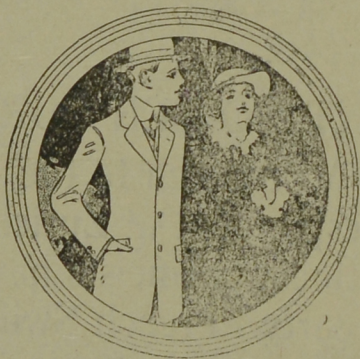

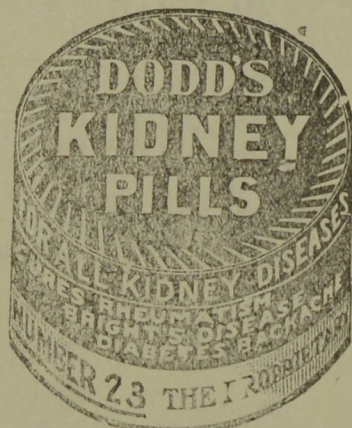

DOLLAR MADNESS AND MRS. GALT'S GOWNS

(New York Herald)

The purchase by Mrs. Norman Galt, the President's fiancée, of gowns to complete her wedding trousseau was severely condemned by the Rev. Bouck White, pastor of the Church of the Social Revolution at Sixth avenue and Forty-second street, in his sermon here yesterday. Mr. White made a plea for simplicity in dress, and declared that Mrs. Galt's gowns had been "pilfered from tired fingers."

Following the church service, Mr. White said that he had sent a despatch to Mrs. Galt, in care of the White House, in Washington, calling upon her to "display an example that shall rebuke, instead of encourage the dollar madness that is destroying the world." His telegram, he said, was an appeal for simplicity in dress. He and the members of his church wear homespun.

This was Mr. White's telegram to Mrs. Galt:—

"Mrs. Norman Galt, care of the White House, Washington, D. C.

"Our preacher, Bouck White, at the Church of the Social Revolution preached today on this topic, 'Mrs. Galt's Trousseau is in a Catastrophic Era.' He showed the critical nature of our day due to the inordinate dollar hunger whereby nation is hung against nation in bloody war, which spirit of warfare will unless checked destroy Christendom.

"This dollar hunger among the men is caused in large part by the craving of their women for millinery and dressmaking display. If newspaper reports are authentic, you are setting an example which will intensify the feminine craze for exterior finery and so increase commercial extortion and industrial oppression of employees.

"In the name of the tradition of simplicity of apparel established by Thomas Jefferson and in the name of the God of fellowship, who is crucified afresh by the ostentatious wealth of our time, we ask you to consider the operators who made your trousseau and out of whose tired finger tips your finery has been pilfered.

"It is possible that you have not given attention to this economic aspect, and therefore, have in ignorance permitted your wedding to strengthen the ostentatious life of today. Will you not, as the First Lady of the Land, display an example that will rebuke, instead of encourage, the dollar madness that is destroying the world?"

CAN BE "GIRLIES" BUT ONCE

New Haven, Conn., Dec. 10—Because it is said a New York physician told Dean Jones, of Yale University, that the impersonation of females by students tends to make them effeminate, the Dean has issued an order that such impersonation may be made by any student for only one season. The Dean's order is the leading topic of discussion among the students. Dean Jones said the order was issued for society's sake.

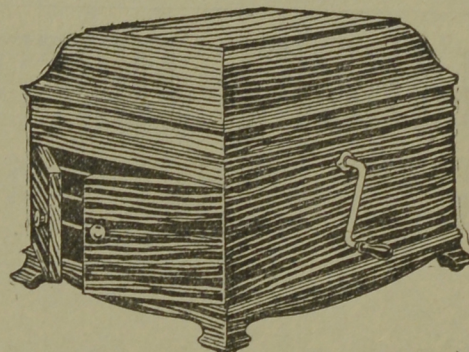
