According to the evidence brought out at the inquest it appears that Gravel is a blacksmith, has been twice married. By his first marriage he had three children, who are all married, and were absent at the time of the fire, two of them living in Bedford, Maine.

Gravel's second wife was a Miss Dreton and it was at the house of her parents that the couple were playing cards on the fatal evening, Contrary to the general opinion the nouse where they were spending the evening was only a few yards away from Gravel's own residence.

Gravel and his wife left their home about half-past seven. About halfpast nine they heard a peculiar noise and on going to the door they saw that their house was on fire and ran through a window he sought out to the rescue.
