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There are some cheap papers in the lot, but the majority of them are good quality and new styles.

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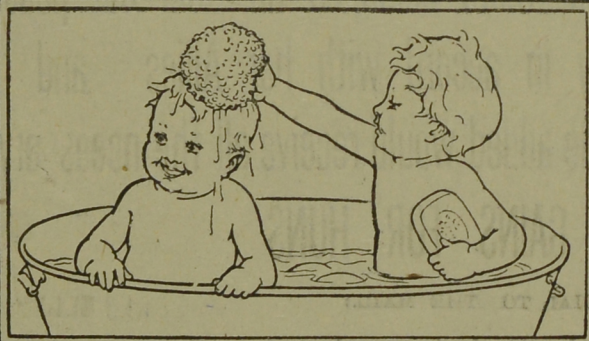

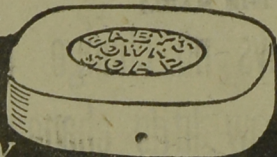

BAPTIST CHURCH HAS DONE GREAT WORK FOR MISSIONS

In the course of an able historical sermon at the Brunswick Street Baptist Church on Sunday morning Pastor Newcombe paid a tribute to the noble men and women who have gone out from the church to carry the gospel to heathen lands. He also made a fitting allusion to the great European war. He said:

MISSIONARIES TO INDIA

The relation of the church has sustained to many persons who have wrought as missionaries has no doubt contributed largely to our missionary zeal. For the personal factor is always potent. Miss Carrie A. Hammond, now Mrs. I. C. Archibald, a gifted and devoted missionary, for many years representing Maritime Baptists in India, and now serving in the name of all Canadian Baptists, was baptized into the membership of this church in 1871 by Rev. T. E. Porter, and remained a member for four years. Rev. M. D. Orchard of Bobbili, India, is one of us, whose membership in our church we cherish and whose faithful service in India as one of our number gives us gratification and joy. Miss Helen Good a missionary in Moulemein, Burma, under the Northern Baptist Convention of the United States, is a member with us, and through our interest in her and her work strengthens the bond that unites us to the cause of Missions. One of our former pastors, Rev. F. D. Crawley, became pastor in Moulemein, Burma, where for twelve years he served the English Baptist Church. Rev. R. E. Burpee, the pioneer foreign missionary from Canada, was baptized here in 1829. Rev. E. W. Kelly, D.D., received into this church by baptism in 1872 and licensed to preach in 1874, subsequently devoted himself to the service of foreign missions. Miss E. E. Gaunce, now home on furlough from India, is brought very close to us in the bonds of sympathetic ministry, our church uniting with the George Street Church in her support in the foreign field. Rev. D. Fred Currie, one of our missionaries to India, was a member of this church and superintendent of the Sabbath school. Thus through many personal bonds has the interest of our church been cemented to the ministry of the Word in other lands.

MANY BAPTIZED

The church has stood from the first for the earnest proclamation of the evangelistic message. Many or more have been added to the church by baptism in each of the following years, 1824, 28; 1825, 24; 1840, 23; 1841, 25; 1855, 43; 1858 and 1866, 20 each; 1870, 34; 1876, 69. Previous to 1879, three hundred and ninety-nine were received into the church by baptism. In the pastorate of Rev. F. D. Crawley, which covered thirteen years, two hundred and ninety-six were baptized; in Dr. E. M. Saunders' one year of pastoral supply, the number baptized was six; during Dr. Freeman's ministry of seven years, one hundred and sixty-one united with the church on confession of faith; and Dr. Macdonald baptized one hundred and forty-five thirteen years of pastoral service. In the nearly two years of the present pastorate forty-two have received baptism, thus making 1049 who have united with the church through confession of faith, not mentioning the numbers who have been received by letter; or, reckoning just the years of the century of the church's history, the number is 1007.

We can begin to estimate the Christian significance of the regeneration of these one thousand persons turned toward God during the church's century of service! Who can measure the actual value of work done for Christ by these transformed lives, or the potentiality of personality which resides in those who remain here to serve a little longer.

In one respect the evangelistic opportunity is unique, and its exceptional quality is shared by but few churches in these provinces. This particular privilege of service is occasioned by the coming to Fredericton year by year numbers of students to attend our Educational Institutions—the University, Normal School and Business College. A large number of these are Baptists. This year eighty from the Normal School alone are attending our church. Practically every year witnesses the public confessing of Christ by some of the students. They usually retain their membership with us or some years, particularly while their work occasions more or less removal from place to place; and until they become settled their names add to our non-resident membership roll. This is perhaps the chief reason why our absent membership is so large. Those names of students as well as the large proportion of our own young people lays great importance upon the conduct of our young people's work.

This from very small beginnings the church has come through the century to a place of large usefulness in the Kingdom of Christ. At

he start there were thirteen members. Now we have about three hundred resident members, and until the revision of our roll now in process completed we shall be compelled to report practically the same number of absent members. In the early days the financial problem was naturally a very difficult one; now it is matter for gratitude that we are able to render no small assistance to the work of God, as is shown by the fact that last year, our actual centennial year, our church led our Maritime Convention in denominational gifts; and this year we find only one church—that at Amherst, N.S. exceeding us in total contributions. Fredericton has the honor as it has the privilege, of having entertained the Convention of more than any other place, the convention having been welcomed here on six occasions. "The Lord hath indeed been mindful of us," and we have very reason to be assured that "He will bless us." This historical session must necessarily simply touch on the facts and features of our century's career. The limits which must be observed make it impossible to do more than indicate the currents of our life; and these limits forbid mention of details in our present organization or even of the names of all the organizations and committees, or even the names of all those who today in office are carrying responsibilities for the church, though it would be difficult to measure the value of the service rendered by the choir and by such officials as our Clerk, Deacon R. B. Wallace, and our Treasurer, Brother F. Wayland Porter.
