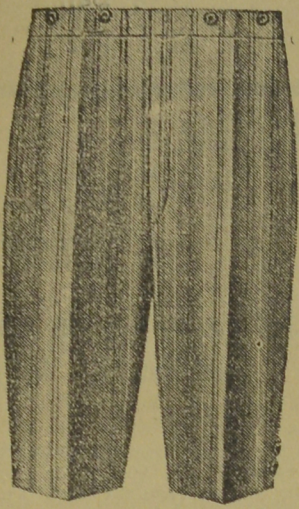

A WONDERFUL PERSONALITY

The late General Booth was "a man worth looking at," as Carlyle says of the Abbott Samson. His tall, spare form with a tangle of white hair sticking up from the brow, and beard whiter still; the huge hooked nose; the Semitic head craned forward like a vulture's; the ascetic, eager face, keen yet kindly; the blazey eyes, and long arms still lithe, make up the image of some old Hebrew prophet or law-giver.

His personality was full of paradox. Not a lettered man, not influenced by the intellectual movements of the world, not a golden-mouthed Chrysostom. Yet not a fanatic, not a man of fire, not a tremendous force—to look at. That was the mystery of the man; plain, rough, homely, yet a giant power somewhere to achieve things that dwarf the work even of John Wesley.

Opposite if not contradictory traits met like links in his character. Rough and ready speech with refined spiritual instincts; strong common sense with a blare of sensationalism; broad tolerance with narrow principles; the masterfulness of an autocrat with the simplicity of a child.

His indifference to the judgments of the world had in it a touch of genius. The General set himself to shock the world by making sensation, and he rejoiced in the storm he created. He had nothing to do with the world of proprieties and "good form." His task was to reclaim the Abyss. "My work," he said, "is to make war on the hosts that keep the underworld submerged, and you cannot have war without noise. We'll go on singing and marching with drums beating and cornets playing all the time. I would stand on my head on the top of St. Paul's cross if I thought it would bring men to salvation."

## SIMPLICITY OF HIS RELIGIOUS FAITH

Intellectualism had no place in his life. Theology he left to the schools and the churches, and "Modernism" was a word that had no meaning for him. "The religion of the Army is summed up in the two great Commandments 'Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart,' and 'Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself.'"

"As a body, the men and women who make up the total sum of our leadership are signs, evidence of the presence of Christ in our midst providing themselves to be no mean successors of the Apostles. They are sent from God to proclaim the demands of His law and the provisions of His Salvation to all who have not realized the one or experienced the other. They are pioneers of a religion that demands from them a high example of labor, of a faith that makes them gentle among the rebellious, the false, the ungrateful, and the cruel; of a love that sends them with the touch of divine compassion to the careless, the sensual, revilers, the extortioners, and that brings them down into close and intimate touch with the outcast and forlorn and heart-broken."

"And the simplicity of our creed has been, as I believe it will remain one of the principal helps to our unity. We stand for the old Truths. The faith which can be interpreted in terms of duty, of selfishness, of purity of love to God and man, is the only faith we really care about. Whatever may be the case with the select minority, the consciousness of sin, the force of evil habit, and the influence of passion, are all vivified realities with the great masses of the population. To them we bring the promise of deliverance by Jesus Christ."

"Here," we say to all sorts and conditions of men, "is a remedy for the power of evil in your nature, in your lives. Here, by repentance towards God, and faith in His Son Jesus Christ, you may find the cure of sin and the strength to live lives of purity and unselfishness. Try Him." And they do try Him, and the results are ungainly."

## DREAM OF A GREAT PEOPLE'S UNIVERSITY

When General Booth heard that Andrew Carnegie had given two million pounds sterling for the cause of international peace, he exclaimed, "Two million pounds given by Mr. Carnegie for the furtherance of international peace! What would I give for two million pounds to help us to win true peace!"

"How would I spend two millions? It is no new question to me. Year in, and year out, I have pondered upon it, wondering when an whence the millions would come. There are many schemes, so many possibilities, but all if they are to be effective must begin at the one beginning—a University of Humanity."

"There are many universities scattered about the world, universities where are taught theology, literature, languages, medicine, and all the other great branches of learning. But the university that I would see established would, for the beginning have its two centres in London and New York. It would be an institution to which the lowest, the humblest, the most degraded would be brought that they might be taught the greatest and only abiding lesson in the world. That lesson is the forgetfulness of self."

"In these universities I would give men healthy bodies by means of healthy work I would have them trained mentally, morally and physically. But I would see too, that my two millions were not spent on the few alone. Round each of my universities I would have a thousand halls, places which by their brightness would attract each their thousands."

## GENERAL'S SECRET OF LONG LIFE

General Booth loved to say that he was not an old man that he was only eighty-odd years young.

"The possibility of prolonging one's life by living rationally is far greater than most people suppose," he said. "Any one with normal health by making an effort can live if not a full century at least much longer than they otherwise would. Take myself. Had I died at 50 half of my life's work would have been left undone. People can be old but I deny it."

