THE AMERICAN POTATO MARKET

(Produce News)

Maine seed men are quoting Cob-
bler seed \$2.65 and \$2.75 and Green
Mountains \$2.40 and \$2.50, delivered
in New York territory, which includes
Long Island, Jersey and nearby
points, which take the 35c. rate.
These prices rule on goods for March
delivery and Maine reports show that
ing closed on that basis. Southern
growers who have the benefit of
water transportation via Norfolk, to
which point the rate from Portland
is 30c. or less, are contracting
steadily on this basis. Florida grow-
ers are also in this market.

BOSTON

The potato market has taken a big
jump, showing an advance of 12c.
bus. over last week. Carlot ship-
ments delivered Boston are quoted 68c
with prospects of higher prices. The
outside buying demand is splendid
and dealers have not been able to
keep up the pace. Said one promi-
nent broker: "I can now sit in my
office instead of going around 'pull-
ing door bells' and sell everything
in sight to waiting customers. The
rot in York State and Michigan
and our car shortage has
boosted prices."

BOOMING THE EAST

The Montreal Star, through its
weekly edition, the Family Herald, is

inces to the neglect of the east.

for investment and chances for set-
tlement in a part of Canada where
the hardships of pioneer life need not
be encountered and where profits are
fully as great as in the new sections.

DIED THIS MORNING

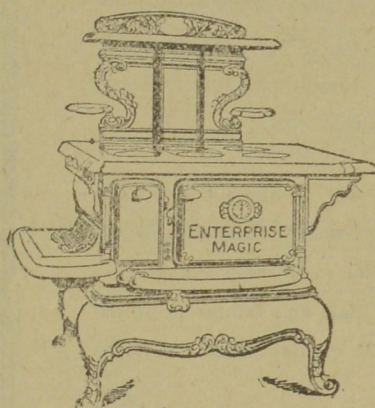
Mrs. Susanna M. Tilley widow of

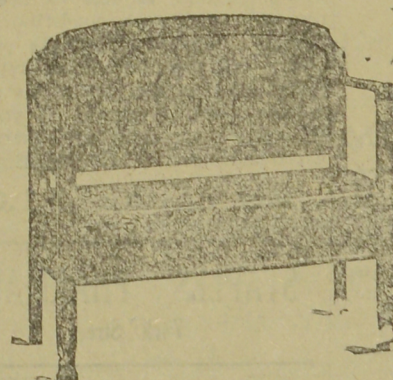
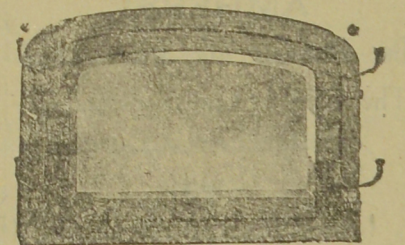
