50th ANNIVERSARY OF PERRYVILLE

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 8.—A reunion of the survivors of the battle of Perryville, which occurred just fifty years ago, on October 8, 1862, was held on the battle field today. It is a reunion of the Blue and the Gray and from far and near the old warriors journeyed to the field to mingle together in peace and exchange fraternal greetings. Many Confederate veterans of Kentucky and neighboring States were in attendance, while the army of the Blue was represented by the surviving veterans of the Eightieth Indiana regiment, which had a conspicuous part in the battle.

BIG WAR FLOAT IN THE HUDSON

New York, Oct. 8.—Fifty vessels, representing the flower of the American Navy, are riding at anchor in the Hudson River today. Nearly the half of the vessels are battleships, which vary in size from the great super-dreadnought of the Wyoming type to the famous old Ohio. In addition to the battleships there are armored cruisers, gunboats, torpedo craft, destroyers, submarines, supply ships, range ships, mine layers, hospital ships and other auxiliary vessels. The arrival tomorrow of a dozen additional battleships and a number of auxiliaries will complete the fleet, which then be ready for the greatest mobilization the western world has ever seen. On Tuesday next the great fleet will be reviewed by President Taft.

THE LATE NEVILLE J. GRANT

The funeral of the late Neville John Grant, who died from cancer of the stomach in the Victoria Hospital on Wednesday last, was held from his late home on Church Street on Friday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock and was largely attended. After a short service at the house by the Very Rev. Dean Schofield the remains were conveyed to Christ Church Cathedral where the Very Rev. Dean Schofield conducted the funeral services assisted by the Rev. Mr. Hailstone. Interment was made at Forest Hill Cemetery, Rev. Mr. Hailstone having charge of the burial service. The late Mr. Grant was sixty-three years old and was survived by a widow who was Miss Amelia Wheary of Keswick and two sons, Percy and Julius also two daughters, Eva and Annie, and one niece Mr. Henry Grant of this city.

The deceased was a temperate and industrious citizen and was a faithful employee for over twenty years of the C. P. R. His fellow employees showed the esteem in which he was held by them, by thoughtfully donating a sum of money to his family in respect to his memory. TORY CHICKENS WILL COME HOME TO ROOST

How the Ne Temere Degree was Worked
During the Last Campaign to Secure
Tory votes---Lauriers wonderful Reception in Ontario is Full of Significance

(Toronto Globe.)

What is the meaning of the great gatherings, the irrepressible enthusiasm, the overflowing meetings that have been the features of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Ontario tour? The sycophants are gone. There are no offices to attract the place-hungry. The Tory victory is still a recent thing, yet the Liberal chief receives, in the province that rejected his followers a year ago and made that victory possible, such an enthusiastic reception as falls to the lot of few men. The Mail and Empire admits that Sir Wilfrid at Chatham had "a generous reception," and adds that "Liberals and Conservatives, realizing that it was probably the last time the opposition leader would visit the Maple City, joined heartily together and received him in a friendly and cordial manner."

The Mail and Empire has not the true explanation. This is not a "last appearance" tour. Sir Wilfrid is in excellent health and spirits as well as in his best fighting form. The great crowds, the tumultuous applause, the overflow meetings indicate the rebound toward Laurier of a generous people who have discovered that they were tricked into deserting and repudiating him a year ago. The venom injected into their system by the crooked political workers who declared that Laurier was responsible for the ne temere decree, and that he was the foe of a just marriage law has ceased to work. It has been seen that Laurier had no more to do with the promulgation of the ne temere decree than the Orange Grand Sovereign, and that the Dominion parliament is as helpless to change the law respecting the solemnization of marriage under Borden as it was under Sir Wilfrid. The rebound is natural, therefore, for even in politics men do not like to be tricked and lied to.

Hon. George P. Graham did not put the case a bit too strongly when at Peterboro' he said that while the Conservatives in Ontario a year ago talked trade in the press and on the platform, the real work of the campaign was carried on by whispering into the ears of men, and women, and girls that Sir Wilfrid was responsible in some mysterious way for the decree. Some of the slanderers more impudent than their fellows, even told their dupes that he had enacted it. The impression was created all over the province that the ne temere decree affected the civil status of Protestants who had married

Catholics, and that if the Catholic Premier Laurier were displaced and the Protestant Borden were put in his place, a marriage law would be enacted by parliament that would forever prevent anyone from suggesting that Protestant women who had married Catholics were concubines and their children illegitimate.

It was in vain that the Liberals in the few cases in which the matter was publicly discussed, pointed out that marriage, in the opinion of Sir Allen Aylesworth, the minister of justice and a great lawyer, was by the British North America Act—a statute passed by the imperial parliament—placed under the exclusive jurisdiction of the provinces and that the Dominion parliament could not enact a uniform Dominion marriage law. The election was held, Borden was returned to power. One of his first acts was to show his contempt for the men who had lied him into office by appointing Mr. Doherty, a Catholic, to the office of minister of justice. Mr. Doherty, like Sir Allen Aylesworth, was entirely convinced that the making of a uniform marriage law for the Dominion was beyond the power of parliament, and must be preceded by a change of the constitution. When Mr. Lancaster brought in his marriage bill the Borden government sidetracked it by reference to the courts, and in a very short time the privy council of Britain had given judgment confirming the view of the law held by Laurier's Protestant minister of justice and Borden's Catholic minister of justice.

What followed? Did the men who had defamed Laurier declare that the fight for a uniform marriage law must go on? A few of the honest public opponents of the ne temere decree have announced that they will agitate for an amendment of the constitution. But where are the whisperers and key-hole operators? Gone; many of them into obscure public offices where they reap the reward of the most despicable campaign ever waged against a great Canadian. Is it any wonder that the people of Ontario, realizing that they have been tricked, turn to Laurier once more with the wholeheartedness of honorable men who would repair a wrong? That is the meaning of the meetings which have startled even experienced politicians by their splendid enthusiasm and enormous dimensions. It is the vindication of Laurier that we see—of the Laurier who in affairs of state is neither Catholic nor Protestant, but Canadian, thinking and striving all the time for the unity of his country, sometimes, as in 1896, against the united power of the leaders of his own church, and again, as in 1911, against men who wrongfully raised a creed issue and used Protestant sentiment for their own base purposes.

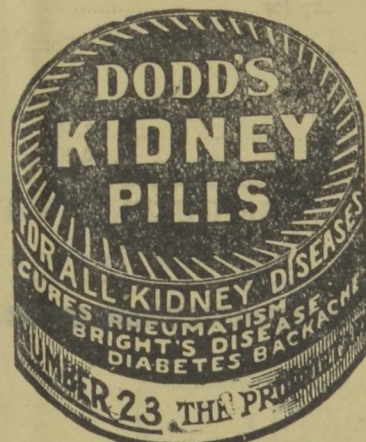
