HOW BRITAIN FLOURISHES UNDER FREE TRADE

(Halifax Chronicle)

Great Britain continued to be ruined by Free Trade at about the same rate as heretofore, at a rate which all true Britishers hope may continue. With a population of forty-five millions, last year she sold to the outside world goods to the value of \$2,785,116,000, and this after retaining more complete control of her home market in manufactured products than did any of her competitors. The second great exporting nation was Germany, whose exports were \$2,025,425,000, and whose population is rapidly nearing the seventy million mark. The United States is a close third with sales abroad aggregating \$2,013,454,000, the population being ninety-two millions and natural resources so vast as to make those of the British Isles a mere drop in the bucket, a negligible quantity in comparison. Britain is easily holding her position of supremacy in export to foreign nations, and doing very much more than this in regard to Colonial trade. To China last year she exported sixty-two million dollars worth, to the United States nineteen millions and Germany's sixteen millions. To India the two latter countries sold eleven millions and seventeen millions respectively as compared with Britain's \$261,000,000—two crumbs to a loaf. While Canadian British trade is much less than that between this country and the United States—geographical proximity and demand for the peculiar raw materials of American production—yet that trade is a flourishing one and is twenty times that of Germany. While Britain no more monopolizes or so nearly monopolizes the export trade of the world in manufactured goods as she did throughout the first three quarters of the nineteenth century, other competitors with vaster natural resources and greater population having arisen yet her superiority is amply secure and only secure because of her enormous and free imports of food to sustain her workers and of raw materials to sustain her tremendous industries. Let her food and her raw materials once become costly and her superiority is at an end. And her people live better than those of the highly protected nations on the Continent. A few weeks ago, one of the most eminent statisticians and economists in Europe, a German, Dr. Carl Von Tyska, published a comprehensive work comparing the condition of German labor with that of other European nations. His figures, carefully collected and compiled, show that the British workmen earn 25 per cent. more than the German and 36 per cent. more than the French. Furthermore, he shows that the price of the necessities of life are 15 per cent. higher in Germany and 18 per cent. higher in France than in Britain. In other words, the German workmen is 10 per cent. better off than the French, while he of Britain is 60 per cent. better off than his

Galle confrere.

No one for a moment will contend that the British toiler is too well paid, or even sufficiently paid, considering conditions of life, but it is very evident that the erection of a high Protective Tariff would not bring improvements, since both the continental nations named have tariff walls "as high as Haman's galloes." Germany having what is claimed to be the most scientifically adjusted scale of duties in the world. And the fact that these countries are making progress, even under High Protection, is no proof that they would not make equal or greater progress under law tariffs or Free Trade, or that the adoption of Protection by Britain would in any manner increase her prosperity. If the United Kingdom is being ruined by the absence of duties on Imports, then her "ruin," is very satisfactory compared to the "prosperity" of her European rivals.

CHEAP FARES TO TORONTO EXHIBITION

In connection with the Canadian Exhibition at Toronto which will be held this year from August 24th until September 9th, the Intercolonial Railway will give very low excursion rates which will give the opportunity to many to visit the "Queen City" on the occasion of its great annual fete.

The Toronto Fair is the largest and most attractive of annual exhibitions in America, and this year new permanent buildings have been constructed and its extensive boundaries enlarged by new boulevards.
