She was seventy years of age and is survived by a family of five sons and five daughters. One of the sons, Frederick Scott, is at the front with a British Columbia corps. The funeral took place on Sunday with services by Rev. Mr. Dewar and was largely attended.

DEATH AT GIBSON.

Mrs. Mary Miller died at her home in Gibson at four o'clock Sunday afternoon after a short illness. She is survived by one daughter, Sadie Kidd, and one son, Wilfrid Kidd, also by one sister, Mrs. Cyrus Barton, and one brother Mr. William Whitlock both of Gibson. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock Rev. H. H. Ferguson conducting the service. Interment will be made at Sunny Bank.

ORDERED TO GO TO VALCARTIER

Horses Will Be Returned to Halifax---
Battery May Leave Saturday---
Possibility of Other Units Coming

The officers and men of the 28th Field Battery have received instructions to prepare to leave for Valcartier, where the battery will complete training for overseas service. Preparations for departure now are under way. The horses which were loaned to the battery by the Remount Department at Halifax will be returned there. They will leave for Halifax on Wednesday. It is thought that the personnel of the battery will be ready to leave for Valcartier by Saturday or if not then, early next week.

PREPARING FOR OTHER UNITS.

Lt. Col. E. C. Dean, C.A.S.C., assistant director of supplies and transport, arrived in the city this morning and accompanied by His Worship Mayor Mitchell, made a tour of the city. His visit was for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not the exhibition to be held here in September would interfere materially with the accommodations provided for the troops in the fair buildings. Col. Dean learned that the fair would interfere very slightly with the temporary barracks accommodations. In conversation with a reporter of The Mail, Col. Dean expressed himself as well satisfied with the manner in which the directors of the exhibition had treated the Militia Department.

AUSTRIAN, ALIEN

ENEMY, ARRESTED FOR NOT REGISTERING

Frank Katruk Arrested by local Police on Instructions of Col. Sherwood Of Ottawa

Frank Katruk, an Austrian alien enemy who has been living here for some time, was arrested yesterday by the local police on instructions from Col. Sherwood of Ottawa, chief of the Dominion Police.

Katruk is one of a number of local Austrians who, when detained by the police, agreed to register monthly. He failed to do so and his case was reported by Chief McCollom to Col. Sherwood. The latter instructed the local chief to arrest the man and hand him over to the military authorities for transfer to a detention camp. Chief McCollom today made arrangements to hand Katruk over to Major Crocker, officer commanding the 28th Field Battery. The nearest detention camp is at Amherst, N.S.






