SAD SCENE AT ST. BERNARD, QUEBEC

St. Bernard, Que., Oct. 5.—"My lot is like that of Job. I was happy and prosperous. I had a good wife and a large family, a comfortable house. Now everything that I had has been taken away from me. It is the hand of God. Blessed be His name."

These were the words uttered by Mr. Alexandre Gravel, of St. Bernard, County Dorchester, whose ten children were burnt to death with no more chance of escape than rats in a trap, while their parents desperately endeavoring to rescue them were driven back again and again by the fury of the flames.

All that remains of the children was now laid within the narrow compass of a little coffin and this was scarcely more than half filled at that. From time to time the bereft father passed his hand with a soothing and caressing gesture over the little charred bones. It was a sight as pitiful as almost intolerable for the bystanders to witness.

Most of the bones were charred beyond recognition. Only in the case of the little baby of a year and a half was it possible to ascertain to whom the charred remains belonged.

As he passed his hand over these distressed father said, "that is all that is left of my little Simon, my poor little baby."

Then contrasting himself with the sobbing mother, he said, "I am not crying. I do not think that I am capable of crying. Is it that I have no heart, or that my pain is too heavy for me to realize? Even now I cannot grasp the fact that all my children are gone. I keep expecting that I shall hold them in my arms again. But no—they will never come again, never."

But by and by the pent up grief found relief in a flood of tears and the strong man sobbed as though his very heart would break.

Nor was the grief of the stricken mother weeping for her children any less poignant. "If I had only one left to kiss," she cried. "But there is not one left of them all, not even my little baby."

The inquest was held. Dr. Bernier of St. Anselme, officiating as coroner. The jury returned a verdict ascribing death to asphyxiation and imputing no blame to anyone.

According to the evidence brought out at the inquest it appears that Gravel is a blacksmith, has been twice married. By his first marriage he had three children, who are all married, and were absent at the time of the fire, two of them living in Bedford, Maine.

Gravel's second wife was a Miss Drexton and it was at the house of her parents that the couple were playing cards on the fatal evening. Contrary to the general opinion the house where they were spending the evening was only a few yards away from Gravel's own residence.

Gravel and his wife left their home about half-past seven. About half-past nine they heard a peculiar noise and on going to the door they saw that their house was on fire and ran to the rescue. Gravel tried two doors out was compelled to retreat before the fire after the doors had been smashed in. He came out nearly choking with smoke and said to his wife that there was no hope of saving anybody or anything.

Notwithstanding this Gravel made another frantic effort to save his

CRAZED BY JEALOUSY KILLED HIS WIFE

Calgary, Alta., Oct. 7.—Crazed through jealousy and inability to effect a reconciliation with his wife, John C. Davis, a realty operator, fired three bullets into her body, killing her instantly, seriously, if not fatally wounding Miss Mabel Dixon, a private detective, and then ended his own life shortly after seven o'clock last night. The tragedy occurred at Miss Dixon's apartments. The triple shooting was the culmination of troubles covering a period of more than a year. Unable to convince himself of his wife's fidelity, Davis employed a detective to follow her about the city and to furnish him with detailed reports of her actions and the places she visited. Sympathy for the woman prompted Miss Dixon to betray her trust and later she brought Mrs. Davis to her home to live. Driven into a state bordering on insanity by separation, Davis followed his wife and secured apartments in an adjoining house. From a window of his room he could obtain a view of the apartment occupied by Mrs. Davis and for three days and nights kept up a practically constant vigil. Pleadings and promises were of no avail and in despair he sought the services of Rev. J. C. Sycamore. Efforts of the clergyman to reunite the couple proved fruitless. Davis went to the apartment of Miss Dixon Sunday evening. Inmates of adjoining rooms heard him pleading with his wife to return to him, and the shooting followed.

STUDENTS CHEER FOR LAURIER

Toronto, Oct. 7.—"We want Laurier," was the cry of the Varsity students and their visitors from McGill, at the Rugby match, at the Varsity Oval on Saturday afternoon when they recognized the tall figure of their distinguished visitor.

Sir Wilfrid with his colleagues, after luncheon proceeded to the Oval to see the game, which the ex-Premier watched with keen interest. It was not known that he was to attend the match, as the Chief desired to have a quiet afternoon after his tremendous exertions of the week.

Escorted by President Falconer of the University of Toronto, Sir Wilfrid, Hon. Sydney Fisher and other members of his party arrived at the grounds after the match was well under way. Such was the interest in the game that the arrival of the distinguished visitor passed almost unnoticed and they were able to watch the game undisturbed.

Later, however, when they started to leave the grounds the crowd immediately recognized the "White Plumes" of the Liberal leader, and a cheer started which speedily grew in volume, until it rolled through the grandstand, and Sir Wilfrid who was obviously delighted at the warmth of his informal reception, was compelled to doff his hat and bow several times.

A few minutes later the under graduates' bleachers recognized Sir Wilfrid and raised a big cheer, which speedily took definite form in a chunderous shout of "We want Laurier," chanted with sonorous rhythm. As Sir Wilfrid's carriage proceeded, a delegation of students crossed over and begged the ex-Premier to come to the bleachers and say a few words to the boys. This, however, the Chief was compelled to decline and after a few words to the delegation and shaking each cordially by the hand, he left the grounds, followed by the enthusiastic cheers of the students and the rest of the crowd.

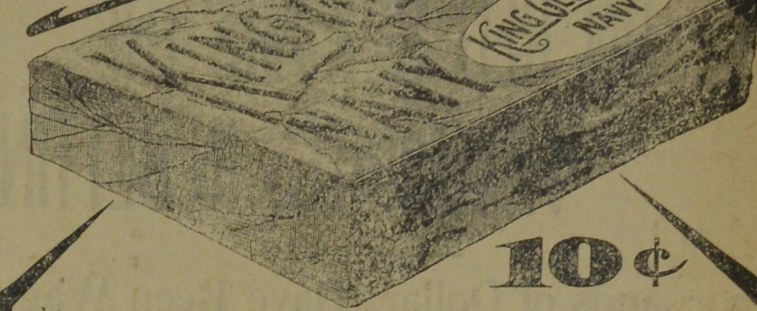
