DARTMOUTH MEN
IN FISTIC ENCOUNTER

Dartmouth, June 21—Ernest H. Hill one of the most prominent manufacturers of Dartmouth is reported to be in a very critical condition as the result of being struck by a well known business man of the town a few days ago, who is alleged to have hit Mr. Hillback of the ear and between the eyes. The blow Mr. Hill received between the eyes is responsible for his present alarming condition. Mr. Hill had glasses on at the time, and they were smashed in atoms, particles of which pierced both eyes.

Two specialists were in attendance yesterday. It was found that Mr. Hill was suffering from hemorrhages of the eyes and it is believed that he will lose the sight of both. In fact so badly injured are the eyes that there is a possibility that both will have to be removed.

BIG GAME IN THE WEST

With the expectation of antelopes and Musk-ox, British Columbia has every species of big game that exists on the continent; even the rarest of them being found in fair quantities. In addition there are wild fowl and game birds of various species some natives and others acclimatized, that furnish sport; while the waters afford the finest trout and salmon fishing in the world. In fact, the sporting possibilities are so many that it would be impossible to exhaust them in an ordinary lifetime. Some 70 miles up the river from Fort George the "Grand Canon" is reached and from there a magnificent moose country extends "as far as the little Smoky River. So far, the country has never been hunted except by a few prospectors. Whether the horn attain the large size of the Cassiar moose has yet to be determined, but some very fine heads have been seen. In this district, caribou are very plentiful on the higher plateaux, and in places both grizzly and black bear are numerous.
