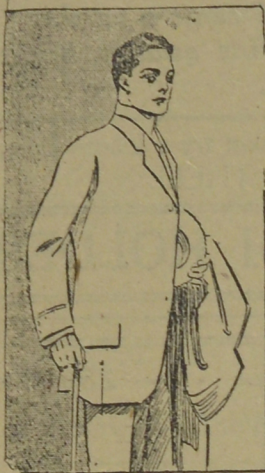
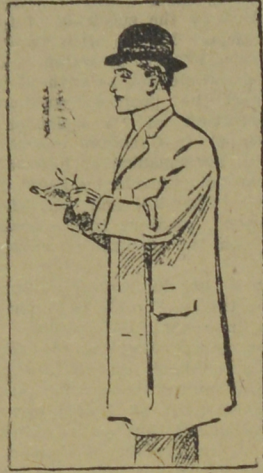

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## BOSTON AMERICANS STRONG IN PITCHING DEPARTMENT

Main Reason why Team Heads American League--Joe Wood in Class by Himself

Examination of the American League pitching averages printed below will reveal one pretty good reason why the Boston Americans are away out in front in the 1912 pennant race for all five of Jake Stahl's regular boxmen are well up in the list, the poorest percentage of any one of them being .571. Pape the sixth Red Sox pitcher has a mark of .500 having won one and lost one of the 10 games he has engaged in.

Joe Wood of course is practically in a class by himself, for although he is tied with Eddie Plank of the Athletics for the virtual leadership of the league pitchers, Wood has gone to the firing line seven more times than Plank and of those seven games Joe has won six.

Wood has won 24 games, lost four, and taken part in two others for which he earned neither the credit of a victory or the discredit of a defeat. Charlie Hall has won 15 games and lost six, his percentage being .714. Ray Collins has won eight games and lost four, Bedient has won ten of his 16 games, and "Buck" O'Brien has won twelve and lost nine.

Hall is tied with Steen of Cleveland for 10th place, Collins' ranks 13th, Bedient is tied with Bender of the Athletics, Hughes of Washington and Baskette of Cleveland for 15th place. O'Brien and Cashion of Washington are sharing the 23rd position equally, while Pape is on even terms with "Doc" White of Chicago, Mitchell of St. Louis, Joe Engle of Washington, Summers of Detroit, Houck of Philadelphia, Akers of Washington and Frill of St. Louis for 76th rank an important circumstance however, being that Pape is in line to win many more games for the Red Sox, whereas Frill and Akers have descended to the minors and two others of Larry's .500 compositors are headed in that direction.

## GOOD SHOOTING AT P. R. A. MATCHES ON TUESDAY

Ross Rifle sustains its Reputation for Accurate Shooting--Weather Conditions not Very Favorable--Average Scoring ten per cent Better Than Last Season

Sussex, Aug. 13--The 46th annual meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association opened at Sussex today with a record attendance for recent years. After the experience with Saint Swift in for 40 days, the sunshine was more than welcome. Many of the shooting mounds could only be reached by wading knee deep but the shooters being soldiers, cared not for the hardship.

Several of the competitors from the upper St. John were delayed in arriving by reason of a bridge washout on the C. P. R. The weather opened with a hazy light and a moderate southwesterly wind, its direction being variable. As the day wore on the light became better and the bulls-eye disc became more distinct, shortly after the opening of the matches. The Ross rifle kept up its reputation as a magnificent shooting weapon, as the scoring this year so far in all matches, has been at least 10 per cent. higher than in previous years. An evidence of this excellence, is three ties for first place with possible in the nursery match, an unprecedented event in the association records as well as the unusually high scoring in the other matches, and that in face of bad weather and ground conditions.

The third match for the Prince of Wales cup produced equally high average scores, but as the match was not concluded until six o'clock, it was impossible to obtain the absolute results. Joe Lake who was a failure in New York and St. Louis is now pitching champion ball for Hagh Jennings in Detroit.

The Cincinnati fans have no mercy on a loser and the Redlegs have a tough job playing ball at home since the team began to slip.

Wichita Falls has the honor of owning the first championship team of the season, the Oilers having won the pennant in the Texas-Oklahoma League.

The Dubuque Club of the Three-I League disposed of two classy players when it sold Del Padlock to the Highlanders and Ernie Johnson to the White Sox.

Pitcher Demaree recently sold to the Giants by the Mobile Club, was a member of the Newark, N. J. team in 1908 when George Stallings was manager of the team.

Pitcher Ray Keating of the Lawrence New England League team, who has been sold to the New York Americans has won twenty and lost nine games this season.

Clyde Milan of the Washington team, has a chance to beat Ty Cobb's record of 83 stolen bases in 1911. Up to August 4, Clyde had pilfered 58 sacks.

## CANADIAN SLOOP WON SECOND RACE

Chicago, Aug. 13--The Canadian sloop Patricia won by 9 seconds today's race in the series of five being contested with the American yacht Michigan for the sailing championship of the Great Lakes. Today's victory is the second of the Canadiana. The American boat has one victory to its credit. The official elapsed time for the winner was 2,33.05 for eighteen miles. During the fifteen mile race for 25 foot motor boats, which was won in 24.15 by Chicago, owned by E. J. Richards of Chicago, Kitty Hawk, owned by R. H. Tinkler of Detroit, caught fire and sank about a mile and a half from shore.

Fresman Monroe, driver, and Fred Joseph, mechanic of Kitty Hawk, were picked up a few minutes after today's accident. In today's race the wind was light and puffy at the start and was freshening almost to a gale just before the finish.

## BEEBE MUST PAY

Cincinnati, Aug. 12--Pitcher Fred Beebe will be compelled, according to a decision of the National Baseball Commission today, to pay the Philadelphia National League club \$166 for salary overdrawn while a member of that team. Beebe admitted the debt, but claimed he lost five weeks' salary when transferred by Philadelphia to Buffalo. The commission held that this loss of salary was his fault and allowed the Philadelphia claim.
