THINGS TO REMEMBER

The time is fast approaching when the government which has been conducting the affairs of the province for the past four years must seek a renewal of public confidence. On what ground shall Premier Flemming and his colleagues appeal to the people? Not on a truthful statement of the government's record. It is safe to assume that its principal campaign material will be a rehash of the old slanders against the former administration. No doubt the old administrations will be recalled—and unlike Premier Flemming and his colleagues the members of the old government did not claim perfection for themselves. No doubt there will be more false promises akin to the scores of pledges which were made by the present premier and his friends prior to the last election and which were broken after they assumed the reins of power. But it is safe to say that the government will ignore a number of potent facts and here are a few of them which might be handy for future reference:

An annual increase of half a million dollars in the controllable expenditures of the province.

The creation of an admitted deficit in the operations of the fiscal year 1911 of \$56,000.

The increase of the expenses of executive government, including salary increases to ministers, one of whom is the Surveyor General of \$800 per year.

The flagrant disregard for the tender system in public works and the consequent squandering of the people's money, gross favoritism in the awarding of government work whereby the local hack organ has been paid on an average \$7000 a year and other Tory papers were similarly helped with the tender system in total abeyance.

The spending of six thousand dollars on a partisan commission, one to try and find an agricultural policy for the medical commissioner of agriculture, and another to try and make a political capital against a Federal minister.

The gross violation of a solemn promise to keep the ordinary expenditure within the income.

The squandering of many thousands of dollars on the roads just prior to the Federal election of 1908, in a frantic effort to help Conservative candidates in New Brunswick.

The resort to the enactment of legislation in order to drive Liberals from office.

The carrying on of bridge work without authority from the departmental engineer on the order of Conservative members and defeated candidates.

The importation of a job lot of Kentucky spindle legged horses in order to encourage the farmers.

The display of partisanship in the dismissal of Liberal office holders in direct violation of pre-election promises that the government would know no party.

The payment of a travelling bribe of so called road superintendents and bridge inspectors of excessive amounts for oversteering work on bridges in several counties.

The giving to a powerful corporation important mining privileges for a period of eighty years for the paltry royalty of five cents a ton and without any guarantee that the ore mined would be manufactured in the province and employment thus given to New Brunswick people.

An evident desire to trundle to "special interests," and great corporation notably the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

The reduction in the size of the logs which may be cut from crown lands and the depletion of our forest wealth at a time when the cry the world over is for conservation.

The expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars over the head of the Auditor General, showing the absolute failure to put into effect any sane uselessness of the audit act.

broad, progressive agricultural policy increasing the expenses of the various departments by adding to the number of officials.

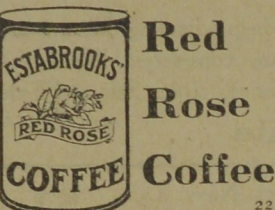
