FLORENCE FAIRBANKS ON FADS AND FASHIONS

New York, Oct. 25.—The season of social functions has begun and evening wraps and costumes have attained the time of their greatest importance. Every evening entertainment gives an opportunity to study the styles of the season and it cannot be denied that they are unusually attractive. At least half of the winter evening wraps are of the material. Some of the velvets with raised brocade patterns are superb, and such a wrap, bordered with sable, skunk or ermine, is almost as expensive as one made entirely of quantities of material are used, also in these new wraps. The straight, narrow garment is no more, and a modern wrap, off the figure, resembles nothing so much as a huge balloon-like bag with slashes cut at the sides for the arms. When the wrap is on, the yards and yards of rich fabric fall in lines of elegance and grace, but the cut of the wraps is hopelessly beyond the ken of the ordinary dressmaker, for despite its bagginess and its fullness the wrap must take on certain prescribed lines and these lines, in combination with the voluminous folds, require a skillful hand in the cutting.

There are many pretty blouses in crepe and soft silk than there have been in recent years, but the chiffon blouse matching the costume is still very popular. In its best form this fall it is heavily to have long sleeves and some sort of full length front trimming or a little waist coat arrangement instead of the transparent guimpe and cross-trimmed front, but there are plenty models of the latter type too.

Blouses with the upper part in the soft material and with a little line of fur defining the union of the two are good looking, and there are numerous pretty simple blouses in

tirely of broche or satin.

There is much red used this season, more than in any recent year, and it ranges through many lovely shadings, the old reds, the poppy reds, the American Beauty and fuchsia tints, the terra cottas, the mahoganies and frank crimson, flame and geranium lines.

Georgious evening frocks are built up in red velvet or silk or chiffon and fur and gold, and look less theatrical than one would imagine from their description. Stunning street costumes are fashioned of the soft, woollens, such as velours de laine, peau de chamois or satins, in warm yet soft shades of rouge ancien and quite without trimming save perhaps some fur. Afternoon and informal at home frocks of crepe in one of the poppy or fruit reds are immensely popular.

A new feature in the autumn modes is the alliance of the long redingote of soft satin with the undergown of gauze or velvet. These lovely materials are of a large floral design carried out in threads of gold or silver. The exquisite brocades in tones of mauve or blue are especially admired.

The shot effect that is admired so much in the fashionable silks is to be noted at present in the newest millinery, the iridescent effect of the feather plumage of the new hats suggesting the change of tints of taffetas.

Scarfs of ostrich feathers are the correct thing, and they are very much worn in Paris. They are everywhere short or of medium length. The lone ones are usually for evening wear.

Double maline and tulle ruffs are worn in black and white, tied around the neck with a velvet ribbon.

AMBASSADOR REID IS 75

New York, Oct. 26.—Whitelaw Reid the American ambassador to Great Britain will celebrate his seventy-fifth birthday anniversary tomorrow. He is now at his home in this city on leave of absence. Rumors are in circulation that he may soon retire from the ambassadorship owing to his age and a desire to give closer attention to his interests at home.

Mr. Reid has had a career filled with many successes and honors. He is a native of Ohio and a graduate of Miami University. He joined the Republican party at its birth, made political speeches for Fremont in 1856, and advocated the nomination of Lincoln in 1860. He was a Civil War correspondent for a Cincinnati paper and after the war accepted an invitation from Horace Greeley to join the staff of The Tribune. The following year he became its managing editor, and upon the death of Mr. Greeley in 1872, Mr. Reid became chief proprietor of the paper. Mr. Reid has held the post of ambassador to the court of St. James for more than seven years, a record without parallel in the history of the American diplomatic service. Previous to his appointment in 1905 he had represented his country at Queen Victoria's Jubilee in 1877, as one of the commissioners who negotiated the peace treaty with Spain in 1898, and as the representative of the President at the coronation of King Edward in 1902. In 1892 he was a candidate of the Republican party for Vice President of the United States.

Gen. Vukotich's troops have since advanced to the town of Sienitza in the district of Novipasear whence whence they have approached within five miles of the Servian troops coming from the other direction to join them.

MONTENEGRINS SHELL A TURKISH TOWN

Rieka, Montenegro, Oct. 25.—The Montenegrin army succeeded in surrounding the Turkish town of Scutari yesterday afternoon. The Montenegrin artillery opened fire on the town from the northwestern quarter aiming at the citadel and the Mohammedan district. A number of shells fell in the Mohammedan districts without doing any damage.

The Montenegrin envoys proceeded toward the town to open negotiations for its surrender but without effect. The Montenegrin infantry then made a desperate attack on the town but encountering an annihilating fire from the Turkish artillery and finding themselves hard pressed and in danger they were compelled to retire to their former position. They immediately began to make preparations for a renewal of the attack. This was made under cover of artillery, the men leaving their trenches as the guns opened fire.

A vigorous attack is to be made on the city today from three sides.

Crown Prince Danilo and his staff at one time were in great danger, a shell bursting a few yards from them. The population of Scutari is in a state of panic and flags are flying from a number of houses.

At Anakosch the Montenegrins occupied the highest point of the neighboring mountain and glen. Martinoitch called upon the Turks to surrender and prevent further useless bloodshed. The occupation of the town was affected after a bombardment of the fortress by all the Montenegrin guns. The Turks replied with twenty-two guns but those on the highest points were silenced after two hours firing. The fall of night interrupted further artillery action, but the infantry made several night attacks and as a result of their efforts the Turks evacuated the upper fort and the Montenegrins occupied
