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BIERNE HOLT

MADE GREAT WIN

AT GRAND RAPIDS

Grand Circuit Opened with Some Great Racing--Helen Stiles Beat Dudie Archdale

Grand Rapids, July 9--Biernie Holt, a four-year-old, by Cochato, came into his own this afternoon at the Grand Circuit opening by decisively beating five others that are with him in the M. & M. and an outsider for good measure.

This colt belongs to H. J. Schlesinger, a rich young Milwaukeean, who is a recent recruit of the ranks of men who can afford to own and campaign a stable of trotters, and it cost \$10,000 to own him. Last season, as a 3-year-old he was all right, but never good enough in the futurities. He was carefully wintered by J. O. Gerrity, a man of cleverness, and then named right down the line.

The time made by Biernie Holt today was not remarkable but the manner in which the colt raced showed the stuff that is in him. He was the class of his field apparently, and it included such highly regarded M. & M. candidates as Matt McKerron, Dictator Todd, Arona McKinney and Lord Guyton, while Geers started Pretwee, that he has been saving for a long while.

BIERNE HOLY LOOMS UP

Biernie Holt lost the first heat through a break but after that he merely trotted over the rest when ready and tonight he looms up in the list of the M. & M. horses for it is not thought that many of them can measure strides with him.

To the breeding crank the victory of Biernie Holt is interesting, because he is the first grandson of Bingen, and this proves that the Bings are going to be good in the third generation, as they have in the first and second.

The opening of the Grand Circuit here was a splendid success when circumstances are considered. The track did not recover from its bath until along toward noon and the weather was very unfavorable, with the air humid and intensely hot, the skies clouded and the weather man willing to bet on showers. However, the clouds lifted by the track dried and people to the number of 300 came out. They were rewarded by some excellent racing, close finishes being the order in several of the miles, and the time very good for the track.

OTHER RACES.

Next to the victory of Biernie Holt, the defeat of Dudie Archdale by Helen Stiles was the big thing of the day, and while Will Durfee uncovered a grand mare in the California trotter, it cost him \$200 to wait until the third heat before he started in to win with her.

In his work for the \$5000 pacing stake, in which he is entered, the Geers candidate, Akir, pulled up very lame, and it is doubtful if he will be right, even for the Chamber of Commerce stake. Four horses that are in the Detroit pacing classic paraded in the 2:14 pace today, and Henry H, who won money in the M. and M. two years ago and has gone back to the pace, merely romped over them when Dean was ready for him.

The Reds were handed the game on a platter the locals making enough errors to give it to them. Houlton batted Bates out of the box in the sixth inning and Walker the latest importation who comes from the Philadelphia Athletics finished the game which ended in the eighth inning to let Houlton catch the train. Walker was a trifle wild which could be expected.

TRIPLE PLAY

A triple play in the fifth inning was a bright spot in a pretty punk ball game and probably the first pulled off on Fredericton grounds. Watt filed out to Larry Conley and Willey tried to beat the throw out but was caught at the plate. Fitzgerald got the ball to third in time to catch Johnson. It was good baseball and the crowd appreciated it.

UMPIRE IN BAD

The Reds were in fair form Willey was in the box and pitched good ball Fredericton not being able to hit him effectively. In the field they also put up a good game and batted hard. Umpire Evans was on the job and signaled his return to Fredericton by putting over some decisions on the bases which the crowd thought were a trifle raw. The ump was informed of the fact too.

GAME IN DETAIL

Houlton tallied a run in each of the first and second innings but throws by Bates and Fitzgerald being the direct cause. In the third hits by Pinnamore and Iott and Watt's sacrifice netted another. In the fifth two errors by Hoyt and Willey's hit filled the bases but the triple play mentioned before pulled the team out of the hole. In the next inning an error by Bates and hits by Iott, McElwee and Willey together with Fredericton's sacrifice netted three runs. Walker replaced Bates in this inning and held Houlton down pretty hard.

Fredericton could not get away at any stage. It was one, two, three for the first two innings. In the third two bases on balls, an error and a couple of hits netted only one run. Keaney was called out at third in this inning and a big holdup was put up by Fredericton. Houlton had the locals sewed up until the eighth when Keaney and Ganley both hit safely and scored on Eke Johnson's error. By arrangement the game was called at 5.15 with Houlton at bat.

CANADIAN IN 5,000 METRE RACES

Stockholm, July 10--The final of the 5,000 metre flat race at the Olympic contests today, will rank after the 800 metres race thus far in these Olympic games. J. Rouni France, and H. Koehmainen, Finland, who secured third place, passed a wonderful struggle between them for the victory. E. W. Rutson, England, who secured third place, passed George V. Bonbag at the last moment and crossed the tape a foot ahead of the American runner. The Finlander and the Frenchman were five yards ahead of the field on the fourth lap, fifty yards on the sixth lap, 110 on the ninth lap and finished 160 yards ahead. The Finn led for seven laps but the Frenchman was a yard ahead on the twelfth lap when the Finn spurred on the home stretch and crossed the tape a yard in front of the Frenchman, who threw up his hands as though saying "I'm done."

Dave Smith, the Australian middleweight champion, has been matched to box Jack Harrison, the English champion, in London shortly.
