Joe Wood's Record Best in Thirty-Seven Years

His Percentage is 87.2
Highest Ever Made in
American League—
"Wild Bill" Donovan
Made in 1907—In 1875
A. G. Spalding for Boston
Made Record Percentage of 89.9

When Joe Wood of the Red Sox won his 34th game at Philadelphia last week he established a pitching record that has not been equalled in the big leagues for 37 years, and never in the American League—by men pitching 25 or more games.

Wood finished the season with a percentage of .872. The highest previous mark attained by an American League pitcher was .862, reached by "Wild Bill" Donovan in 1907, and the only other pitcher in that organization ever to pass .800 was Charles "Chief" Bender, who in 1910 gained a percentage of .821. In 1875 A. G. Spalding, pitching for Boston, made a mark of .899.

Eddie Plank of the Athletics finished the year in second place among the American League pitchers with a marking of .812. Jack Coombs, also of the Mackmen, is third; Walter Johnson and Bob Fothergill of Washington come next. Baskette of Cleveland is sixth, and then comes Charlie Hall of the Red Sox. Larry Page of Boston is eighth, Hugh Bennett is 10th, Ray Collins 12th and "Back" O'Brien 13th.

At the other end of the list is no less a celebrity than "Old Fox" Griffith, who, after piloting his Senators through by far the most successful season they have ever known, went into the box long enough on the last day of the season to let Hal Chase of the tail-end Highlanders rap out the home run that wound up the year for Washington and Clark Griffith with a defeat.
