## NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., Sept. 21—New York Republicans will gather at Saratoga Wednesday to select candidates for governor and other state officers to be voted for in November. Leading aspirants for the gubernatorial nomination are Former Speaker Jas. Wadsworth, Jr., Former Congressman Wm. S. Bennett and Job E. Hedges of New York City.

In the general primary in New Jersey on Tuesday the voters of the two old parties will nominate candidates for all offices, from United States senator down to town constable. The third party men will have no standing in the primary, but will be obliged to nominate by petition. United States Senator Frank O. Briggs is opposed for another term on the Republican side. Several are engaged in a spirited contest for the Democratic endorsement. The election of state senators is attracting attention since upon the new state senate will depend the choice of a Republican or Democratic governor to fill out the unexpired year of Governor Wilson's term in the event of his election to the presidency.

Republicans and Democrats of Massachusetts will name complete tickets in the primaries Tuesday. The Progressives, as a party, will take no part in the primaries. Governor Foss is a candidate for re-nomination on the Democratic ticket and is opposed by District Attorney Pelletier of Boston. Joseph Walker, former speaker of the state assembly, and Everett C. Benton, a business man of Belmont, are contesting for the Republican nomination for governor. The legislature, for which nominations will be made, will have the choosing of a United States senator to succeed Senator Crane.

The several political parties in California will meet in state convention Tuesday to draft platforms and to choose their states of presidential elections. Michigan Republicans will meet in Detroit to choose candidates for all state offices excepting the governorship.

President Taft's public engagements for the week call for his attendance in Washington for the opening of the International Congress of Hygiene and Demography. Later in the week he is expected to be present in Boston at the banquet in connection with the International Congress of Chambers of Commerce.

Colonel Roosevelt will carry his speech-making tour through the south covering the territory from Missouri and Arkansas to the eastern coast.

Governor Wilson will return home Tuesday to cast his vote in the New Jersey primaries. The remainder of the week he will devote to a trip into the New England States.

## CHARGED WITH THEFT OF A LARGE SUM

Montreal, Q., Sept. 20—Charged with the misappropriation of \$35,000 the property of the Bank of Hochelaga by which he was employed as a letter carrier, Henry Legace made his appearance in the inquiry court. This police alleged that Legace opened morning and pleaded not guilty. The false accounts in the bank, and as upon them, stamped them with the checks came in placed fictitious names accepted sign and entered them up to the bogus account. He is then said to have opened up an account in the name of L. K. Amyott in the Montreal City and district saving bank, transferring the account from the Hochelaga Bank to it.

To cover up his actions, the authorities assert, that Legace was in the habit of reducing the account of some large firm in the ledger, of course this reduction did not appear in the firms pass book and thus escaped detection until last August, when an investigation was held and \$38,000 found to be missing. The investigations revealed the fact the only twelve dollars stood to the name of Amyott in the district savings bank. Legace bears and excellent reputation and comes of a very fine family. Absolutely no trace can be found of where the money went to after it left the Montreal and District Bank.

#### CATHOLIC CHARITIES CONFERENCE

Washington, Sept. 21—Protection for young girls who go to large cities is to be one of the important subjects of discussion at the biennial meeting of the National Conference of Catholic Charities to be held in this city next week. Many noted prelates, priests and laymen of the Catholic church arrived today to take part in the conference. The opening solemn high mass will be celebrated at the Catholic University tomorrow morning. The sermon will be preached by Bishop Canevin of Pittsburgh. The regular sessions will begin Monday and continue three days

## BIG RAILWAY WAR LIKELY IN THE WEST

Calgary, Sept. 20—A local paper says:—"Canadians will wake up some morning in the near future with the news of two of the greatest railroad alliances that have ever been forced and one of these alliances will make the Canadian Pacific Railroad the strongest in the world, according to rumors now floating round in rail-circles. Behind the rumor is a story in the invasion of Canada by American roads, and the story going around is that the great Northern Road, already into Portage La Prairie and Brandon and heading for Regina contemplates coming through Manitoba and Saskatchewan, heading up with the Grand Trunk Pacific and at the same time coming from the Montana boundary line into Alberta and meeting with the G.T.P. in this province, practically net working western Canada with branch roads and trunk lines.

"To offset this Canadian Pacific and the Chicago Milwaukee and St. Paul roads are contemplating an alliance and although it will not be an amalgamation, they will work together and invade the Jim Hill territory in the United States part of which is already invaded by the C. M. and St. Paul, together making the strongest combination in the world. The heads of all the big roads of the American continent realize that western Canada is to be the big railroad field of the future and these amalgamations being formed are the result of this realization."

#### WILSON OPENS OHIO CAMPAIGN

Columbus, O., Sept. 20—Amid the blare of brass bands, the stirring strains of martial music and the huzzas of enthusiastic crowds, the Democratic campaign in Ohio was opened today with Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey, the party's choice for President, as the stellar attraction. The gathering, in point of numbers of enthusiasm, was equal to any demonstration of like character held here in many years. During the forenoon every train brought in delegates of visitors from points all over Central Ohio and from Toledo, Cincinnati, Cleveland and other of the large cities. The big feature of the day was the meeting in Memorial Hall this afternoon. Governor Judson N. Harmon presided. Next to Governor Wilson the chief speaker was Congressman James M. Cox of Dayton, the Democratic nominee for governor of Ohio.

#### PAOLI BATTLE ANNIVERSARY


West Chester, Pa., Sept. 20—On the monument grounds near Malvern the customary exercises were held this afternoon in commemoration of the conflict which historians of the American Revolution have termed the "Massacre of Paoli." Today marked the one hundred and thirty-fifth anniversary of the event. On the night of September 20, 1777, the troops of General Anthony Wayne, while retreat from the battle of Brandywine, were surprised by the British general, afterwards known as "Flintless" Gray. The British general forbade his men to fire a shot, and to make sure of it, took away their flints, whence came his nickname "Flintless." The night was intensely dark, and the Hessians fell upon the Americans, without a moment's warning, and bayoneted them. Only the genius of General Wayne prevented the destruction of the entire body of troops.

#### CONFERENCE OF EXPORTERS

New York, Sept. 10—At the third annual convention of the American Manufacturers' Export Association, which held its opening sessions today at the Hotel Aster in this city, plans by which the American manufacturer and exporter will reap his full share of the benefits of the trade expansion that is expected to follow the opening of the Panama canal will be discussed by men who position in public affairs and the world of industry well qualifies them to speak on the subject. William P. Dodge, the American minister of Panama, will present a paper on "The Progress of the Canal and the Consequent Development of American Trade." James A. Farrell, president of the United States Steel Corporation, will tell of "Shipping Conditions Operating Against American Trade with South America."

Other speakers and their topics include the following:—B. De Gama, the Brazilian ambassador, on "Closer Trade Relations Between Two Countries;" Congressman William Sulzer, "Diplomatic and Consular Service;" Hon. Curtis Guild, American ambassador to Russia, "Possibilities of Extending American Trade with Russia;" William E. Peck, president of the American Exporters and Importers' Association, on "Export Commission Houses."
