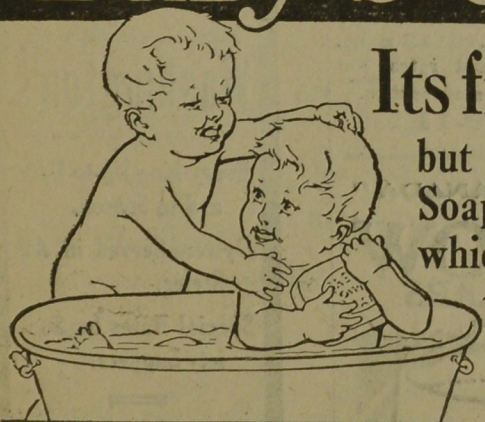

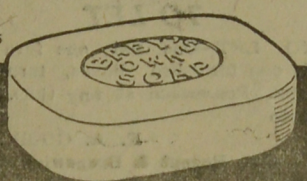

THE BORDEN GOVERNMENT

Under pressure, the government came around to Mr. Thomas' and Mr. Hitchens' way of thinking, at least so far as making shells at a decent price was concerned, but not to the extent of making shells a national business and cutting the profiteers out. That was too much to expect. They didn't do it for Canada and much less would they do it for Great Britain. The best they could do was to make it impossible for their friends to get all their feet in the trough at one time. And on that plan, the Gaderine swine being removed to a safe distance, the Shell Committee became the Imperial Munitions Board of Canada, with J. W. Flavell, L.L.D., millionaire, as chairman. This reorganization accomplished three great objects—it put the price of shells where it could be seen without straining the neck. It headed off investigation of the original Shell Committee's transactions by making it an overseas Lloyd-George institution, and it acquired an enterprising chairman in the shape of J. W. Flavell, who has resigned from the Federal Economic Commission to concentrate on his new duties. One sees his hand, however, in the approaching census of Canadian industrial plants by the Federal Economic Commission. Chairman Flavell is getting busy. It is about time someone was getting busy. Fifteen months ago it was suggested that Canada appoint a minister of munitions and mobilize her war industries.

MR. WHITE'S CHOICE.

Mr. Flavell may not be a minister of munitions—he, perhaps, knows more about sausage casings than hells—but he is the next best bet. It is understood that he is the Hon. W. T. White's choice, the finance minister having boosted him as the greatest efficiency expert in Canada. How great his efficiency is Mr. White knows from his own experience in the last general election. All Mr. Flavell expects to get out of it is a knighthood. The story runs that this knighthood was to go to General Bertram, the former chairman and saving grace of the Shell Committee, a big-hearted, honest gentleman who bought \$180,000,000 worth of shells than was allowed him, but lacking for Great Britain for \$18,000,000 less the Flavell reputation for efficiency, especially with Tom White. So when the Real Thing came along, General Bertram was brushed aside.
