Guelph, Ont., Sept. 9—Before the first session of the Trades and Labor Council of Canada Convention opened here today, those in charge announce that all records for attendance of delegates have been broken almost doubled in fact. Last year at Calgary there were 174 delegates this year the credentials committee state 300 delegates will be accorded seats and votes.

The first session today was largely a matter of pleasantries between civic officials and local parliamentarians welcoming the delegates to Guelph.

COLORADO PRIMARIES

Denver, Col., Sept. 9—Colorado voters of all parties and factions will go to the polls tomorrow to cast their ballots in the first primary election under the new State law. Candidates are to be selected for two United States senators representatives in Congress, governor and other State officers, judge of the supreme court and members of the legislature. Both Democrats and Republicans are divided into three factions and each faction has a more or less complete set of candidates on the primary ballot. Governor John F. Shafroth and former Governor Alva Adams are the regular Democratic candidates for United States senator to succeed Senator Guggenheim, with Charles Thomas to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Hughes. The regular Republican candidates for the senate are C. C. Dawson for the long term and C. W. Waterman for the short term. Merkle D. Vincent is the choice of the Republican progressives for United States senator, while one or two others are running independent. For governor there is an equal number of aspirants.

STEAM ENGINEERS OPEN BIENNIAL MEET

St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 9—Nearly two hundred delegates representing State organizations in all parts of the country and provincial organizations in Canada are assembled in this city to attend the third biennial convention of the International Union of Steam Engineers which opened here today at the Ryan Hotel, the headquarters of the convention. One of the principal matters of business to be considered by the gathering is a proposed plan of life insurance for the members of the affiliated unions and as their are many other matters of considerable importance to the organization it is believed that the convention will remain in session about ten days. The local unions have arranged an elaborate entertainment program for the visiting delegates.

MR HUBBARD HAS LANDED NEW JOB

Ottawa, Sept. 8—Arrangements have been completed for establishing an experimental farm at Fredericton, N. B. The property selected is about two miles from the city and comprises a considerable acreage. Mr. Hubbard, until now secretary of the Department of Agriculture of New Brunswick, has been selected as superintendent. He is a graduate of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph.

With a view to eliminating the orientals from the fruit ranches in Santa Clara County, California, the Farmers' Educational and Co-operative Union has opened a free employment office for white help only at San Jose.

The manager of a big Chicago hotel has found a solution of the fly problem. It is a flock of ducks.

The ordinary hotel perhaps has no particular accommodations for live ducks; but in this there is a fountain in the centre of the approaches to the various dining rooms. The fountain has a large basin, and just by way of novelty the manager several months ago placed a few ducks in the water. They paddled around and enjoyed it, and the guests enjoyed seeing them. But, better still, the ducks are enjoying the flies that attempted to enter the dining rooms and feast upon the good things there in.

The flies—in Chicago, at least—fly low; and ducks, as any one who have ever seen them knows, are especially quick in catching insects. The consequence is, this particular

hotel, once troubled with flies, now has practically none. And the ducks, once lean to verge of scrawny, are fat and sleek.

The duck method of disposing of the fly nuisance cannot of course, obtain in private households to any degree; but in this particular hostility the ducks have caused the wire fly swatter and traps to be thrown into the ash heap.

Perhaps next year the enterprising manager will attach some sort of a meter to every duck, so that at the end of the season he can tell how many flies each busy duck has disposed of with neatness and despatch.
