### BIG WAR FLOAT IN THE HULSON

New York, Oct. 8-Fifty vessels representing the flower of the American Navy, are riding at anchor in the Hudson River today. Nearly the half of the vessels are battleships, which vary in size from the goeat supertreadnought of the Wyoming type to he famous old Ohio.
