## REPUBLICANS PREPARING FOR DECISIVE ACTION

### Skirmishing Between Roosevelt and Taft Forces is about at an End--Roosevelt Apparently out of the Race for Nomination while Taft's Chances are Daily Improving--Convention Expected to make a Choice Late on Saturday and Adjourn

Chicago, June 21—Delegates to the fifteenth republican national convention frankly tired and eager to return to their homes, today prepared for decisive action at the Coliseum after three days of skirmish night between the Taft forces and Roosevelt forces that has resulted in nothing tangible but delay. It was evident this morning that the Temper of the delegates and not the schemes of the leaders would hold firm place in the next twelve hours of convention deliberations. With this fact in view, Members of the credentials committee worked all night long, in efforts to have something approximating a complete report for submission to the convention when it is called to order at 11 o'clock this morning. The fourth day of the convention opened with president Taft a strong favorite for re-nomination possibility of a third candidate as second choice in the betting and Col. Roosevelt apparently out of the race as far as this particular convention. Ordinarily in Republican National convention proceeding a candidate for president will have the nomination yesterday, the third day, and the only business remaining for the convention today would be the selection of vice-President candidate and adjournment. Now as the program runs, the report of the credentials committee may require a vote by individual delegates, the report of the committee on rules may provoke extended debate and the subject of a platform may take half a day for discussion on the floor.

If the convention actually gets down to the point of nominations this week it will be late Saturday, unless there is a decision to adjourn the session of the convention to next week. Every effort today was directed toward closing up the convention Saturday afternoon or night.

## The Flemming Govt. Made Almost Clean Sweep of the Province

### By the Judicious use of an Enormous Campaign Fund the Flemmingites were able to Carry Forty Seats out of Forty Four--Madawaska the only Constituency to Return a Full Liberal Ticket--Two Independents won out in Northumberland--The Opposition Leader went down to Defeat with his Whole Ticket

The provincial elections yesterday resulted in almost a clean sweep for the Flemming government. There were contests in sixteen of the seven-teen constituencies, and of forty-five members returned forty are straight supporters of the administration. The County of Madawaska enjoys the distinction of returning the only straight supporters of the opposition party.

The only bright spot for the opposition apart from Madawaska, is Northumberland, where two supporters of the government were badly defeated by an independent ticket, brought out at the eleventh hour. The presence of Commodore Stewart and Mr. Swim in the next House presages an uncomfortable time for Hon. Mr. Morrissey.

The polls in yesterday's contest closed at four o'clock and the first returns began to come in three-quarters of an hour later. A special wire had been installed in The Mail Office by the Western Union Telegraph Company and the service which they gave was very prompt and efficient. The bulk of the returns from polls in York and Sunbury counties were

handled by the N. B. Telephone Company.

The first outside return received was from Moncton City and showed the return of Dr. Price, the Tory candidate, by a substantial majority. Other constituencies followed in quick succession and all showed a slaughter of Grit candidates. In fact, it seemed to be an off date for the Grits and they lost interest in the returns long before eight o'clock.

At one time it looked as if Tweeddale and Burgess were elected in Victoria but later returns dashed that hope to the ground.

It was certainly a dark day for Liberalism in New Brunswick. The opposition has been practically wiped out and therefore, will not be called upon to share the responsibility for the bad legislation that will be enacted during the next four years. The government will be able to continue its reckless and extravagant career unchecked. A good strong opposition is essential to the good government of the province but this province now has no such constitutional safeguard.

## BISLEY TEAM SAILED TODAY

### The Canadian Crack Shots off to the Old Country for Honors

#### Mr. A. B. Maggs a Former New Brunswick now in the West, is on the Team

Montreal, June 21—Eastern Canada is strongly represented on the team composing Canada's most accurate rifle men, which this morning sailed on the Allan Liner "Victorian" for the Old Country, to compete in the classic Bisley meet. Eastern Canada has one more man in the team than Western Canada, though the commanding officer is a western man.

Divided according to provinces, Alberta has one shot included in the contingent, British Columbia four, all belonging to the 90th Regiment of which Col. O'Grady has command, while two other representatives of the Regiment are going over there to shoot independently. Nova Scotia has four representatives including Sergt. Maj. Dymond. Ontario has five representatives, Prince Edward Island one and Quebec one. Of the Western contingent Lt. A. B. Maggs is a high school teacher at Vancouver, and has been in command of the cadets there. Previous to going to Vancouver he was the champion shot of the 74th Regiment in New Brunswick and won the New Brunswick rifle championship by a handsome margin. He has resided both at Moncton and Sussex N. B. Col. O'Grady of Winnipeg who was leading the team thirty years ago, figured at Wimbledon where the rifle shooting competitions were held. He is a good man to have in command of the 43rd, it was the axiom of the Regiment to accept any decision without protest, no matter how unjust it might seem. "Let O'Grady do the fighting," Lieut. Col. Chas. F. Winter of Quebec, is acting as adjutant. He was secretary of the D.R.A. for a number of years and holds the active service record for a Canadian soldier, for he fought as a volunteer at Tel-El-Kehir in the Egyptian campaign of 1882, in South Africa, and in the Northwest during the rebellion.

