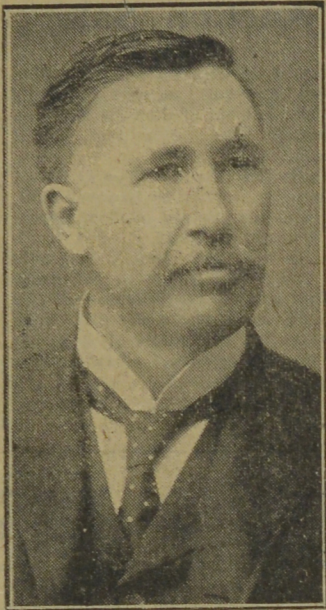
## MR. JUSTICE BARRY HONORED BY THE FREDERICTON BAR

Presented with a Congratulatory Address at Opening of the Circuit Court this Morning and made a Felicitious Reply—Slander Case Goes over until October on Account of Absence of a Material Witness

The June sittings of the King's Bench Division of the Supreme Court opened at eleven o'clock this morning. His Honor Judge Barry presiding. Among the barristers in attendance were Messrs. J. D. ## ADDRESS TO JUDGE BARRY.

Before taking up the business of the court, Mr. Phinney on behalf of the members of the Fredericton Bar, read the following address:



JUDGE BARRY

To the Honorable Jeremiah H. Barry, Justice of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick:

May it please Your Honor: This is the first sitting of the Supreme Court for the County of York at which, in the rotation of judicial assignment, you have been called upon to preside since your appointment to the Bench in June, 1909.

The members of the Fredericton Bar therefore, avail themselves of this opportunity to present to you their hearty congratulations on your elevation to the Judiciary of the province.

With the majority, if not the whole of us in the years preceding your appointment, you were engaged in the practice of the law in this city and no trials at nisi prius and arguments before the court en banc, and we take pleasure in recalling the fact that our relations as opposing practitioners and counsel were always pleasant and agreeable, and that, while careful and astute in the interests of your clients, you were ever affable, gentlemanly and courteous. These qualities were expected, therefore, to be exemplified by you as a judge towards the members of the Bar and we are gratified to be able to say that in the discharge of your duties on the Bench during the past three years we have always found you obliging, easily approachable and considerate of the demands, sometimes exacting, of the profession. The industry and legal research you gave evidence of while at the Bar have also been exemplified by you as a judge and we feel assured that by your appointment the high reputation at home and abroad gained by the Bench of this province will be fully maintained and recognized.

It was gratifying to us that by the selection of yourself as a successor to the late Mr. Justice Hanington the appointment came to a member of the Fredericton Bar and that we have a judge resident in the city whose services are so readily available to us in our practice as solicitors of the Supreme Court.

We beg to assure you that in the discharge of our duties as solicitors of the Supreme Court it will be our pleasure to render to you that respect and professional courtesy which are due from members of the Bar to the judiciary, and which with the legal research, care and industry required of the successful practitioner tend so materially to aid judges in the discharge of their responsible duties.

We wish for you a long and successful career on the Bench and in conclusion tender to you our best wishes for the happiness of yourself, Mrs. Barry and family.

His Honor in reply, stated that he thanked the members of the Bar cordially for the kind address and for the manifestation of their respect. He thought their kind remarks came from the heart rather than from the head. That he had come to the city thirty-four years ago to take up his studies of law and that the twenty-seven years spent in the practice of his profession in this city were easily the happiest of his life. His activities were largely confined to his own county and the immediate precincts and he always enjoyed the best relations with the members of the Fredericton Bar. While he always had the interest of the client at heart, at the same time he always tried to live up to the high ideals of the profession. He had been badly defeated in this very old building, but had also often succeeded, and felt at home in his environment and at home with the members of the Bar. While he couldn't measure up to the great men who had preceded him, and whose names will live when the present generation have passed away, nevertheless he would always strive to be animated by the best considerations and whether his tenure of office was long or short he would be always available to the profession and would try to reflect the highest credit on the office he was called upon to fill.

## A SLANDER CASE.

The case of George Hayes vs. Harry M. Blair, an action for slander was the only jury case on the docket and owing to the absence of a material witness for the plaintiff, had to be adjourned till October 22.

Mr. Phinney, acting for the plaintiff, explained to the court that the

## LOCAL MILITIA LEFT FOR CAMP THIS MORNING

71st York Regt. Considerably under Strength—28th N. B. Dragoons with Smaller Shortage of Men

## NEW OFFICERS WITH BOTH CORPS THIS YEAR

The staff and "A," "B," "D," "E," and "G" Companies of the 71st York Regt. left this city for Sussex early this morning to undergo their annual twelve days' training under canvas. "C" Company left Stanley last night joining the train on the I. C. R., which took the 73rd Northumberland Regt. to Sussex. "F" and "H" companies proceeded by regular C. P. R. train from St. Stephen to Sussex also.

"A" and "C" Squadrons of the 28th New Brunswick Dragoons also left for Sussex this morning at an early hour. Like the 71st Regt. the Dragoons were accommodated with a special train.

## UNDER STRENGTH

As was expected the 71st Regt. goes into camp under strength as difficulty in recruiting the companies has been encountered. This is true not only of the Fredericton companies but also of those elsewhere in the regimental district. The shortage of men is not so great as was anticipated however. The cavalry, has been able to recruit pretty well up to strength.

## OFFICERS OF 71ST REGT.

The 71st York Regt. fell in on the barrack square at 6 a. m. and marched to the C. P. R. station where their train left at 6.50 a. m. The band of the regiment about thirty strong accompanied it. The signalling section which is largely composed of qualified men was also at full strength. Lt. Col. H. F. McLeod commanding officer of the regiment will not go into camp until Thursday. Marching into camp Major W. H. Gray of Marysville will be in command. Lieut. B. Lawrence of Burt's Corner will also not be in camp until the latter part

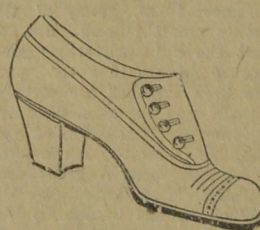
