RECORD PAYMENT OF TAXES DURING DISCOUNT PERIOD

Complete Returns not Prepared but Amount is Expected to be About \$55,000---Greater Than Last Year

RUSH YESTERDAY AT CITY TREASURER'S OFFICE

The period for the securing of the customary five per cent. discount on civic taxes expired yesterday and as usual there was a rush of taxpayers to the office of the City Treasurer yesterday for the purpose of securing the advantage of the discount. The office of the treasurer has been open during the evenings of the present week to afford an opportunity to all taxpayers to pay before the time-limit expired. City Treasurer Perkins and Collector Rutter are engaged today checking up the returns and although unable to give definite figures this morning the treasurer stated that the sum paid was the largest on record and would exceed that paid during the discount period of 1911 by several thousands of dollars.

Last year the amount paid before August 22nd was \$51,000. This year the amount paid in before that date is expected to be well up to \$55,000. The total assessment is \$87,000.

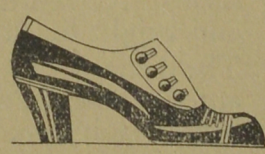

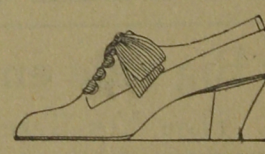