Other members of the team include Pte. Mitchell a member of the most famous rifle shooting family in all Canada. The Mitchells have supplied more members for Canadian teams at Bisley than any other Canadian family, and this year's member of the Canadian contingent is looked on as the most famous of a brilliant family, whose name will be remembered as long as the records of Canadian rifle shooting are preserved. Pte. Mitchell is a vegetarian, teetotaler and non-smoker.

## CRAZY WOMAN'S DREADFUL ACT

### Charged with Cutting the Throat of her 3 Year Old Child

#### Victim of Stabbing Affray Dies in Montreal--His Assailant Under Arrest

Elizabeth, N. J., June 21—Mrs. Maude Henry, wife of Chas. Henry a license farm plumber, is held on a charge that she murdered her own child, Mary Louise Henry, 3 years old. The little girl's body was found in its bed, with her throat cut from ear to ear. The authorities later came across a blood stained aluminum fruit knife. According to an alleged confession Mrs. Henry took the child to the bedroom, crooned her to sleep, tied a handkerchief across her own eyes/ covered the child's eyes with one hand and then cut the little ones throat, then she pulled out a bureau drawer left it in such a position as to make it appear that robbery had been committed and went out on the lawn to sprinkle flowers.

The death of another child had unbinged her mind.

Montreal, June 21—Wentworth Mosley is held pending an inquest tomorrow morning into the death of Wm. Biles forty years old who died in the general hospital last evening following a stabbing affray at Dominion Park late in the afternoon. Files was a waiter for the Riverview Inn and Masley the assistant manager. This morning Mosley declared that Biles had attacked and cut him with a knife but did not admit he had stabbed the man who died from his wound. Biles died at the hospital without an ante mortem statement being taken, but it is said that following an argument, Files stabbed Mosley in the hand and then dropped to the floor with blood gushing from a wound in his side. According to a statement made by Mrs. Biles the quarrel arose through Biles objecting to Mosley's use of language which he did not think proper before some women who were present. Mosley she stated objected to Biles' attitude and attacked him.

## BALL CARTRIDGES SERVED BY MISTAKE

(Canadian Press.)

Kingston, Ont., June 21—There was nearly a panic at the Barrie field camp yesterday when it was found that ball ammunition had been served to the 8th and 9th brigade regiments for a tactical scheme.

When the men began to fire bullets whistled through the camp grounds and there was great alarm. Finally the tactics were temporarily stopped and ammunition was recalled. The Hon. Sam Hughes was in camp just as the troops were starting their maneuvers but left almost immediately else Canada might have been without a minister of militia had one of the stray bullets come his way. It is thought that the ammunition might have been issued through the stores by a misleading table or that volunteers might have used some of their range cartridges. A board of inquiry is looking into the matter. The wonder is that there was not some casualties.

## CLUB WOMAN FACES MURDER CHARGE

Chicago, Ill., June 20—Mrs. Rene B. Morrow, member of several of Chicago's most prominent women's clubs, was arraigned in court today to stand trial for the alleged murder of her husband, Charles B. Morrow. Mr. Morrow, who had attained considerable fame and wealth as an inventor, was found shot to death on the rear porch of his home in Michigan avenue, on the morning of December last. At first it was supposed to be a case of suicide but relatives of the dead man began an investigation that resulted in Mrs. Morrow's arrest and indictment on a charge of murder. The investigation is said to have disclosed the fact that there had been much domestic unclarity in the Morrow home and that on several occasions Mrs. Morrow had threatened to kill her husband.

Vienna, June 21—Music lovers from many parts of Europe are here to attend the great festival of music which had its formal opening today under brilliant auspices. The festival will last two weeks. During that time some of the most important symphonic creations of Beethoven, Haydn, Brahms, Bruckner, and Mahler all of whom lived in Vienna, will be performed by the renowned orchestral and choral organizations of this city under the direction of Nikisch, Weingartner, Bruno, Walter and Schalk. A special concert will be devoted to Austrian folksongs and the classical dance music of Lanner and Strauss will also be represented and Mozart's operas will be performed at the Imperial Opera.
