THREE KILLED ON I.C.R.

men say it was the pony trucks on the engine that gave out, sent the engine off the track and down over the embankment, piling up the baggage, mail and express cars.

OPINIONS DIFFER

Trainmen asserted today that had the front wheels of the tender gone off instead of the hind wheels, a fearful accident would have occurred. Authorities are not united in believing that the defect was only in the engine. At Grand Lake station the track turns suddenly to the left, and here it was, they say, that the blistering heat of the sun kinked the newly laid rails. People standing on the little platform at the station heard a fearful crash and saw clouds of dust. When this cleared the sleeping car and dining car were standing on the track almost before them, while the first and second class cars were in the ditch, and the baggage, postal and express car piled in hopeless confusion on both sides of the tracks.

Where was the big locomotive? Passengers quickly flicked from the train and a scene beggarly description met their eyes. The locomotive lay down the bank on the right hand side partly submerged in the waters of Grand Lake. In the mad plunge the tender was left high on the bank, the express car followed the engine and rolled down the bank on top of it. The baggage car shot at right angles down the bank, while the mail car held in leash for a time by the bar couplings, leaped high in the air and lay across the carriage road which parallels the track, and at the height of a telegraph pole from the place it left the track. Steel rails, twisted like hoops, are lying everywhere, and the roadbed looks like a ploughed field.

SKULL CRUSHED.

Driver Clarke was found in his engine, his skull crushed and his legs broken and scalded. Fireman McGill lies buried under tons of iron and steel in the water of the lake and in the mad swirl of the baggage car. Baggage Master McKim was thrown violently from side to side, and how he escaped death is a mystery, as he lay there amid flying trunks and baggage of all kinds. The tramp who lies underneath the fore trucks of the mail car, went to his death in the grand high leap of the mail car as it jumped to the highway. Around his neck is a little gold chain and some coins or medals bearing the inscription "Niagara, British West Africa." From his appearance he was a soldier, with close cropped hair and good features. He had been put off his perch at blind baggage at Shubensardie, but death stalked him as he circled the train and resumed his position as the train drew out again.

That greater loss of life did not occur might be attributed to the fact that the mail and express cars were new steel cars of recent manufacture and they stood the strain of their mad rush and tumble and all remained intact. Had it been the flimsy cars of some of the other trains every man of the crew of the postal service express car and baggage car would have been killed.

The commercial traveler hurt was Archibald Kinney of Bridgetown, N.S., who had an arm broken. No other passengers were hurt. The express messenger's name is Clyde Johnston of Chatham, N.B. He had a very narrow escape but got off without serious injury. The accident happened at 1.10 this afternoon and the train was bound from Montreal to Halifax.

MOOSE VISITS MONCTON

Moncton Transcript—A large bull moose caused considerable excitement in the western part of the city about 2.30 o'clock this morning by parading down and up Main Street and entering a number of private properties on Main Street, near Weldon. The big fellow was tramping about the yards of Messrs. H. G. Rolf and J. McLean. Mr. McLean noticed the moose and scared him away. The animal then proceeded down Main Street as far as the Brunswick House Hotel but evidently he understood that he had made a mistake for he turned about at a merry gallop and proceeded towards the Moncton Golf links. On Saturday a number of golfers who were going the rounds on the Moncton golf links noticed three moose in the woods adjoining the links and they seemed quite tame. Deer have also been seen this season in that section.

OLD HOME PURSE

A committee from the management of the Old Home Week Celebration, comprising Mayor Hooper, W. F. McManus, M. Tennant and Secretary McDade, met with H. C. Jewett, track superintendent of the Fredericton Park Association, last evening and agreed to donate a purse for a horse meet during the celebration. The meet will in all probability take place on Thursday and Friday, August 8th, and 9th. A meeting of the association will take place this evening and definite action will be taken in the matter.

STANLEY PICNIC

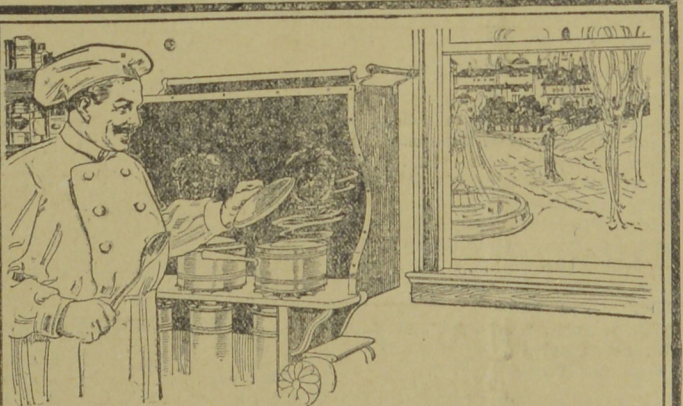
