## WILL COLLECT BIG REVENUE FROM SUCCESSION DUTIES

Province Has Heavy Claim Against the Estate of the Late Lord Strathcona--St. John Men Left Large Estates to be Settled

The Local Government which is badly in need of funds at the present time, is likely to gather in a record breaking revenue from succession duties in the course of the next few months. Members of the present administration when in opposition used to say that it was wrong to tax "dead men's estates" but, since coming into power they have not failed to take full advantage of the law. In the year 1913 they collected nearly one hundred thousand dollars, or to be exact, \$98,049, and next year these figures will be greatly exceeded. Three gentlemen who passed away in St. John during the past month are said to have left estates which will aggregate a million and a half of dollars. Then there is the case of the late Lord Strathcona who died in England some months ago. He was a large stockholder in the New Brunswick Railway Company, which concern owns 1,600,000 of acres of timber lands in the counties of York, Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska. His interest in this property is reputed to be worth between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000, and is liable to a heavy succession duty.

Last year the Attorney General of New Brunswick was paid \$5000 for collecting succession duties and it looks as if Attorney General Clarke during the coming year will gather in at least \$12,000, in fact, he already has that amount in sight, and the fiscal year is still very young.

## ANNUAL MEETING OF THE U.N.B. SENATE BEING HELD TODAY

Concessions will be Made to Students Who go to the Front--Will ask Government for Boardman Collection

At the annual meeting of the Senate of the University of New Brunswick in the Education Office this morning it was decided to grant the same enlisting conditions as made by McGill to students who volunteer for active service with the second Canadian expeditionary force. The members of the Senior class who go to the front will receive their degrees and the juniors will be given their year so that they will be able to go on with their college work as usual if back here next year.

Dr. W. S. Carter presided at the meeting and all the other members of the Senate were present except Dr. Murray McLaren of St. John, who is now at Salisbury Plain, England, with the first Canadian contingent. The annual report of Dr. C. C. Jones, chancellor of the University, was considered and passed on to the legislature.

The financial report was submitted and some recommendations were approved of in regard to the investing of the funds. A committee composed of Chancellor Jones, Dr. Bridges and Judge Grimmer was appointed to confer with the provincial government with a view to securing for the University the Boardman collection of birds and animals, at present in one of the rooms at the Legislative Building. The Senate's annual conference with the professors is being held at the University this afternoon.
