be paid until fully investigated by the Department, I am willing to drop that matter."

The Attorney General said that the government did not wish any of the information to be withdrawn. He could see, however, no reason why a department should be blamed if certain people attempted to defraud it, and were prevented.

Mr. Veniot pointed out that the man who was said to have made the attempt in regard to the roads were also acting as foremen on bridges.

Attorney General Baxter asked if there would be any further information against any department. He did not want an investigation in connection with one completed only to find that another was required in some other department.

Mr. Carter replied that the business of investigation was no more pleasant to him than to anyone else. He had no intention of bringing forward information that he did not believe to be authentic. There was much hearsay and many stories were in circulation.

The Attorney General, then made his remarks concerning those who had been attacking various departments.

"There are certain gentlemen" said he, "who from time to time have indulged in a good deal of talk. I think that if they don't come out and make their charges that the commissioner should summon them and find out if they are speaking facts or merely hearsay. If there is something wrong, we propose to put it right or stop the mouths of those who have been going about the country slandering people."

The hearing then was adjourned till Thursday next.

**RUISSEAU CARIBOU BRIDGE**  
Parish of Shippegan, Gloucester Co.

In the item of \$42,000 for 3,000 feet Spruce Lumber, credited to P. F. Bondreau, I am informed and I have reason to believe that this lumber was never delivered by him to this bridge. That when the Bridge Structural Superintendent, Valentine Robichaud, subscribed the oath as to the correctness of this account before M. J. Robichaud, M. P. P., and Justice of the Peace, he must have known as I have reason to believe that no such lumber had been delivered by P. F. Bondreau to said Bridge.

I am informed and believe that this said M. J. Robichaud, M. P. P., was in possession of knowledge of the fact that said lumber had not been delivered when said oath was subscribed by the Structural Superintendent before him.

The said amount of \$42,000 was paid by cheque No. 41,821, dated January 9th, 1914, work of repairing this bridge was done in 1913.

The pay sheet for this Bridge for December, 1913, contains the item \$22.50 and \$30.00 paid to one Antime Chiasson. The said Antime Chiasson informs me that he only worked on said Bridge for amount of \$25.00. That he was paid the sum of \$26.00 in cash by foreman on bridge. That he never saw the cheque issued in his favor for \$52.50 and that endorsement of his name on said cheque is a forgery. Cheque is No. 41,818, issued February 16, 1914.

The pay sheets of this bridge for August, 1913, contains the name of "Edward D. Chiasson, horse and cart 1 day, \$2.00," for September "Edward D. Chiasson, horse and cart, 26 days, \$55.00," October, Edward D. Chiasson, horse and cart, 20 days, \$40.00," November "Edward D. Chiasson, horse and cart, \$15 days, \$30.00," December "Edward Chiasson horse and cart 23 days, \$45."

In all the sum of about \$170.00 was paid to the said Edward D. Chiasson. I am informed and have reason to believe that this person is only a child and at the time of repairs to this bridge was not more than ten years of age, and was attending school. He is a son of the foreman of the works.

In September, 1913, Nolasque Hachey is on pay list, 8 days as laborer at \$1.50 per day, and 26 days self, horse and cart at \$2.00 per day.

The Structural Superintendent's estimate for repairs to this bridge is \$450. The actual amount expended was \$2,366.96.

Nipisiguit Steel Bridge,  
Bathurst, Gloucester Co.

On the pay sheet for this bridge ap-

pears the name of Frank Robinson, for "\$25.00, stone for bridge." Date is August 29th, 1910.

The said Frank Robinson personally informed me that he never delivered or sold any stone for this bridge. The account is sworn to before A. J. H. Stewart, M. P. P., as a Justice of the Peace by Valentine Robichaud, structural superintendent. I am informed and believe that both the Justice of the Peace and Superintendent, had knowledge of the fact that no such stone was delivered to said bridge when the oath was subscribed to correctness of accounts. The cheque for said amount is No. 3833, dated August 29, 1910, account sworn to 3rd May, 1910. The said cheque was never delivered to said Frank Robinson, so he informs me. The said cheque is endorsed as follows: "Frank Robinson, his mark," and the endorsement, I am informed and believe, is in the handwriting of the said A. J. H. Stewart. The said Frank Robinson can read and write and he informs me that he never made his mark on endorsement of such cheque. The cheque also bears on its back the signature, "A. J. H. Stewart, witness to mark."

Gloucester County Roads.

I am informed and believe that large sums of money have been ordered to be expended and have been expended, without authority of the minister of public works.

To mention but one case out of several, I would ask that witnesses be called to show who gave authority if any, for the expenditure of nearly Seven Thousand Dollars, under special Commissioners Docithe F. Chiasson and Jean J. Robichaud on the road over Shippegan Island Barren to Lameque, and from Savot Landing towards Lameque, in the year 1914.

On pay sheet for October, 1913, appears the name of George F. Hachey, horse and cart for October 20, 21, 22 and 23 at \$2.00 per day; and on the same days he appears as laborer at \$1.50 per day.

In November the said George F. Hachey is on the pay sheet as laborer at \$1.50 per day from 3rd to 29th of month, (Sundays not included), and on the same dates he appears as laborer at \$1.50 per day.

Little Boutouche Bridge,  
Parish of Wellington, Kent Co., N.B.

I am informed and believe that the amounts appearing on the pay sheets of the above bridge for the years 1910 and 1911, opposite the names of John K. Sherridan and John Sherridan Jr. are wrongly credited and that the said person or persons did not perform the labor for which cheques were issued to him or them in payment thereof.

Also that the cheque issued for \$15.00 to Fabien Savoy, labor performed on said bridge, was never performed by the said Fabien Savoy. That the cheque issued in his favor never reached him but his name was endorsed on cheque by another individual and the proceeds thereof handed to another person.

I am also informed and believe that in the placing of the railing on the Little Boutouche River Bridge, also known as Little Boutouche Bridge, (Mouth), in the year 1914, that the Foreman, whose name appears on pay list as John K. Sherridan, is not the person who acted as such and that the said John K. Sherridan was not engaged in such work on this bridge.
