## Fredericton and Houlton Tied for First Place in N. B. and Maine League

"Pets" had their Batting Clothes on Yesterday and Slammed Wade's Offerings all over Lot--Batting Average of Fredericton Players will Improve in Consequence--Brown Pitched for Locals

Those who were bewailing the fact that the Fredericton players could not bat will have to change their tune. Duggan's Pets shut Woodstock out 8 to 0 at Scully's Grove yesterday in the snappiest kind of game. Wade a pitcher who was tried out by Lynn in the New England League early this season was in the box for Woodstock and was found for just ten safe ones "Hannah" Hoyt was the big noise with the stick batting for 1,000. One of his three hits was a three-bagger and he also had a sacrifice. Duggan and Brown also had three-baggers to their credit. Wade has a pretty good reputation as a twirler and it is claimed that he was off color yesterday being bothered by a sore shoulder. Brown who was in the box for Fredericton was a problem Woodstock batters could not solve. Four hits were all he allowed, one of them a two-base hit.

### SHARP FIELDING.

There were some pretty good fielding stunts pulled off by Fredericton, two coming close together in the eighth inning when Larry Conley scooped in a hard one in left field and Fay made a one handed stab of a high one off Wade's bat. Woodstock came near making a run in the sixth when Corcoran attempted to score from third and was caught at the plate by inches only. He patted first in the inning leading off with a magnificent drive to left field. Larry Conley got the ball and was slow on the throw when Corcoran tried to make second. He was likewise a trifle wild, rather unusual for him, and "Red" Wildes would have had to use a step-ladder to get the ball. When the excitement had died down Corcoran was safely perched on third. Lamorey picked out three of Brown's shoots that he could not touch. Perley had a chance and drove the ball at Bob Conley on third. Bob whipped it over to Hoyt for the second put out of the inning and "Hannah" sent the ball into Murray who caught Corcoran sliding. It was good work and brought the crowd to its feet.

### THE SCORING

Duggan scored in the first inning taking first when hit by a pitched ball and going to third on an error by Duff. Wade let him score with a wild pitch. In the third Fredericton scored three runs as the result of a couple of singles and an error. In the fifth two three-base hits netted only one run and in the sixth there was another when Wade through wildness handed out three passes and Wildes scored on an error. Two singles and a sacrifice hit resulted in a run in the seventh and a two-bagger and an error let Fitzgerald score in the ninth. Brown was caught at the plate in the same inning.

London, June 21--The tournament for the open championship of Great Britain, the premier event of the year in the golfing world, has attracted a small army of followers of the sport to Muirfield, where the tournament takes place. The tournament this year will possess special interest for Americans, owing to the fact that Jack McDermatt, the national open champion of America, is among the entrants.
