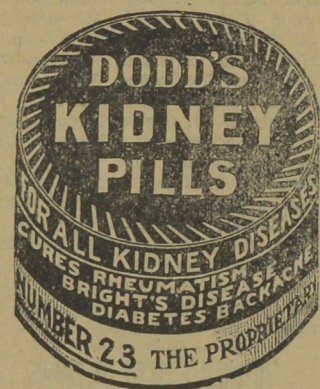

## Marathons Put One Over on Fredericton--Cram Lost His Control

New Pitcher Could not Steady Down and his Wildness was Helped out by Errors--Batted Freely by St. John as was Tarbell also--Some Good Work in Infield--Fredericton Drops to Second Place in League Standing--Coaching not up to Mark

Marathons 10, Fredericton 3. That was the sad tale of yesterday's struggle at Scully's Grove. Fredericton started out with the brightest of prospects, but they were soon dimmed. Cram's wildness was the main cause of the trimming, although errors helped to a marked degree. Cram issued four passes during the game, hit three St. John batters and forced one run. He struck out but one man. However he fielded his position nicely and got one safe hit to left field. With eight more games coming on in little more than a week he will have to be used again in a few days, and it is expected that his control will improve.

### HEAVY BATTING

Both teams batted hard and both had some nice juicy errors. Fredericton's coaching department was much to the bad. The Greeks also did a little of the "solid ivory" stuff at times. Marathons batted when hits meant runs and Fredericton threw in a few errors at critical times to help them along. The local batters were able to connect with Tarbell's shoots, but principally in the first four innings, when they were able to get only three runs on seven hits. After that the St. John team tightened up and there was nothing doing in the way of scoring. St. John started things in the fourth with the score 3 to 0 against them. Cram handed out no fewer than three passes in the inning and forced a run. A sacrifice hit, two singles and a throw to the plate of Bob Conley's that went a mile wide of Murray assisted in giving the Greeks five runs. They followed this with two more in the fifth and three in the ninth.

### FAST INFIELD WORK

The bright feature of the game was some snappy fielding. The Fredericton infield had four double plays to its credit and the Marathons had one. Cram, Fay and Wildes were prominent in the fielding. Tarbell Pinkerton did the same sort of work for St. John.

### FREDERICTON DROPS

The win of the Marathons drops the Pets from first position where they were tied with Houlton and lets the Greeks climb a little farther out of the basement. At the end of the week the league standing may present an entirely different appearance from what it now has and he is a wise man who can say what it will be.

### GAME IN DETAIL

George Winter, second man to bat for Marathons, hit safely but was run out between first and second when Cram caught him napping. This spoiled any chances in the first as Dutton fled out. In the second with one out Pinkerton drew a pass but Connelly hit into a double play when he drove the ball at Wildes. In the third each St. John batter was thrown out of first. In the fourth the sad tale was told. Cram was showing less and less control of the ball. He passed Winter, Dutton fled out to Duggan. Fryor has safely. Pinkerton sacrificed. Connelly gained first on balls Riley drew a pass and Winter was forced home. McGovern hit to left field safely. Larry Conley relayed the ball to Bob Conley and the latter made a punk throw to the plate, the ball striking Riley and he and McGovern scored. Score Marathons 5, Fredericton 3. Tarbell went out hitting to Hoyt.

In the next inning Winter with one down was safe on Wildes' error. Dutton fled and Fryor hit safely and stole second. Winter scored on Pinkerton's hit. Connelly was fielded out. In the sixth Cram, Hoyt and Bob Conley retired the side with a nice double-play. In the eighth the same thing happened with Fay, Wildes and Hoyt performing. In the last inning Tarbell and Williams both reached first by being hit by pitcher. Winter fled out to Ganley, Dutton singled to right field. Bob Conley missed the throw to third and both Tarbell and Williams scored. Fryor singled scoring Dutton. Pinkerton also singled but Connelly hit into a double play retiring the side.

innings only. Fay, the first man to bat fanned. Bob Ganley drove out one good for two bags and stole third. Duggan scored him with a sacrifice fly. Larry Conley hit safely to left field and took second on the slow handling of the ball Hoyt's single scored him. Bob Conley struck out retiring the side. There was nothing of note in the second, but in the third Fredericton scored their third and last run. Ganley was thrown out at first. Duggan hit safely and stole second coming home on an error of Dutton. After that there was no scoring.

In the fourth Wildes was caught off first and spoiled a magnificent chance as the bases were filled right afterward. "P. J." struck out however when it was up to him. Till the end of the game no Fredericton man got beyond first. St. John putting up a game that had no holes in it.
