operations are likely to have only temporary effects upon the market.

London interest in your securities is still only moderate, but it is believed that it has been increased during recent weeks owing to the improvement reported in your trade conditions. Political uncertainties, however, tend to check the enthusiasm for your issues, and Europe as a whole is turning more attention to South America. In the line of speculative investments there may be development of interest here in the public utility companies of the United States. The opinion is growing in this that owing to better supervision under which their finances are conducted, such investments offer better possibilities in the United States. These investments have been neglected on this side.
