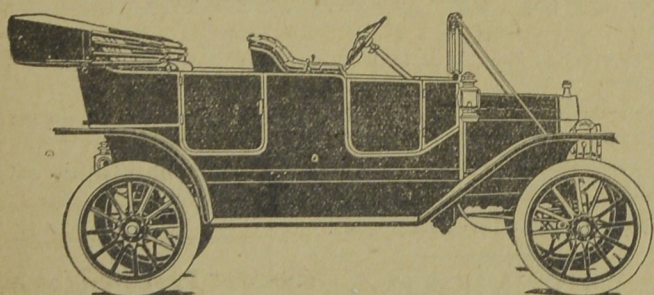

Ald. Williams, Ald. Benson, F. E.  
Neale, W. J. Groat, S. P. Hickey,  
John R. Ryan, R. D. Walsh.

## I. C. R. TO RUN "FARMING SPECIAL"

Lectures on "Better Farming" to be  
Given to New Brunswick Farmers

Farmers along the line of the In-  
tercolonial Railway in New Brun-  
swick will have the opportunity next  
June to take advantage of lectures  
on "better farming" to be delivered  
by members of the staff of the pro-  
vincial Government Department of  
Agriculture, in connection with the  
tour of the "Better Farming Spe-  
cial" train. The Intercolonial Rail-  
way will furnish the exhibit train  
which will consist of three baggage  
cars laden with specimens for illus-  
tration and demonstration, a passen-  
ger car where the lectures are to be  
given, and a car for the habitation  
enroute of the officials in charge.  
The train will start from Fredericton  
about June 20th and its stops will be  
governed by a schedule which will  
be announced at a later date. The  
principal points along the Frederic-  
ton Division to Blackville, will be  
visited, thence via the Indiantown  
Branch to Millerton and thence to  
Newcastle and Chatham. From here  
the "Farming Special" will proceed  
East as far as Sackville, making  
stops long enough for lecture pur-  
poses at Barnaby River, Rogersville,  
Harcourt, Memramcook and Dorch-  
ester. Returning to Moncton where a  
two hours' stop will be made, the  
schedule will then cover Salisbury,  
Petitcodiac, Sussex, Norton and  
Hampton. The North Shore will then  
be visited and stops made from Bath-  
urst to Campbellton and Dalhousie,  
after which the train will return to  
Fredericton.

The object of the tour of the  
"Farming Special" is to instruct  
the farmers in the more advanced  
and scientific measures of agriculture  
and the exhibit material carried on  
the train is merely for the purpose of  
demonstration. A hearty invitation  
will be expected to farmers all over  
the Province to assemble at the  
most convenient railway point on  
the day scheduled for the visit of  
the train, and attend these lectures  
and by questioning and inspection  
gain whatever knowledge and enlight-  
enment they may require. These  
"farming specials" have been run in  
Ontario and the west with most sat-  
isfactory results and they should  
prove a great benefit to the farmers  
of our own province.

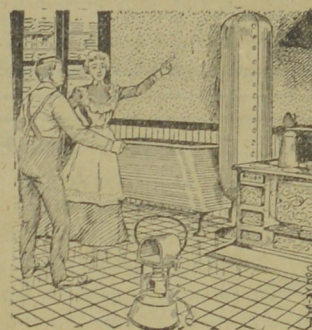

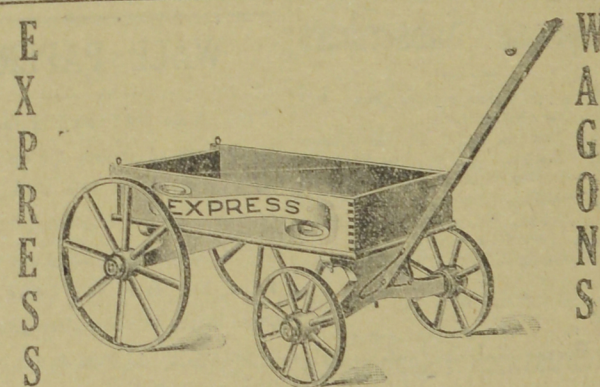

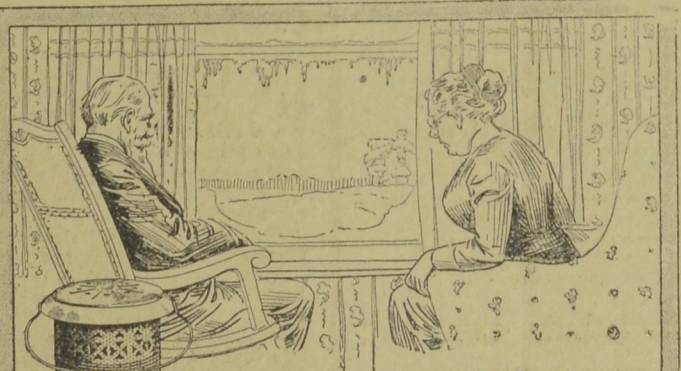
