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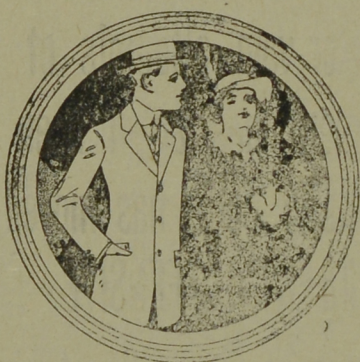

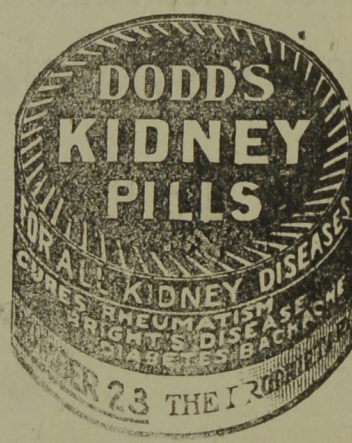

MAJOR A. E. G. MCKENZIE WRITES FROM THE FRONT

Well Known Campbellton Lawyer and U. N. B. Graduate
Tells of Heroic Work of the Boys
of the 26th

(Campbellton Graphic.)

Mr. M. A. Kelly has received a splendid letter from Major McKenzie a portion of which we give below for the benefit of our readers.

"We came out of the trenches last night about twelve and I am going to rest up today. It is raining quite hard so I have retired for the day from my tent to our billet in a Belgian farmhouse. They are very friendly to us (some Belgians are not) and they do not mind us overcrowding their houses.

"I often wonder over here what the boys at home think of the situation—those who stay at home in this great struggle. It seems a shame sometimes that some fellows should have all the comforts and the rest of us all the hardships. Still, we are not downhearted—none of us. It is a game that must be played out to the limit.

A BAD SMASH.

"I suppose you heard that we got quite a smash on the 13th; about twenty killed and some others over thirty wounded, nearly all in one company. I am sorry to say that four of the boys enlisted from Campbellton were killed. Three of them were killed together, in one little attack on a crater in front of our lines. It was some little scrap while it lasted. You might tell Dan Richards to tell his (Thomson's) father, that there was not a better boy in the battalion than he. These boys knew that they were going to almost certain death, but they went like heroes. It was some little hell for the time, I can tell you; dead and wounded men being brought in, stretcher-bearers trying to fix them up and all kinds of shells passing over our heads (fortunately they nearly all passed.)

"The conduct of our men was exceedingly good and we received a letter of thanks from the divisional commander. Some honor. I think one of our men, Sergt. Ryer, will get the V.C. or the Military Cross and probably Major Brown, who commanded the company, will get some special recognition.

LIKES THE TRENCHES.

This last trip to the trenches has

been pretty quiet and we lost just one man killed and one or two wounded. We are supposed to 'have six days' rest but we have to send about four or five hundred men up each night as the working parties and it is not much of a rest. The men, I believe, really welcome going back to the trenches again. "It is really wonder the whole system here, rations come in right on time and everything else has been splendidly managed. Water is brought to the 'dump' in water carts or wagons. It is carried every night to the trenches in gasoline tins holding two and one-half gallons. Rations, in the same way, are brought up and taken to the trenches at night.

"The trenches themselves have dug-outs where the men sleep, when off duty. Of course they are damp and cold but one can sleep there anyway. Wet weather is our bad time. The trenches then are rotten. Imagine living for six days in one of the dug-outs the town digs when putting in water or a sewerage. It is just like that when it rains.

"We have had rather an interesting week. Yesterday the King inspected the Canadian Army Corps. Each regiment sent fifty men. I was in charge of the crowd. It was quite a sight (not spectacular at all), sombre and a sombre day, with the guns booming all around. We were only then about two or three miles from the German trenches. We had an aeroplane watching over us, which reminds me that I saw an aerial fight the day before yesterday. It was a beautiful day—very clear—and the German plane thought it would take a look around our vicinity. I heard it dropped a few bombs, without doing any damage. Then the anti-aircraft guns opened up on him and one of our planes went after him. It was put out of business and dropped just behind the German first line trenches, about one hundred yards from our first line trenches. There were two others brought down the same day, so that was a pretty good day's work for them.

"I think we have them trimmed as far as aircraft go and I almost think we have a preponderance of artillery now. There certainly seems no scarcity of ammunition. The Germans
