With Oranges

ORANGE SALAD.
Cut off the tops of large oranges. Carefully remove pulp. Mix pulp with an equal quantity of sliced bananas and one-half the quantity French dressing. Place in orange shells. Chill thoroughly and serve with toasted crackers.

ORANGE ICING.

Put one running over tall-spoonful of strained orange juice in a bowl, one teaspoonful of lemon juice and one teaspoonful of sherry wine or brandy, with the grated yellow rind of one small orange; let it stand for twenty minutes, then stir in half a teaspoonful of confectioner's sugar, then the slightly beaten yolk of one egg; stir, now add sufficient confectioner's sugar to make it to the consistency to spread easily over the cake it should not run; spread evenly, then put in a cool dry place to stiffen.

This icing will be rich and creamy, never becoming "rocky," like so many people make. If cake is rubbed on the edge with sugar the icing seldom runs off the sides.

ORANGE PUDDING.

Take two eggs, two-thirds of a cupful of sugar, grated rind and juice of one large orange, one pint of milk, one tablespoonful of butter four tablespoonfuls of breadcrumbs. Beat the eggs until light and add sugar and orange juice. Scald milk and add butter and pour over the crumbs and add to the eggs, sugar and orange juice. Mix well and bake slowly and serve very cold.

SEES TWO YEARS MORE OF WAR

New York Sun.)

Whitney Warren, the American architect, returning to New York recently after audiences with the three chief men of the French war regime—President Poincare, General Joffre and General Gallieni—said that there was no likelihood of peace inside of two years.

The view that "nibbling" with intermittent great drives must go on for two years more was expressed by General Joffre and is the prevailing opinion, Mr. Warren said, among the French officials and military men.

The views of the foremost Frenchmen as interpreted by Mr. Warren are entirely at variance with the cheerful expectations of the Ford peace argosy, that left New York on Saturday, anticipating a hastened peace through conciliation. The commander-in-chief was never so confident of victory, of wearing Germany down and of a forced withdrawal of German troops from Belgium and Northern France as when Mr. Warren saw him at his field headquarters.

"There never was a man more confident of the favorable outcome of a great issue than General Joffre," said Mr. Warren. "He is absolutely calm and self-possessed and unworried. And he, together with other chief military men and officers of the French government, regard the talk of an imminent peace as something of a joke, if a ghastly one, in view of the sacrifices that must yet be made."

Mr. Warren came aboard the French liner La Fayette, returning from a visit to many French cities to survey and report on what he called the "architectural atrocities" of the war. Chiefly the Rheims Cathedral has engaged his attention. Of this ruined monument Mr. Warren said:

"The carcass is there but it will never be possible to put back the carvings and figures. They are damaged beyond repair."

The architect spoke ruefully of cathedrals in other cities, which the French for reasons of absolute military necessity, had found it necessary to destroy.

Mr. Warren answers the question as to the preparedness of France for two years more of war by saying:

"Mentally, physically and financially, France was never so great as now. One evidence of this may be found in the fact that the people themselves have subscribed to five billion dollars of the last French loan."

"President Poincare, General Joffre and General Gallieni were unanimous in their expressions of confidence in the outcome and in expecting a long struggle between now and victory. Each of them expressed his appreciation and gratitude for the work of Americans in war relief and for the nation's sympathy in the struggle."

LANCE CORP. DARCUS WINS PROMOTION

A recent letter received by Mrs. Charles W. Darcus of Fern Hill from her husband Lance Corporal Charles W. Darcus of the machine gun section of the 26th Battalion states that he has been promoted to the rank of Corporal and has been transferred to the army headquarters in France. Corporal Darcus who is an Irishman by birth and is one of six brothers serving in khaki. He is a son of Solomon Henry Darcus, grandson of Lieut. Col. Darcus B.L., D.L., and grandnephew of Admiral Lucas, who in 1854, gained for himself and the Royal Navy, the honour of winning the first V. C., by dropping overboard a live shell from the deck of his ship H. M. S. "Hecla."

Corporal Darcus is a keen athlete being at one time the champion hockey goal keeper of all Ireland. He has been in Canada for the last few years, and though he had no previous military training he volunteered for overseas service with the 26th New Brunswick Battalion, in November 1914, being then 21. This battalion went overseas in June 1915, and shortly before leaving Corporal Darcus married Anna Naomi Staveley, daughter of the late Jones Hodder Staveley, B. A.,

one of Ireland's cleverest barristers-at-law, and great granddaughter of the late Captain Robert Grier, a celebrated Peninsular and Waterloo veteran, and cousin of the late Col. Charles W. D. Staveley, C.D., A.D.C., to the Duke of Cambridge.

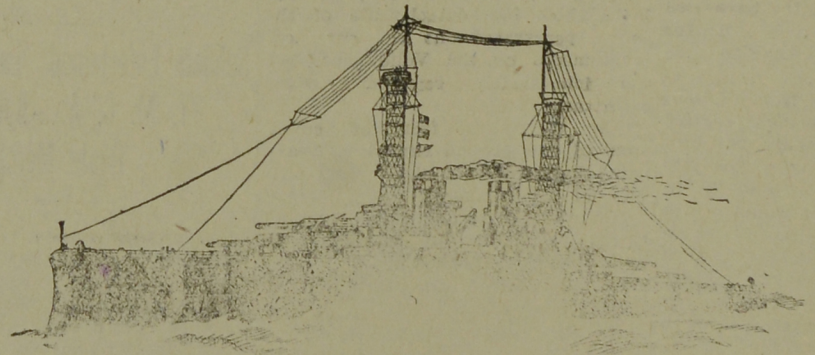