"What is the secret of my vitality? I will tell you. First let me say I dislike the conventional notion of associating old age with helplessness. When a man gets to be 60 or 70 he thinks he must quit work and sit in the chimney-corner or go out in the garden to play with the children. He thinks he is old, just because his family regard him as such. I deplore this idea. I believe every old person who is not physically disabled should be profitably employed. For my part if I live to be 150 I shall keep on working to my dying day."

"I myself have not lived long and actively without precautions to preserve my health. I might put my ideas in the following series of suggestions which have in a measure guided me."

"Avoid doing things which will cause your conscience to wear and tear your mind. Many people are broken down in health and made old by bad consciences."

"Cultivate cheerful spirits. It is an evidence of youth in an old person to be cheerful."

"Eat only as much as is required—wholesome food, and not poisonous luxuries."

"Sleep regularly a given number of hours in every twenty-four and don't get the habit of missing rest one night by hoping to catch up the next."

"If you are single, and can afford it get married; or if you are married and your wife is cross buy her some ribbons."

"Take recreation. By recreation I don't mean such things as golfing and cricketing which becomes a kind of work, but something more simple as romping with the children."

"Live within your income."

"Have a purpose; and to give you any genuine pleasure it must be a purpose which will benefit others."

"These rules I believe, have helped not only to prolong my life but to keep me active and I am sure they can help others."

## A FIGURE THAT WILL ABIDE IN HISTORY

The story of William Booth's wonderful life may fittingly close with a tribute to the General written not long ago by Sir H. Rider Haggard:

"When the point of time whereon we stand and play our separate parts has receded, and those who follow us look back into the grey mist which veils the past; when that mist has hidden the glitter of the decorations and deadened the echoes of the high-sounding titles of today; when our political tumults, our town-bred ex-

DR. CARMAN'S TRIBUTE  
TO GENERAL BOOTH

(By Rev. Dr. Carman, Superintendent of the Methodist Church.)

"The life and labors, the personality and achievements of General Booth of the Salvation Army I regard as one of the modern miracles, the demonstration for this age of the perpetual presence and power of God in the moral and religious forces that govern the world. Every age has had its miracles, manifestations from the Divine and the supernatural sometimes with a stronger, clearer, physical emphasis; sometimes with the more evident spiritual origin and interest. As Christ states it: 'Hitherto have ye asked nothing in my name. Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in my Name he shall give it you.'"

"William Booth saw what must be done if men low down were to be reached and raised to manhood in the restoration of the image defaced and obliterated, and with heroic, consecrated soul he did. He learned like Paul and Luther and Wesley, even in suffering and contempt that it is to ask in Jesus' name and realize the fulfillment of the covenant sealed in blood. This is the modern miracle beyond whose scope and energy humanity personally or racially has little hope."

"Few of the historic laborers in the vineyard of the Lord have been so blessed as the General in the sympathetic co-operation of the family and the home. His wife with consuming zeal, bore aloft the flaming evangel proving that the sword of the spirit is the Word of God and vindicating the right of woman by the sweet influence of the Gospel to resist the inroads and to cure the evils of sin and to seek the salvation of her people and of our human race while his children for the most part, with filial devotion, have seconded and even supplemented his efforts and borne with him his privations and conflicts in the Kingdom and patience of Jesus Christ. Irregularities there have been eccentricities and to say the least imprudences, for we are all human. When mighty forces are on this strain there are apt to be irregularities. Out from the calm stable sun and ethereal blue irregularities sometimes arise and suddenly, and sometimes they are reviving and glorious. Who today would turn back the victorious decades on General Booth's dial? Who would mar or maim the product of that stupendous energy? who would contract the compass of that high career? Rather, let us pray that the God who strengthened and led him to multiply many fold the fruit of his toil, Jehovah's triumphant prophets are not so numerous that we can afford to reckon them at a disadvantage, any more than we can afford to discount and dishonor the Scriptural and inspired Truth."

## HONORS FOR OLYMPIC ATHLETES

New York, Aug. 23—All of New York, or at least all of the large proportion of its inhabitants who take an interest in sport and athletics, is agog in anticipation of the great demonstration to be given here tomorrow in honor of the American athletes who carried the Stars and Stripes to victory in the recent Olympic games at Stockholm. The final arrangements which were completed today indicate that the demonstration will be one of the most notable affairs of its kind ever witnessed in Gotham. Everyone, from the mayor of the city down to the smallest pupils in the public schools, appears interested in the celebration. Broadway, from Forty-second street to the City Hall, is being handsomely decorated with flags and bunting for the parade which will be the leading feature of the demonstration of welcome.

What is going to become of the Salvation Army when you are dead?' My answer to this is simple. I wouldn't be foolish indeed, if, after building up a great organization, I did not take the necessary steps toward its perpetuation. I would be lacking good business sense if I had not already made all the preparations that the best legal skill could devise. All these preparations are made."
