MADE A GOOD THING ON WAR HORSES

Toronto, Dec. 3.—At the investigation by Sir Charles Davidson's commission it was shown that J. R. Fallis, Conservative M.P.P. for Peel ad received checks amounting to \$63,450 for the sale of horses to the government. One witness who was called denied that Fallis had said he would buy horses from no other person than Conservatives. Another witness swore that horses bought previously at \$150 each were sold to the government at \$162 and that 80 horses were sold to the government brought \$32,000 or \$1,000 more than the previous purchase price.

Dr. J. A. Campbell stated that he found on examining the horses which were produced for the government to purchase, that those bought in Brampton were of a better quality than those purchased in Hamilton, but were not the equal of those bought for the first contingent.

In another case it was shown that one horse that the government paid one hundred and forty dollars for what was previously priced at one hundred and twenty-five dollars. Military evidence was given to the effect that all horses purchased were subjected to a thorough examination before being bought. The commission adjourned till tomorrow, when some witnesses from York County will be heard.

BANDSMEN BEING ENLISTED.

The band of the 104th Battalion, now in St. John, which now has a membership of twenty-eight, is to be increased to forty. Bandmen are now being enlisted and it is probable that a number of Fredericton bandmen will join the organization.

C Company, 194th Battalion, will attend divine service at the Brunswick Street Baptist church tomorrow morning. The 38th Field Battery will attend service at Christchurch Cathedral. As usual, the Roman Catholic troops will attend service at St. Dunstan's church.

GIBSON BOY ENLISTS.

Another recruit was enrolled at the recruiting office today. He is Jewer Logan, 19, Gibson. Sydney Hudson of Juniper Brook, Charlton county, a veteran of the Foot Guards, was sent to St. John this morning to join the 115th Battalion. He is the first recruit in this section to be enlisted for that corps.

FIRE LAST NIGHT.

The fire department responded last night at about nine o'clock to an alarm from Box 16. Smoke filled the house in George street owned by Mr. Charles Woodhouse and occupied by Mrs. Ella Robinson. It was found to come from wood placed in the oven to dry. There was no damage.

WILL ASK FOR ADVANCE.

The Patriotic Committee met last night and considered the matter of applying to the City Council for an advance on the grant of \$10,000 which is approximately the share of the city of Fredericton in the amount to be raised for the Patriotic Fund in York and Sunbury counties. As foreshadowed in The Mail some days ago the committee will wait upon the City Council in committee on Monday night next and will ask for an advance.

TO WED MONDAY.

The marriage of Private James King, 13th Battalion, who was wounded three times in France, and Miss Katherine McGrath, late of Chatham and now of this city, will take place at St. Dunstan's church Monday morning. Rev. Father Carney performs the ceremony. Major P. A. Guthrie, 10th Battalion; Private John Jones, 13th Battalion; Private John Markey, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, and Lance Corporal Ernest Penney, 10th Battalion, all of whom were invalided home from the front, will attend the wedding.

SOLDIERS BREAK UP MEETING IN LONDON

London, Dec. 3.—Canadian and Australian soldiers, with a sprinkling of British territorials, this evening took charge of Memorial Hall, where the Union of Democratic Control, an organization which is opposed to conscription and favors peace, was advertised to hold a meeting and unceremoniously threw the speakers from the platform and turned the gathering into a recruiting meeting.

The soldiers succeeded in gaining admission with tickets often from those credited to the members of the union, and forming themselves at the top of the staircase leading to the great halls and galleries, to take possession of the building.

Bombs containing "asphyxiating gases" were launched and the soldiers took the platform by storm. Several of the speakers including E. D. Morel, the leader of the union, sought refuge in an ante-room. As did the women who were distributing leaflets. The promoters of the meeting were thrown from the platform with the furniture, to which they clung. The soldiers took the places of the speakers and passed a resolution demanding that the activities of the union should be stopped and declaring that the only terms of peace acceptable to the Allies were those which should be dictated after the complete defeat of Germany.

GIRLS' CLUB SUCCESSFULLY CONDUCTED IN CITY

The Girls' Club recently organized by the King's Daughters is now in full operation with prospects of being one of the most successful departments ever attempted by the King's Daughters. The Club was organized about two months ago. For some time its sessions were held at the home of Mrs. C. A. McVey but through the generosity of Mr. H. G. Kitchen a room in Westmorland Street was supplied. Friends donated the furnishings and further donations will be thankfully received. Mrs. McVey and Miss Jean Cooper are in charge of the Club which now has a membership of about thirty.

A night school conducted by Miss Myra Sherman is held each Friday night. Mrs. George Winter is giving a course in Home Nursing and Red Cross work is also being done. It is expected that after Christmas courses in Domestic Science and sewing will be given under the direction of Miss Gillis.

PROPERTIES WITHDRAWN.

Mr. E. H. Allen offered two properties at auction in front of the City Hall at noon today and both were withdrawn after some rather slack bidding. A property near the Gibson-St. Mary's dividing line with two dwellings on it was withdrawn at \$700. A property in Gibson on Marysville Road including a dwelling was withdrawn at \$650.

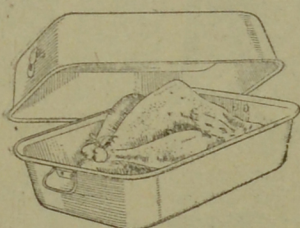
