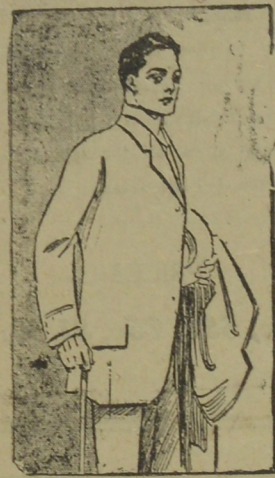

Yacht Patricia Defeated Michigan at Chicago--Each now has one Race Apiece

Chicago, Aug. 12--Patricia, the Canadian challenger for the Richardson trophy emblematic of the sailing yacht championship of the Great Lakes, today won the second race of the series of five with Michigan, the American thirty-foot sloop, each yacht now has one race to its credit. Michigan having been the victor Saturday. The race was three laps around a triangle of about four and a half miles. Patricia was better handled and crossed the finish line in 3:24.20. Michigan's time was 3:25.54.

While the yacht race was being sailed the hydroplane, Baby Reliance, the entry of Commodore Stewart Blackton, of the Motor Boat Club of America in the coming free-for-all motor boat championship race, sank during a trial spin. Baby Reliance was raised but will be out of the race. Commodore Blackton has sent to Algonac (Mich.), for Baby Reliance II, a twenty-foot hydroplane, and for Baby Reliance III, which in an unofficial trial at Davenport (Iowa), last month, showed a speed of 53.7 miles an hour. These hydroplanes will reach here in time to compete Wednesday in the free-for-all race.

JOE JACKSON CLIMING IN AMERICAN BATTING LIST

Ty Cobb Still Leading by Big Margin--Speaker a Good Second--Zimmerman Still Batting Leader of National League Although Sweeney is Pressing Him Hard

Joe Jackson's was the big man of the week in American League batting circles and so often did Joseph find the ball in the seven days of play that he has again become a formidable contender for Tris Speaker's second-place honors.

In 32 times at bat last week he averaged for the week being .625 and his mark for the season going up 21 points, or from .367 to .388 in a single week. Joe's hits were often of the hard kind, too, four-baggers and two three-baggers being mixed in with 14 singles.

Ty Cobb of Detroit, was not feeling very well last week, and when the NATIONAL LEAGUE Red Sox pitchers got through with him in the first two games of the series on Thursday and Friday, Ty felt still worse and kept out of the game Saturday. In twenty times at bat last week Cobb made only six hits batting for an even .300 and lowering his season's average from .429 to .423.

Tris Speaker of the Red Sox increased his average from .391 to .395 getting 13 hits at Cleveland and Detroit.

Annie Kphl and Queen Worthy come together again in the \$2000 2:17 trot on Wednesday. The Newton mare will have to be on edge, for the M. and M. winner is busy from start to finish, and has only a single defeat charged up against her.

"TY" COB STABBED IN DETROIT STREETS BY UNKNOWN MEN

Wound is Slight and Cobb was able to Play Yesterday--Robbery Motive for Attack

Syracuse, N. Y., Aug. 12--Ty Cobb was attacked and stabbed in the back by three unknown men in Detroit early today while on his way to the train, which was to bring him and the team to this city for an exhibition game this afternoon. Cobb's agility saved him from serious injury and possibly death.

Cobb was driving his automobile to the station, accompanied by his wife, when three assailants appeared from behind a wooden building at the corner of Trumbull and Baggs streets and ordered the car to be stopped.

The men were partly under the influence of liquor and when the machine came to a stop Cobb jumped from the machine and began to argue with the men. The trio then demanded money from the tall player and with the demand all three made a lunge at Cobb. Cobb attacked the trio and then began a battle royal. One man was knocked down with a blow on the chin and then one of the others saw that they were up against an athlete and began to run, while the third one grabbed Cobb around the neck and the pair went into a clinch.

While the pair were wrestling about the thigh pulled a knife and inflicted a wound in Cobb's back. Cobb finally shook off the assailant before he could cause any further damage. Cobb was treated here today. Two stitches had to be taken.

COBB ABLE TO PLAY

Syracuse, N. Y., Aug. 12--Ty Cobb, the Detroit outfielder, who was attacked by a gang of ruffians in Detroit, played in an exhibition game here this afternoon Cobb said this afternoon that the wound was little more than a scratch on his shoulder and would not in any way hamper his playing. He left with the team to night and will play in the New York series.
