## BONAR LAW'S ATTITUDE

The Montreal Witness, which never could be classed as any too friendly to the Irish home rule movement, referring to Mr. Bonar Law's recent speech, in which the Conservative leader practically urged a resort to arms, among the Ulster Orangemen, has the following:

"It would be well for Mr. Bonar Law to take note before it is too late that he is using very dangerous material for political purposes in inciting Ulster to appeal to force, or even to make a display of force against the will of the people as a whole, as constitutionally expressed by parliament. That he justifies it by what he chooses to call the political trickery by which his opponents keep in power will not save him in the day of trouble, for anyone who is dissatisfied to an extent that moves him to deep feeling against his political opponents will be just as convinced that the policy to which he is opposed is not truly representative of the people's mind. Mr. Bonar Law's call to Ulster to resist by force is a justification so far as he is concerned of the worst aspects of the suffragette movement. If he comes to power he can never argue against their right to use violence. If he should come to power, as he claims to expect as the result of his present course and if the stability of the nation was threatened by a great sympathetic strike or a syndicate movement, he would not be in a position to rebuke the appeal to force as sedition. For the sake of hastening by a few years the return of his party to power he is in supporting threatened lawlessness putting in jeopardy the very legislation he is trying to bring about. If the poor man's food is to be taxed by him for the sake of the British landlord without resulting in a general riot, Mr. Bonar Law should be doing his very best to instill into the people submission and respect for law. The game that Mr. Bonar Law is playing is one that two can play at. If he got power and imposed a tariff law, a single speech from Mr. Lloyd George, were he so unbalanced as to make it, would, so far as can be seen, result in a refusal to pay the increased prices. In the days when kings ruled, they understood that everything possible must be done to teach respect for law and order. Without that respect their thrones had not a leg to stand on. Mr. Law now stands at the head of the party that represents wealth, privilege and land. His followers are the successors of the old royalists, and he has the same reasons for cultivating respect for authority as had the kings at whose hands they received the lands and wealth of which the people were despoiled."

W. Bramwell Booth, the new head of the Salvation Army, fifty-six years of age, having been born at Halifax, in Yorkshire, March 8, 1856. From early life he has been connected with the work of the Army and has held the post of Chief of Staff since 1880. He is also Chairman of the Salvation Army Life Assurance Society and of the Reliance Bank.—He is of striking appearance—clean-shaven, hair sparse and thin, and nearly white, stands nearly six feet in height and is of military and commanding carriage. Unfortunately, he is very deaf, and this tells against him, being reflected in the mannerisms. With the rank and file of the Salvation Army and especially among the young people, he is exceedingly popular, mainly because of his unswerving loyalty to his father and strong salvationism. For a generation Bramwell Booth has been the man at the wheel of the whole machine—the "power behind the throne." He has a hand upon the minutest particulars of the Salvation war and is acquainted with practically its every movement throughout the world. Arnold White has said of him that his services to the state in one of the great administrative departments would be well worth \$20,000 a year. Mrs. Bramwell Booth is Commissioner and Leader of the Women's Social Work of the Salvation Army in the United Kingdom.

Winnipeg Tribune.—Canada's great increase in population on these western plains is not due to protection; the people have come in spite of protection and high tariffs. ## CANADA MAY HAVE UNDER SECRETARIES

Ottawa, Aug. 22.—Sir Joseph Pope, under secretary of external affairs, who accompanied Premier Borden and his colleagues to England, will on his return submit a report to the government as to the formulation of a scheme for the creation of under secretaries of state as an aid to cabinet ministers in their sessional duties.

Sir Joseph has while in England been studying the British system, and it is considered likely that a scheme along lines in force in the motherland will be adopted in Canada.

With this ever increasing responsibility and labor of cabinet ministers the necessity of such a system has become emphasized for many years past.

The appointments will be made as in England, from members of parliament, and their duties in a general way will be to look after the lesser work of the portfolio. It is considered that such a system would very

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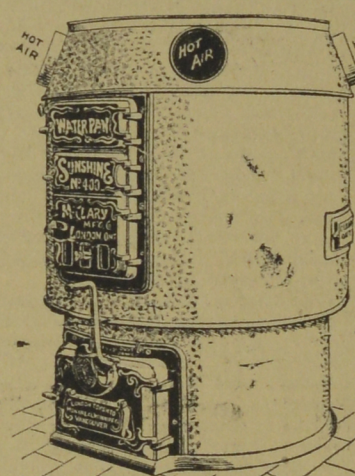
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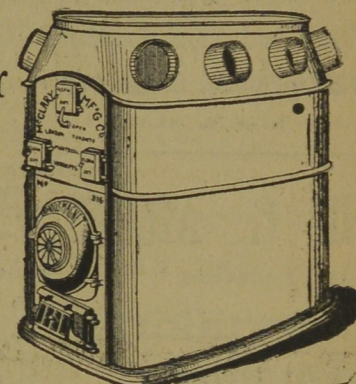
