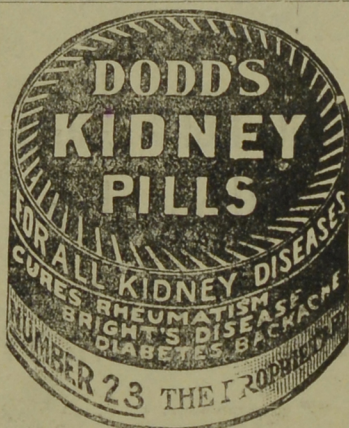

A "First Aid" List For The New Bride

"You know I told you that I was compiling a book of useful knowledge for my little friend Betty Best. Here is my page on weights and measures. How is that for first aid to the ignorant?" Mrs. Happy Homemaker held up a closely typed sheet.

"In Betty's previous experience a cup had no connection except as a receptacle for tea, coffee and such; but now that she has adopted the profession of home-maker and cook extraordinary and plenipotentiary to her Tom, she must have more expert information.

"Of course these things are a, b, c to the usual readers of cook books and makers of recipes, but for a beginner like Betty I know it will be helpful to have this condensed list to which she may turn.

"So here it is:

"One-half kitchen cupful equals one gill.

"One kitchen cupful equals one-half pint or two gills.

"Four kitchen cupfuls equal one quart.

"Two cupfuls of granulated sugar equal one pound.

"Two and one-half cupfuls of powdered sugar equal one pound.

"One heaping tablespoonful of sugar equals one ounce.

"One heaping tablespoonful of butter equals two ounces or one-quarter cupful.

"One cupful of butter equals one-half pound.

"Four cupfuls of flour (one heaping quart) equal one pound.

"Eight round tablespoonfuls of dry material equals one cupful.

"Sixteen tablespoonfuls of liquid equal one cupful.

PROPORTIONS TO REMEMBER.

"Four eggs to one quart of milk for custards.

"One teaspoonful of vanilla to one quart of milk for custard.

"Two ounces of gelatine to one and three-quarters quarts of liquid.

"Four heaping tablespoonfuls of cornstarch to one quart of milk.

"One even tablespoonful of baking powder to one cupful of flour.

"One teaspoonful of soda to one pint of sour milk.

"One teaspoonful of soda to one pint of molasses.

"One teaspoonful of baking powder is equal to one-half teaspoonful of soda and one teaspoonful of cream of tartar.

"In preparing for baking, mix dry materials in one bowl and liquids in another, combine them quickly and put at once into the oven.

"The oven for baking bread should be hot enough to brown a teaspoonful of flour in five minutes. For biscuits it should brown in one minute.

"Rubbing a pie-crust with butter a few minutes before it is time to take it from the oven will make it crisp."

Inexpensive Window Curtains

There are many inexpensive materials which have been utilized for window curtains with surprising success. One woman hung curtains of cheesecloth, trimmed with narrow cotton fringe. Another is using cream-colored seersucker, also finished with this narrow cotton fringe. The advantages of the latter material from the laundress's point of view are many, since the curtains will never need to be ironed.

Unbleached muslin has numerous possibilities. One made-over farmhouse has in the rooms on the ground floor, sash curtains of this muslin, on which squares of Persian figured calico or print have been stitched at intervals, just suiting the old-fashioned small pane windows. For a blue dining-room or one with quaint Dutch doors and windows, unbleached muslin would be charming with the mixed red and blue cotton fringe.

Pretty bed-room mules can be held in place by attaching silk elastic to fit over the instep. This elastic is stitched on each side of the narrow part of the sole. The elastic can be made a very decorative feature of the silk, satin or ribbon mules. The silk elastic may be ornamented with tiny ribbon roses, sewed at regular intervals across it. Ordinary elastic may be covered with narrow ribbon, gathered over it with a narrow Valenciennes edging on each side.

Less expensive mules may be made of cretonne. If this material is selected, plan silk elastic, of a color harmonizing with the cretonne, should be used for the instep strap. The sole of the slipper and the toe should be lined with the same color of satin. The lining will improve the appearance of the mules and also give more stability to them.

Simonds, publicity commissioner, or to the Fredericton branch of the Bank of Commerce with the name, regimental number, regiment, etc., to which your friend belongs and the Overseas Club will attend to the addressing, packing, shipping and deliveries. In each package they send a postcard upon which they type-write the name and address of the individual soldier, so that the soldier

We appeal to our readers to give all they can spare to this fund for judging by letters coming back from the firing line, our boys need the smokes and need them badly.

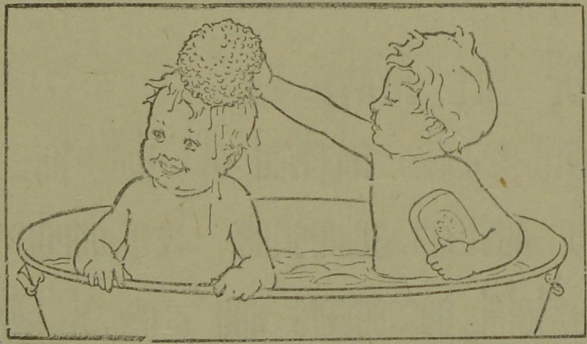

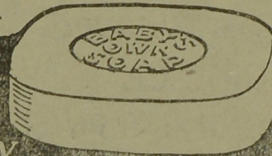
