HELEN KELLER HAS FOUND HAPPINESS

Miss Helen Keller, America's deaf, dumb and blind genius, has found her greatest happiness, like other women in love.

Mme. Maeterlinck of Paris, when in Boston last year, saw and talked with Miss Keller. They chatted about love—the first time, so far as is known, that Miss Keller has opened her heart on this theme. Mme. Maeterlinck will write an article which she will call "The Woman Who Found the Blue Bird," the "blue bird," in this case being happiness in or love.

Miss Keller is spending the Summer at Wrentham. Mme. Maeterlinck who appeared at the Boston Opera last year, talked in Paris with Chas. Henry Meltzer of the American's dramatic staff.

Paris, Aug. 3.—Georgette Le Blanc, best known as Mme. Maeterlinck, has had to decline an invitation lately extended to her by Henry Russell, managing director of the Boston Opera House, to revisit America.

Two days ago, when I had the privilege of talking for an hour or more with her at the Abbaye de St. Wandrille, in Normandy, Mme. Maeterlinck informed me that next Winter she would found a "Theatre Maeterlinck."

"I shall not have a theatre of my own," said Mme. Maeterlinck. "But I shall lead a company with which I shall produce some of my husband's plays. My purpose is to open my season with 'Sister Beatrice' (which has not yet been performed in France) and to continue my campaign with 'Mary Magdalen.' I shall interpret the chief parts in both those works, to Paris.

"Nothing would give me more pleasure than to revisit America. I have very happy memories of Boston, where I was more than warmly welcomed by the public. If I had my way, I would have made one appearance in 'Ariane et Barbe-Bleue' at the Metropolitan. Mr. Russell tried Mr. Russell tried his best to get that opera house for one performance. But I was shown a contract, of a very private kind, which gave a singer in the New York company the exclusive right to sing the role.

SIMPLICITY OF ARIANE

"I have my own ideas regarding Ariane. As I conceive her, she should be played with great simplicity. The splendor of Ariane is all internal. And, like her character, her dressing should be simple. One costume, only one, of course: for the action in the opera—as in the play—goes on unbroken. That costume need not cost more than ten dollars."

"No," Mme. Maeterlinck went on, "I am not writing my American impressions. They were delightful, but I do not think them important, or original enough to warrant my making them into a book.

"I may, however, write one article about a visit which I paid in Boston to that wonderful American, Helen Keller. Though she is deaf and blind and dumb, she has genius.

"Many have written about her, but none, I believe, has put such questions to her as I, a woman could, without offence. I questioned her, above all, about love.

"And—yes, Monsieur, you have guessed rightly—I found that though so sorely tried and crippled, she was quite feminine in all her thoughts and feelings. I shall name my article 'The Woman Who Found the Blue Bird.'"

Before leaving her I asked Mme. Maeterlinck if she could talk to me about the new play which her husband is now writing.

SEQUEL TO "BLUE BIRD"

"All I can say," she answered, "is that it will be the sequel to his 'L'Oiseau Bleu.' It was settled yesterday that it would be entitled 'Le Mariage de Tyl-Tyl.'"

"Tyl-Tyl grows up. He goes into the forest with the woman of the diamond ring, from whom he learns strange things—true things—concerning life. The play will combine fairy fancies with philosophy. It will, no doubt, delight the old and young alike. At present it has only been sketched out, and I hardly think it will be finished till next spring.

"An American manager has offered to pay Mr. Maeterlinck his own price for the play. So far he has refused to accept any of the offers he has had. Nor has he yet made up his mind where he will have his work produced."

CHEAP FARES TO TORONTO EXHIBITION
