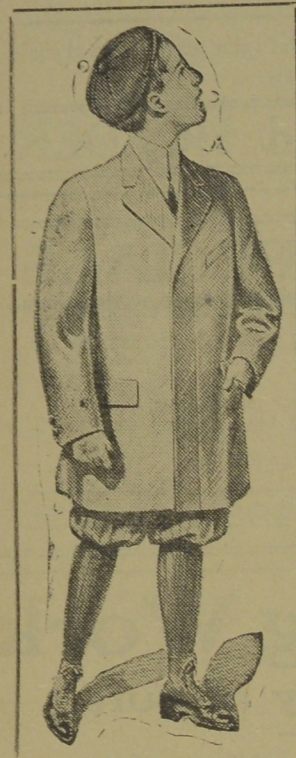


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Federicton Strengthens Grip on First Position Woodstock Beat Greeks

Houlton Lost Here Yesterday 5 to 2 in Good Game
---Pitchers Both Put up Great Ball---Hard and Timely Hitting by Pets and Errors by Reds Told Result---Marathons Shut out at Woodstock

Duggan's Pets gave Houlton a decisive walloping at Scully's Grove yesterday afternoon and it looks as if Federicton will stay at the top of the heap until the end of the chapter unless there is an unexpected slump. The score Thursday was 5 to 2. Houlton errors at critical moments and some heavy hitting by the home team when it did the most good told the tale.

Harrington and Martini were the pitchers. For the Reds Martini pitched a good game and with better support might have won his game. He had nine strikeouts to his credit and took his fielding chances without an error. Neither he nor Harrington did anything at the bat however. The Federicton twirler pitched a steady game and was well backed up, only one error doing much damage. There was a good sized crowd on hand and the teams put up a first class game.

HOULTON'S SCORING.

Houlton's runs were both scored in the third inning. In the first but three Houlton men faced Harrington. In the second Watt started off with a two-bagger but was caught at third. Hughes hit safely and Martini was safe on a choice. Things looked rosy for the Reds but McElwee flied out and Hammond was thrown out by Wildes. In the third Finnamore went, out Wildes to Hoyt, but Joe Neptune hit safely. Johnson drove one at "Hannah" Hoyt that the elongated first-sacker let get away from him. Johnson was caught off the bag however. "Biddo" Iott followed with a single and Watt with a two-bagger and two runs were tallied. During the balance of the game not a Houlton man reached second.

HOW FREDERICTON WON.

P. J. Duggan scored Federicton's first run in the first inning, drawing a pass, stealing second and scoring on Neptune's error. In the third Martini generously passed Ganley and Duggan but Bon Conley struck out retiring the side. Larry Conley started the third in joyous style, rapping out a third-base hit. Hoyt flied out but Fitzgerald came to time with a two-bagger, scoring Conley, but was thrown out at third by Martini. Wildes was passed and Harrington was safe on choice, but Keaney struck out and the score remained tied. In the fifth the Reds almost went up in the air. Iott and McElwee had two errors apiece which left Ganley and Duggan safe. Bob Conley sacrificed and Larry Conley brought in two runs with a single. He stole second and scored on "Hannah" Hoyt's hit. Fitzgerald was safe on choice but Wildes flied out. In the sixth Ganley got a hit and stole second but died there. After that Houlton tightened up and no Federicton man got beyond second. Woodstock, Aug. 22.—Playing in steady style, Woodstock experienced little trouble in defeating the Marathons this afternoon by a score of 5 to 0. The fans went away thoroughly satisfied with the work of the locals. There was good cause for their satisfaction for Winter's crew played with plenty of life and dash.

Hanley pitched a masterly game and was supported in faultless fashion. Callahan also distinguished himself. He is somewhat lame but Capt. Winter allowed a runner in his place in the first inning, which concession was warmly applauded by the crowd and demonstrated the difference in the make-up of ball players, as Iott refused to allow a runner in the game Tuesday.

Winter pitched well and worked consistently all through the game, but his support was ragged at times. O'Donnell appeared in a Marathon uniform and his debut was hardly a success, as Hanley had him at his mercy all through the game, and his batting is his big hold. However, he played his position well.

Riley and White had a collision that put White out for a few minutes but he recovered and continued in the game. Delano and S. White umpired and the latter was in hot water two or three times, his team-mates not approving of some of his decisions. This sort of umpiring is very unsatisfactory and it is about time something was done towards filling the position. Warwick, who accepted Woodstock's offer, was expected here today, but did not arrive. Federicton plays here Saturday.

BILLY BURK LOWERED RECORD AT ROCKINGHAM

Placed Figure at 2.07 3-4 for Trotters
---Baden Won 2.10 Trot Deuchester the 2.14

Salem, N. H., Aug. 21.—Not before this summer have the Grand Circuit horses paraded in front of so many people as this afternoon. Rockingham surely came into its own today, and its attractive racing program, the best ever given in New Hampshire, drew an enormous crowd. The sport furnished by the trotters and pacers was very interesting, but the sight of the thousands spread over the expansive lawn and filling the huge grandstand watching it was worth going a long way to see.

The trotters were the headlines, the free-for-allers, the infants and the stake steeds trying for the \$5000 Granite State purse appearing. Billy Burk continued his winning campaign, Lord Allen was the fastest of the babies and Baden increased his lead as the foremost winning trotter of the year. The fillers in on the card were a 2:19 pace, won by Susie M, the 2:14 trot taken by Deuchester and a race for trotters under saddle won by Sterling McKinney.

Billy Burk placed the trotting record for Rockingham Park at 2:07 3-4 in the first heat of the free-for-all. Geers started the M. & M. winner of 1911 in place of Dudie Archdale, as he thought the Memphis stallion would step the soft footing better than the little black mare. Anvil trotted a capital race, but the horse from famous Stony Ford Farm always had the edge on him. Lon McDonald has the son of Silent Brock mannered to perfection and his path in the fast trots seems to be rather smooth.
