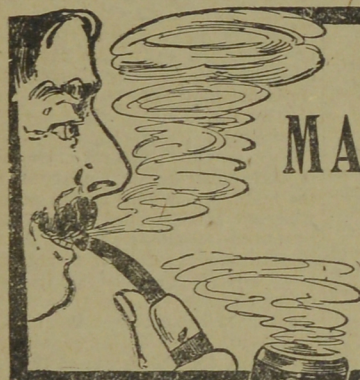

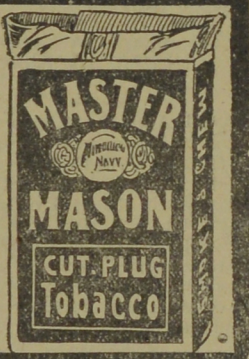

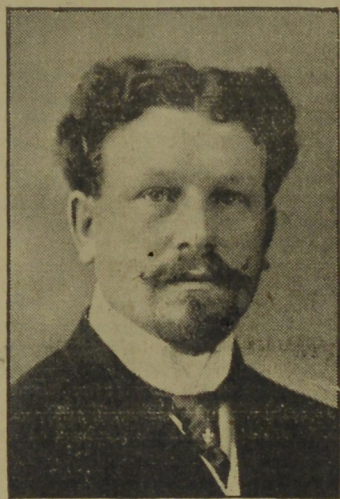

DR. SORMANY OF GLOUCESTER SPEAKS OF THE BUDGET

Speaking on the budget in the Legislature Thursday evening, Dr. Sormany of Gloucester, said that it was not his intention to say very much on the debate and if it was not probably the last time that he would have the opportunity of speaking he would not have spoken tonight. He did not propose to criticize the expenditures under this government as that had been gone into fully by previous speakers, but there were one or two matters in particular which he would like to refer to. He noticed that in the estimates for 1912 \$1,000 was devoted to colonization roads and \$1,000 to free grants act, while \$10,000 had been appropriated for immigration. The total amount for colonization purposes was thus only \$2,000 as compared with \$10,000 for immigration, but he would like to see the appropriations reversed. He was not opposed to bringing in new immigrants but he felt greater attention should be directed to colonization purposes. Our population was at a standstill but he did not think that bringing of the immigrant would remedy that state of affairs.

He was glad to see that the opinion from hon gentlemen seemed to agree on the great necessity of encouraging our own people to stay at home. He had made the statement before and he would say again that a native born New Brunswicker was worth ten foreigners. The government should give the country better roads and the appropriation was not large enough.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey—"We don't confine the amount to \$1,000. The department of public works last year spent from \$3,000 to \$4,000 on colonization roads."

Dr. Sormany, continuing, said that he was looking at the estimates and if the board of works had spent more than the amount it was all the better. Competition was kept enough at the present time without bringing in new settlers if the country did not secure more markets. The question of reciprocity was too important to be laughed at. His hon. friend from St. John had said that reciprocity was defeated by passion and prejudices and he (Sormany) did not know whether the hon. gentleman was right or wrong in that statement but he did know that there were others of the same opinion. He read the statement of the grand master of the Orange Association of the province, who had declared that the vote was not a party vote on the issue but was an outburst against F.O.R. Rule.

He had been favorably impressed with what his hon. friend from Carleton had said regarding the appropriations made to the highway boards and he wished that that practice would be carried out in every parish of the province. For the Parish of Caraquet, Gloucester County, the public accounts showed that the secretary of the highway board had received \$10, which was his salary, while Mr. W. P. Foley had expended \$495 received from the government. He did not want to say a word against Mr. Foley, whom he believed was square and honest, but that gentleman had been secretary of the highway board and had resigned. Now he had been appointed a special commissioner by the government and he did not have to consult with the highway board members in regard to expenditures. It was an easy matter to understand that in some cases a special commissioner was necessary but in the Parish of Caraquet he did not see any necessity for their appointment. He would like the chief commissioner to give the money to the highway board instead of placing it in the hands of the special commissioner, who is not supposed to spend any money.

His hon. friend the chief commissioner had said that he was not going to criticize the old government but hon. members had heard his speech and could judge for themselves. There was one thing in particular which he did not like in the remarks of his hon. friend and that was that he had done his best to cast reflection on the Acadian representative from Westmorland. His hon. friend had answered the insinuations last year but he was not in his seat

BOSTON TO WEIGH ITS BEANS

Boston, Mass., April 13—Fifty thousand dry measures used by retail grocers and provision dealers throughout Massachusetts were thrown into the discard today as a result of the new State law coming into operation which requires that all vegetables, puts, and fruit must either be sold at retail by weight or numerical count. The law further stipulates the number of pounds to the bushel of the various commodities, ranging from beans to peanuts. The State weights and measures department is arranging for a strict enforcement of the law.

The label committee of the Toronto district trades council has decided to organize a labor league affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.

LOCOMOTIVE INSPECTORS FOR INTERCOLONIAL

Ottawa, April 12—An order in council will be passed in a day or so appointing, upon the recommendation of the board of railway commissioners, four expert locomotive inspectors, who will be stationed at various divisional points throughout the Dominion.

The object is to increase the efficiency of the system of inspection now in force and to prevent, if possible, any increase in railway accidents in Canada. The new appointees are to be men of the highest standing and mechanical experts. They will be stationed at Winnipeg, Calgary, Toronto and Montreal respectively.

MONSTER RINK BURNED

Fort William, Ont., April 12—The Arena Rink, one of the largest buildings of its kind in Ontario, was burned to the ground last night. The loss is between \$30,000 and \$35,000, covered by insurance.
