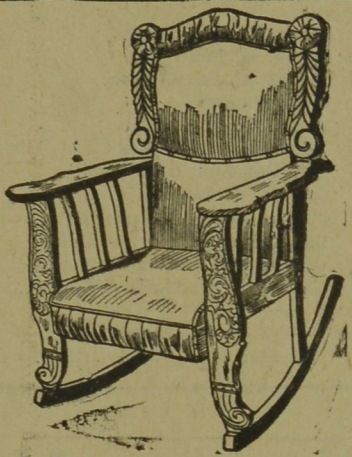

DEDICATION SERVICES AT MARYSVILLE ON SUNDAY

Yesterday was a red letter day for Methodism at Marysville as on that occasion the handsome new Methodist church was formally opened and dedicated. The first service was at 11 a.m., the preacher being Rev. Dr. Heartz of Amherst, N.S., who, with Rev. Neil McLauchlan, B.A., chairman of the Fredericton District, assisted the present pastor, Rev. Thos. Hicks, in the impressive dedication service, which was attended by large congregations.

Rev. Dr. Heartz made a good impression, his sermon being a powerful one, practical, interesting and instructive.

The second service was at three o'clock in the afternoon, the principal speaker being Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith, pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian church, who spoke in his usual able and scholarly manner.

Rev. Neil McLauchlan, pastor of the Fredericton Methodist church, was the preacher at the evening service, and was heard with much interest, he being a very pleasing speaker.

A feature of the service was the musical part under the direction of Professor Edward Cadwallader, assisted by local singers and the Marysville Orchestra, which added much to the impressiveness of the ceremony.

HANDSOME EDIFICE.

Those who attended the services yesterday had nothing but words of praise for the handsome little church which is situated in a beautiful spot overlooking the picturesque Nashwaak on the site of the magnificent edifice which was built by the late Alex. Gibson and dedicated on Sunday, January 6, 1873. On that occasion there were three services, conducted by the late Rev. Dr. D. D. Currie in the forenoon, Rev. H. McKeown, father of the present Judge McKeown, in the afternoon, and by Rev. Leonard Gaetz in the evening. Rev. Dr. Robert Wilson was pastor at the time, while Prof. Cadwallader was organist. On January 29, 1911, just thirty-eight years after, this beautiful church and splendid monument to the town's

founder, was destroyed by fire. The insurance from this magnificent and commodious structure was used to build the present church, which is not only a credit to the town of Marysville but to the Methodist people throughout the Maritime Provinces.

The new church has a sweetly-toned bell in its tower which will in the future peal out as in days gone by, and the congregation, which for the past three years has been worshipping at Oddfellow's Hall, will have the privilege of attending its own church on the hill.

DESCRIPTION OF BUILDING.

The new edifice will cost, when entirely completed, in the vicinity of \$8,500. The building has a frontage of sixty-one feet and is fifty feet wide, including the chancel for the choir. The tower at the south corner of the main building rises to a height of fifty-six feet, in which the bell weighing six hundred pounds, has been placed. The interior is admirably planned. The main audience room is fifty by thirty-five feet and finished in natural wood.

The Sunday School room is on the wing and is separated from the auditorium by folding doors, suspended on rollers, which when thrown open increase the seating capacity by almost one hundred.

The sum of \$574,509.78 was spent on permanent bridges. The bonus on timber lands collected during the year is put down at \$255,335.76. The balance of extraordinary revenue is put down at \$71,180.40, which is made up of contractors' deposits, court deposits and the balance of the federal agricultural grant.

The expenditure by the government during the year has certainly been a record breaker and it is a most unfortunate thing for the province that there is not in the legislature at the present time some men possessed of sufficient independence to make it their business to find out what has become of the money.

G. P. R. FREIGHT OFFICIALS IN FREDERICTON TODAY

H. E. Macdonnell of Montreal, assistant freight traffic manager for C.P.R. lines east of Fort William, Ont., and W. B. Bamford of St. John, C.P.R. district freight agent, are in the city today. Their visit is an official one in connection with freight rates and it is understood has to do with the new Fredericton-Norton Division and also with the St. John Valley Railway.

Rates on the Fredericton-Norton Division it is said, will take some months to arrange, as the operation is one of considerable detail. St. John already recognizes that Fredericton is the natural supply-point for the Grand Lake region as wholesalers of that city have demanded from the C.P.R. Freight Department rates to Chipman equal to those from Fredericton to Chipman. This demand is made notwithstanding the fact that St. John is about twice as far from Chipman as Fredericton is.

A PITIABLE CASE

Mr. Alfred E. Jones, who died last week has left a wife and two children in straitened circumstances. Mr. Jones had been ill for nearly three months and unable to work. Christmas week he got a job as assistant letter carrier and contracted pneumonia. In two days he was dead. Mrs. Jones, who is herself in delicate health, has no relatives in this city whom she can look to for assistance. To make matters worse, her youngest child is now ill from pneumonia.

WILL BE AN ACQUISITION.

Montreal Mail:—Hon. H. F. McLeod, the newly elected M.P. for York N.B., who is likely to move the address in reply to the speech from the throne at the coming session, will be a decided acquisition to the House. Whilst on a visit to Fredericton last year I had the privilege of meeting Mr. McLeod, who was generally regarded as next to Premier Flemming the strong man of the New Brunswick government and he impressed me then as a man who was likely to make his mark in a large sphere. A man of fine presence, a good speaker and personally popular, he is likely to become a front-bencher before many years.

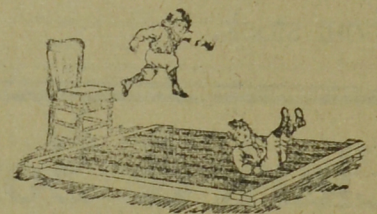
